JOHN STANLEY


I HAVE BEEN COLLECTING OPENERS SINCE 1977. I HAVE ALWAYS ENJOYED COLLECTING ADVERTISING ITEMS IN GENERAL. MY FIRST FEW OPENERS WERE 'E' TYPES. MY INTEREST REALLY BEGIN WHEN MY MOTHER BOUGHT ME A PEG BOARD FULL OF 'E' SODA OPENERS. THIS WAS IN 1978 AND I THOUGHT I WAS THE ONLY PERSON IN THE WHOLE WORLD COLLECTING OPENERS (JUST LIKE EVERY OTHER OPENER COLLECTOR). IN 1980 I STARTED GOING TO FLEA MARKETS AND ANTIQUE SHOWS AND MY COLLECTION REALLY STARTED GROWING. MY MAIN INTEREST AT THIS TIME WAS TRYING TO GET UNUSUAL SHAPED OPENERS AND THE 'A' TYPE FIGURALS.

FINALLY IN 1982 I BOUGHT SOME OPENERS AT A FLEA MARKET IN PENNSYLVANIA AND A GUY TOLD ME THERE WAS AN OPENER CLUB BEING RUN BY DON BULL IN TRUMBULL, CT. THE GUY DIDN'T KNOW THE STREET ADDRESS BUT I SENT DON A LETTER ANYWAY. DON SENT ME ALL THE INFORMATION ABOUT 'JFO' AND THE BOOKS HE HAD PUBLISHED. I REALLY BECAME HOOKED ON COLLECTING AT THIS POINT. MY COLLECTION NOW HAD ABOUT 500 PIECES BUT I WAS AMAZED AT HOW MANY TYPES I DID NOT HAVE.

IN 1983 I ALMOST WENT TO MY FIRST CONVENTION BUT DECIDED NOT TO. IT WAS NOT UNTIL 1986 WHEN I WENT TO THE 'JFO' CONVENTION HOSTED BY ED KAYE IN FLORIDA, THAT I FOUND HOW MUCH FUN I HAD BEEN MISSING. I MET A LOT OF REALLY NICE 'JFO' MEMBERS WHO WERE A LOT OF FUN TO BE AROUND AND HAD A LOT OF GREAT OPENER STORIES. I HAVE BEEN TO EVERY CONVENTION SINCE AND I WOULDN'T MISS ONE NOW (IT'S HARD TO MISS THEM WHEN YOU'RE THE HOST).


MY COLLECTION PRESENTLY HAS ABOUT 350 OPENERS AS I HAVE TRIED TO NARROW MY INTEREST RANGE. THE PAST COUPLE OF YEARS I HAVE BEEN VERY SUCCESSFUL DOING MAIL TRADING AND HAVE CORRESPONDED WITH A LOT OF NICE MEMBERS. AS MY COLLECTION HAS BECOME MORE ADVANCED I DON'T FIND MANY OPENERS THAT I NEED, BUT THE MAIN ENJOYMENT NOW COMES FROM CORRESPONDING WITH OTHER MEMBERS AND ATTENDING THE ANNUAL CONVENTION.






ADOPT A DOG

JOHN HAS THE CONVENTION OPENER FOR SALE, \$15 FOR THE OPENER PLUS \$1 POSTAGE. (See left picture below, bottom center)






AT THIS YEAR'S CONVENTION SEVERAL MEMBERS ASKED HOW I CLEAN MY OPENERS. THE FOLLOWING STEPS ARE HOW I CLEAN MOST OF MY OPENERS. PLEASE REMEMBER THAT IF AN OPENER IS PITTED ABOUT THE ONLY WAY TO REMOVE PITTING IS BY WIRE BRUSHING (AND THIS DOES NOT ALWAYS WORK). ALSO I DO NOT TRY TO CLEAN ANY OPENERS WITH ENAMELING USING THE ACID SOLUTION.

