The Q-10s should start with #5 and end with #8.



#### **NEW DISCOVERIES**

This interesting new discovery is unlike any other type of opener. It has a metal frame which mounts onto a bar by means of two thumb screws. Attached to this frame by means of rivets is a 0-4 type wall mounted opener. The frame is painted olive tone gold, over which the advertisements have been silk screened in similar fashion to a painted label bottle. The advertisements appear in white, red, and dark green. The frame, without the 0-4 wall mount and thumb screws, measures 5" wide, 5 3/16" high, and 2 9/16" deep.







Note that in this rear view the opener is being supported by a book.



Above is a drawing of the 0-4 type opener as viewed from the top. The Vaughan's IMPROVED Never Chip was used as early as 1922 (see catalog reprint – back page JFO #9). The improved version was  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " wide, one inch wider than the original version, patented 6-18-1912. Considering these facts it is possible that this opener could (?) date as far back as the early post-pro period, circa 1933.

- A-48 2 11/16" Turtle with cap lifter and 3 screwdrivers complete with envelope.

  Marked "Lite." Made by Lewtan. (Kaye). Compare to type A-39.
- B-54 3" Cap lifter. "Drink Wennersten's M-H Bohemian Blend" / Wholesome, Nourishing, Non-Intoxicating." (Vollrath)
- B-55 2 7/16" Modern cap lifter marked "Busch, Born of Natural Ingredients, Smooth, Refreshing Beer" (Keown). Also found with Budweiser, Busch, Bud Light, Coors, Coors Light, Stroh's and Lite from Miller. (Santen, Sherman and others).
- C-39 .3 3/8" Cap lifter. Like C-37 except no square hole.. "The Haas Brewery Ripon, Wis." (Vollrath)
- D-13 3" Iron cap lifter. "Koppitz-Melchers Malt Extract" (Sherman)
- E-28 6 1/4" Cap lifter / screwdriver. "Ed Donat, Plattsmouth, Neb." / "Gund's Beers, Wines & Liquors."
- F-29 8 1/16" Combination over-the-top cap lifter and spoon. "Liquid 'Cremo'

- N-62 3 1/4" Cap lifter and bottle resealer. Marked Pat. Pend., B & B, St. Paul. "Hund and Eger, Coca-Cola and Schlitz, St. Joseph, Mo." (Waldo)
- P-79 2 5/8" Folding corkscrew. German made nickel plated brass legs. Marked "Loerzel Brothers, Saugerties, N. Y., Celebrated Beers." Brewery operated under Loerzel from 1888-1893. (Bull)
- P-80 5 1/2" Corkscrew/cap lifter. "Froedtert Malt." (Vollrath)
- P-81 5 3/4" Corkscrew. An Edwin Walker corkscrew with spring on shank above bell instead of cotter pin retainer. "Pabst, Milwaukee." (Bull)
- P-82 5 7/8" Corkscrew with flat wire breaker above bell and heavy shaft marked Williamson Co., Newark, N. J., Patented. "Anheuser-Busch" (Ennis, Waldo, Bull, and others)

P-83 8" Barmounted corkscrew. "Kessler Brewing Co., Helena, Mont."
Marked Yankee No. 7. Based on R. B. Gilchrist patent of April
8, 1913 (No. 1,058,361). Like the Champion (see Type P-64 except
cork is extracted by raising instead of lowering the handle and
mounting plate in different position. (Bull)

P-84 10" Barmounted corkscrew. "Schlitz Brewing Co., Milwaukee, Wis." appears on the base plate. Edwin Walker's Feb. 14, 1888 patent number 377,790. (Bull)

Q-11 2 3/4" diameter (top), 3 1/8" diameter (bottom). "Augsburger Dark Light Bock." Cap lifter and twist off cap remover. Magnets to hold cap. Marked Inventex RO 1983, Made in Canada. (Kaye)

Unclassified:

A folding corkscrew (shown open and closed) marked "Kupper Lager" from Germany. Measures 3 3/8" closed and 5 7/8" opened. (Bull)

A can opener marked "Pabst Malt Syrup." 5 3/4" long x 1 9/16" wide. Marked on handle: Simplex Can Opener made by Simplex Appliance Co., Chicago, USA, Pat'd, 11-24-25, 7-13-26, 11-16-26. (Graff)


One hundred and seventy-two pages of corkscrews and beer can openers.

