
Question: Does a patent number tell when an item was patented in the United States?

Answer: You can learn the exact date of a patent and all the information about the object and who took out the patent by doing research at a major library that has the "Official Gazette of the U.S. Patent Office." You can order a copy of a patent from the Commissioner of Patents and Trademarks, U.S. Patent and Trademarks, U.S. Patent and Trademarks, U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, Washington, D.C. 20231. If you need only a rough date, remember that the numbers were larger than 550,000 in 1896, larger than 1,500,000 in 1926, larger than 2,300,000 in 1946 and almost 4,000,000 in 1976. If you filed for a patent this year it would have a number over 4,600,000.

BUDWEISER BEER OF LESS OF LESS



is, and what kind of beer advertising openers he finds? Do you suppose that C.H. REILLEY ever had an A-40 type?





As you can see the dies for the two openers vary slightly. The Valley Forge is made of black metal with a flat reverse. The Old Fort Niagara is made of brass with a slightly concave reverse, marked JAPAN.



ORIGINATORS I NON-INTOXICANTS TASTE LIKE BEER

HOME OFFICES, COUNCIL BLUFFS, IOWA. BRANCH HOUSES THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES.

> GENERAL OFFICES. Omaha, Neor. - Jan - 23 - 1916.

A local breweriana collector-friend is trying to find out some information about this interesting letterhead. Notice that the bottle label makes no mention of containing any alcohol, and that while the home offices of this company are advertised as Council Bluffs, Iowa this letter came from the general offices in Omaha, Nebraska.

Is it possible that with Iowa's history of temperance there was enough of a market for companies to be in business manufacturing "non-intoxicants that taste like beer"? According to Don Bull's book American Breweries the last brewery in Council Bluffs closed in 1888.

ANSWERS TO OPENER TRIVIA

* I want to include in its entirety this excellent piece of research on the history of McInnerney's Special Brew submitted by Scott J. Williams of Fairfax, Iowa. THANK YOU SCOTT! This is really outstanding, and I sincerely appreciate the time and effort you took to put it together.

"Several years ago an A-28 McInnerney's was one of my first acquisitions, yet until recently its origin remained a mystery to me. The recent TRIVIA challenge to Iowa collectors compelled me to uncover the following information: At the turn of the century, Iowa City's "McInnernye's Buffet" on the southwest corner of College and Dubuque Streets was the largest saloon in the thriving University and commercial town that had been the original State Capitol. Frank McInnerney had started business prior to the Gay Nineties and continued until prohibition came to Iowa in 1916, four years prior to national prohibition.

The McInnerney bar, 150 feet long and reaching all the way from College Street to the alley, was said to be the longest bar in the State. There were 12 bartenders, neatly dressed with black trousers, white shirts and black ties. The brass rail at the base of the bar was shined daily as were the cuspidors. McInnerney was a stickler for cleanliness and everything was spic and span. He insisted on the correct glassware for the

drinks served.

McInnerney was the originator of Iowa's "First Capitol Whiskey" and had "McInnerney's Special Brew" prepared by Graf Brothers Union Brewing Company of Iowa City. Old timers remember hearing of customers ordering the beer with two whole eggs beaten up in it. This was considered special in

those years... "an egg in your beer".

"Graf's Golden Brew" was the main product of the company that furnished "McInnereys Special Brew". I have not come across openers advertising beer products from Grafs, other than "McInnerneys". William Graf continued a profitable operation as a soda pop company for many years after Iowa went dry in 1916. I have seen B-14 openers for "Grafs Grape-Ola". Graf briefly produced a near beer but it proved to be a failure. Regular beer was still legal in nearby Illinois and was shipped into Iowa illegally labeled as "Crockery" or "Dishes, Handle With Care". Another Iowa City brewery which became a casualty of the period was Iowa Brewing Company. Its beer was called "Erlanger" with the catchy advertising slogan "The Beer That Made Milwaukee Jealous". Signs featuring this slogan were painted on the sides of many saloons dispensing this beer.

Due to the OPENER TRIVIA challenge, I have finally resolved my curiosity as to the meaning of "McInnerney's Special Brew"

- * Don Sherman of Los Angeles, California sent in an interesting photostat of a tin screw box. Don wrote: "Reverse shows 3 sides of a compartmented screw box put out by the Sexauer Company circa 1931. It is tin, red, yellow & blue colors. Thought it might throw some light on the 'Mulekick' subject. The logo w/ mule is interesting. Evidently the company distributed a complete line of plumber's supplies at one time."
- * In reference to the I-13 Evangelical Products "Church Key" pictured in the last issue George Lohmiller wrote: "I live in Grand Junction and have only one of these openers myself (where it is I do not know)."

The Federal Government has declared all type F-11, 12, 13, and certain F-2 openers to be endangered. To help in the preservation of these openers, they should be forwarded to the undersigned, who will care for them in a warm, dry and loving environment.

In addition to the Type F-11, 12, and 13, the following Type F-2s are especially endangered, and should be forwarded at once:

- 13, 14, 15, 16, 18, 19, 21, 23, 26, 28, 35, 36, 37,
- 38, 40, 41, 42

The following listed openers, all F-2s, are not quite so endangered in Arizona, and have offered to venture out if it will help to bring home another opener from the above list:

2, 3, 6, 9, 17, 25, 27, 32, 34, and 1 single F-17-1

If you have gotten this far, you love the F openers as much as I do, so please check a couple things for me:

- 1. Does anyone have an F-2-15 in captivity now, it was reported the same as F-2-29, only without the -- "since 1872".
- 2. Same type of question, what about F-2-18, does anyone have one, with the word "Company" spelled out, or are they all really F-2-24s?

I hope everyone has a great collecting year this year. When you see him - don't forget to say 'Thank You' to Ed for all the work it takes to get our newsletter out to us.