- 1) PREPARE A SOLUTION OF OXALIC ACID (CAN COLLECTORS USE THIS)
 USING ABOUT 3 TABLESPOONS OF CRYSTALS FOR 2 PINTS OF WATER.
 I ALSO USE A NARROW LIDDED GLASS CONTAINER SO THE OPENER WILL
 NOT LAY FLAT IN THE BOTTOM OF THE JAR. THE OXALIC ACID CAN BE
 PURCHASED AT YOUR LOCAL DRUG STORE (THEY MAY HAVE TO SPECIAL
 ORDER) AND THE COST IS ABOUT \$6 FOR 16 OUNCES.
- 2) DEPENDING UPON THE CONDITION I WILL SOAK AN OPENER IN THE SOLUTION FROM 30 MINUTES UP TO 4 HOURS (FOR ONE WITH A LOT OF RUST) (I CLEANED AN A-13 CAR FOR GARY DEACHMAN AT THE CONVENTION SOAKING IT FOR ABOUT 4 HOURS, IT CAME OUT SO NICE HE DIDN'T WANT TO TRADE THE OPENER TO ME).
- 3) AT END OF THE SOAKING TIME REMOVE THE OPENER FROM THE SOLUTION USING AN OLD SCREWDRIVER OR COAT HANGAR. **** PLEASE USE RUBBER GLOVES **** WHEN WORKING WITH THE ACID AS IT IS HARMFUL TO YOUR SKIN. IF YOU DO SPILL THE ACID ON YOUR SKIN, RINSE THOROUGHLY WITH WATER.
- 4) I THEN SCRUB THE OPENER WITH A SOAPY 'SOS' PAD. I DRY THE OPENER THOROUGHLY WITH PAPER TOWELS. IF THE OPENER HAS A MOVING PART, I WILL ADD SOME MACHINE OIL.

HOPEFULLY THIS METHOD WILL HELP MAKE YOUR OPENERS LOOK BETTER (BUT REMEMBER DO IT AFTER YOU HAVE TRADED FOR THE OPENER!!!).





For a reason that now escapes me, I started collecting bottle openers back in the early '70s. All I remember is that I admired one I saw in a friend's silverware drawer and she gave it to me as a present. It's about seven inches long and shaped like a shovel. The opening at the top of the shovel—V-shaped, with a handgrip across the top and a flange at the bottom—serves as the opener. Apparently the shovel was a giveaway from a Florida bank, and the best guess as to why a shovel was selected is that it was probably for a "groundbreaking" promotion.

Now it did not surprise me, as I went along, that a second use for many bottle openers over the years has been to advertise something—a particular beverage, a place, an event—that just made sense. What *did* surprise me were the shapes, looks and detail of some of the openers that I found. That's what *really* got me hooked. And for two reasons: one was the wonderful imagination of the designers; the second was that some of the styles and words on the openers were both links to the past *and* puzzles. And I found that rather intriguing.

For example, ever since I bought an opener that is shaped exactly like a woman's high-topped, high-heeled boot, not only have I wondered what "Gay-ola" tasted like, I've also wondered what-in-the-world it was! Did this stuff make you feel happy after you drank it? Was it some sort of elixir? I don't have a clue.

Same with "Wolverine Ginger Ale."
Never heard of it—and I live in the
"Wolverine" state! It's like what Butch
Cassidy said to the Sundance Kid: "Who
are those guys?"

Another favorite of mine is an opener in the shape of a mule with its mouth open. Did it come from some Democratic get-together or convention? Was it a giveaway from a feed company? There couldn't have been a beverage called "Donkey Drink," could there? Nahhh. Okay, then why a bottle opener shaped like a mule? I also have one shaped like a banjo. Another is shaped like a guitar. Another looks very much like a mermaid, with a pretty little face at the top and kind of a flipper at the bottom. Seaside Seltzer? Mermaid Mango Fruit Drink? Wrong. On one side is printed, "D.B. Robarge." On the other it says, "Heights Coffee Store." Go figure.

I also have two openers (sounds like


baseball cards, doesn't it? "Oh, yeah? Well, I've got two Al Kalines.") that declare "Hydrox Ginger Ale" on one side, and on the other it is suggested that you "Phone Calumet 5500." If I knew the area code, I might.

Another favorite is an opener dated 1940 that's shaped and painted to look like a Pepsi bottle. What's interesting about it is that, unlike conventional openers that you hook under the cap and lift *up*, this one lies on top of the cap, hooks on the other side, and you pull *down* to pop it off. Was there a reason for this, or did somebody just want to be different?