How's that for openers.






Did you ever wonder whether this King of Clubs opener was mis-listed? After all, it doesn't say beer and isn't listed as a brand in Who's Who in Brew. Doesn't it sound like the name of a club soda or possibly a whiskey? You know we've mislisted I-7-42 Won-Up, which is a soda.

If these thoughts have passed through your mind you weren't alone. I had my suspicions too until I recently came across a little brochure from the G. Heileman Brewing Co., La Crosse, Wis. Inside the brochure were pictured a bottle of Old Style Lager, "The Brew with a Snap to it!", and a bottle of King of Clubs, "The Royal Brew!".

The bottle of King of Clubs pictured a King of Clubs playing card on the label, and on the neck label, exactly as on the opener, appeared the words King of Clubs.

The brochure advertised: "Effective January 1st, 1932 the very same formula and process was reinstated in manufacturing "OLD STYLE LAGER" and "KING OF CLUBS" as in the days of yore".

You might expect a politican to kiss a baby or give away campaign buttons, but have you ever heard of a politican giving away a bottle opener as an advertisement for your vote?



# What are those things used for? Beer bottles, for openers

Some people collect stamps, others baseball cards. But one Hays man collects something that isn't as common.

For the past six years, Eldon Gregg, 1714 Henry, has been collecting bottle and can openers.

"It really didn't start out as a hobby," Gregg said. "About six years ago when I was cleaning out my father's old tool boxes and fishing boxes, I came across a bunch of bottle openers.

"After cleaning out some of my tool boxes and fishing boxes, I ended up with about 53 different kinds of openers," he said. "It really got me intrigued."

Since then, Gregg's collection has grown. He now has about 600 or 700 openers, including openers representing 225 beer names, he said.

"I picked up a few at flea markets and other places, but I had a lot given to me from my friends," he said. "They just couldn't believe that anyone was collecting beer can openers."

As one of more than 200 members of Just For Cpeners, the national organization of opener collectors, Gregg has attended several of the group's annual magnings.

"The conventions are in April and for the past two years they have been in Denver, Colo." he

where I do most of my trading. I pick up a lot of different openers there."

Last year Gregg received first place for his display. The collections, he said, were judged based on the manner in which they were displayed and the variety of openers included in the display. Appropriately, Gregg received a plaque with the official can opener for the convention on it.

for the convention on it.

The two people instrumental in a starting the national organization, deregg said, were Don Bull and Ed Kaye. The two have written cseveral books catologing over a 9,000 different types of openers. sl Bull and Kaye also send out cl newsletters to all members of the bnational organization.

Gregg said his goal was to get as many beer names and types of openers as he could, without any duplications.

Through his collecting Gregg has gained a lot of knowledge about the history of openers.

"The cork screw was the first type of bottle opener," he said. "Some were patented in the 1870's."

The easiest way to date openers is to refer to them as before or after Prohibition, Gregg said. The more uncommon the brewery, the more expensive the opener, he added.

Besides the opener, Gregg has

gained an interest in the history of the beer can.

"The first beer can came out with step-by-step instructions on the can showing how to open it," he said.

When he's not showing his collection at conventions or to civic groups, he displays his openers at his home on the wall next to his bar, Gregg said.

Dar, Gregg said.
"People are always complaining that if they want to open anything, they have to take it down from the wall," he said.

Openers in Gregg's collection come in a wide variety of sizes and shapes, including some in the shape of old cars, boots, wrenches, swords, bottles, loaves of bread and turtles.

Gregg also collects dualpurpose openers. His display includes a belt-buckle bottle opener, shoe-horn bottle opener and a combination cigar box and bottle

Gregg's collection will be on display at the Ellis County Historical Society Museum, 100 W. 7th, beginning today and running through the entire month of September. The display will also feature several beer cans from the collection of Harold Palmer, 2403 Oak.

The display is open to the public and the museum hours are 9 a.m. to noon and 1-4 p.m. Monday through Friday.


