directed". The following day he sees it has gone back to the seller. He asks her what is going on? We had a deal. She says someone offered her \$10,000! They go back and forth and the buyer works a deal to get it for \$8,000. Needless to say it is a rare corkscrew and most likely an American piece but could be German.

The buyer being a dealer listed it on eBay for \$15K and then on the ICCA Fixed Price Auction site for \$18K. He had stopped both auctions and listed in the regular ICCA Auction in November, 2020.

Not a story you hear every day. I learned you can "redirect" priority packages (for a fee). In the end the dealer got \$8,500.00 in the ICCA Auction so he made \$500.00.

This is an exceptionally rare piece. Per World-Class Corkscrews (found on page 210) "Corkscrew (Pictured above) with the "snail faces" lock on the shaft and hinged legs to rest on the bottle neck. The corkscrew has resemblances to Friedrich Kummer's German patent, 14,531, December 3, 1880, or to the legs of Ernest Steinfeld's registration 28,204, June 15, 1894. There also seems to be a connection to the "snail faces" of Charles Chinnock's American patent, 38,147, April 14, 1863.

Excellent condition overall. Wood handle shows no signs of cracks splits or chips. The helix tip is complete and sharp. The legs are not loose and dangling but rather tight. Original plate appears intact.