One of my bottle openers tells me to "Be happy with Harvard Ale or Export." (What, or get out?) Another is shaped like a forearm and hand—the index finger and thumb forming a circle—with printing that says this gesture is a "Handy way to order Ballantine's." (No, thanks. Sounds like a handy way to get slugged by some waitress.) And I have one that's shaped like a bottle but convex, with the actual opener cut out of the lower third, and printing that says, "Above All Peerless Liquid Malt Extract Contains No Alcohol." (Peerless? Or Beerless?)

From Canada I have an opener shaped like a chain saw, plus a moose figure that opens a bottle with the antlers on top of the moose's head. (Gee, who's that one from?) From Maine I have-what elsea lobster opener. From Paris, the Eiffel Tower. And from London, the Beefeater character. I have openers from New Zealand, Acapulco, Amsterdam, Aruba, Mississippi, Oregon, Renfro Valley, Reno, Buffalo, Chicago, the Costa Del Sol and (I think) Japan. I have a peacock, a bull, an elephant, a whale, a mallard, a golf club, two hammers and three brass keys. In all, I have 205 bottle openers in my collection. That may sound like a lot but it isn't. Compared to the man I read about with 2,000 openers, I'm in the minor leagues.

The point here is simply that collecting is, and should be, fun. And no way am I suggesting that it should become an obsession. I mean, it's not like I spend every waking moment looking for bottle openers. In fact, I've recently begun to collect old oil cans and so far have seven. Why oil cans? Oh, I don't know. I guess it's because I think they make interesting bookends. And...well...you see...I've somehow accumulated these 500 books...











PLEASE READ THIS!

For the past two years I have tried to make a special issue of Opener Trivia featuring the interesting openers that people acquired at the convention. The first year following the convention I sent letters to all

the attendees requesting that they send me a drawing or photostat of one or more of their best acquisitions. Although this worked well and most of the people responded, it turned out to be more work and time than I could afford to give.

Last year instead of sending out the letters I gave a short speech at the convention requesting that all the attendees remember to send me a drawing or photostat of their favorite acquisitions. THIS WAS A TOTAL FAILURE and when it came time to put together the article I had so few responses that I only could make up one page. Thereupon, I made a second request and in the following issue I came up with another two pages.

This year I had made up my mind that there just wasn't enough interest in this project and I wasn't going to send out letters or give a speech. I would just let it die gracefully and probably no one would remember or care. However, to my amazement a couple of you sent in photostats of your favorite acquisitions. I guess I had you better trained than I realized. I never expected anyone to remember to do this on their own without me reminding them.

Because of these two people, Ollie Hibbeler and John Stanley, I am going to give this project one more shot; however, I am going to change the format a bit. Rather than just asking the people who attended the convention to participate I would like to open it up to all of our JFO members. The next issue of Opener Trivia will be "SHOW AND TELL". If you have an opener or two in your collection, that you would like to share with us just send me a drawing or good clear photostat. It doesn't matter whether you've had the opener in your collection for years, found it just last week, or picked it up at the convention. It doesn't have to be a hard type. It can be a common E or I type. All that matters is that it is special to you.


I hope everyone cares enough to participate and that we can make this "SHOW AND TELL" issue something special for all of us.

In this issue of Opener Trivia I am featuring a page of A and C type figural openers. I know some of our members are into collecting these, and I want to include something for everyone in this column. None of the figurals pictured are known to exist with beer advertising.

All of the advertising that appears on these openers is illustrated except in the case of opener (8). The reverse of this opener reads: Cliquot Club Ginger Ale

When only one side of the opener is shown the reverse side is blank except in the case of opener (9) whose obverse and reverse sides are the same.

The most unique opener of the lot is opener (8). The body of this opener is made of one piece of metal doubled over upon itself leaving a narrow space between the obverse and reverse halves (drawing (7) illustrates a side view of this opener). Sandwiched inside of the body is the opener. The body and the opener are held together by means of a rivet (little black circle beneath the words "GINGER ALE"). (con't. on pg. 8)



(OPENER TRIVIA from pg. 6) The opener pivots on the rivet and can be folded in or out of the body. In the illustration the opener is shown folded out of the body. When the opener is folded into the body it causes the part in the lower right hand corner of the opener (marked with X) to pivot to a position at the bottom of the opener (see arrows). This part has a small metal ring by which the opener can be attached to a key ring or key chain.


It was time to leave for another year and Saturday and Sunday most members left for home. Another super JFO is now history. See you all next year.
