Gathering At Area Hotel Is Tops for U. S. Bottle Opener Collectors (by Glen Sparks of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch)

Member of Just for Openers, a club for bottle opener enthusiasts, mixed and mingled at their annual convention here last weekend. Art Santen gently chuckles about any talk that collecting bottle openers may be an unusual hobby. In fact, the way Santen, of the Central West End, sees it, this is a hobby that makes perfect sense. Bottle openers, Santen says, are "small, cheap and there are lots of them." To make his case, he pointed to a hat that has a small opener embedded in the emblem. This is about as convenient as it gets. "See there is no end to this," Santen said.

He and other bottle opener enthusiasts gathered Saturday morning at the Ramada Inn in north St. Louis County for the 25th annual Just for Openers trade show. Collectors rented rooms and put out their best stuff. Bottle openers come in the shape of kangaroos, race cars, lizards, golf bags and just about any other sporting good or creature.

Russ Adler of Ladi, Wis., brought one in the shape of a dachshund. "I hadn't seen one of these before," he said, "There's some great stuff here." Openers bearing the names of Anheuser-Busch brews get plenty of display space at these shows, but so do openers from Lembeck & Betz of Jersey City, N.J., The Buffalo Brewing Co., of Sacramento, Calif., and the Chicago National Beverage Co. Adler, not surprisingly, has a large collection of openers from Adler brew of Appleton, Wis. John Mlady of Omaha, Neb., prefers collectibles from his home state. Before Prohibition struck, about 60 brewers in Nebraska manufactured beer for thirsty residents. Today, just a handful of microbreweries are open in Nebraska. "Most of the older brewers had their own openers," Mlady said. "I started collecting them, and I just got hooked."

Santen's collection numbers in the thousands. In fact, he has converted his basement into a museum dedicated to the bottle opener. Santen has openers from every state and 80 countries. He offers tours, and Adler recommends the trip. "His collection is just amazing," Adler said. "Incredible."

Art Santen can thank his father, Ben, for starting him on this quest to find the best bottle openers. Ben Santen ran Santen's Tavern at Wisconsin Avenue and Utah Street in St. Louis. After closing the place, he handed his openers to Art. "This is all really because of my dad," Art Santen said. "If he'd have given me signs, I'd be collecting signs."

Art Santen, 69 was host of the 2003 Just for Openers show. Don Bull of Virginia founded JFO in 1979. The 250 members pay \$20 a year and get a quarterly newsletter. To join, contact John Stanley, the newsletter editor at Box 64, Chapel Hill, NC 27514. The 2004 show is set for San Francisco.

Socializing is a big part of any show. The atmosphere is informal, and the beer is cold. Near the end of the show, Adler said – as proud as he could be about the fact – that no one discussed any JFO formal business. Santen wore a T-shirt and a pair of bright Budweiser shorts. "When we set up a club here, we wanted to know what the rules should be, and someone asked who would enforce the rules," Santen said. "So we said, 'OK, there aren't any rules.'"

Santen has such an appreciation for openers that he collects jokes and cartoons about the pieces. Every so often, he said, Hagar the Horrible, that bearded, bumbling Viking of the comic page, has something funny to say about bottle openers. Of course, this is a serious hobby, too and Santen has the big, fact-filled catalog to prove it. The catalog lists just about every opener there is and is updated every year. Collectors can check prices and check off the openers in their collection.

Some openers can cost hundreds of dollars. Some date to the late 1800s and are corkscrew-style, similar to ones for wine bottles. Just like so many other things, openers are a piece of history. "It's a fun hobby," Santen said. "I don't fish. I don't hunt (except for openers). I don't golf. I don't smoke. I do this."

22nd ABA Convention – Stevens Point, Wisconsin June 17-21, 2003 (by Verne Vollrath)

Other items in the October issue included our trip to the ECBA Convention in Philadelphia and John's trip with his mother to NABA in Greensburg, Pa. John admitted to one of his "lessons on buying a collection" at NABA. He had been picking up a lot of good openers at this show, so he thought he was on a roll. Mistake #1, gambling man. To quote his article, "this is where my mind went crazy". A former member had about 50 openers with him and John wanted 8 of them, but bought the lot. He was told that the guy had around 700 more at home. The price was \$1500. John remembered seeing an ad where this unnamed man was selling the collection and he thought there were about 800 openers then for the same price, but John went ahead and broke one of his main rules, **do not buy anything sight unseen**. John's whole intent in buying this collection was trying to get some good material for the JFO auction. (Sure John.) While the NABA show continued the seller kept changing his story...on Thursday he told John you already have \$400 worth of openers, on Friday his estimate was up to \$600 and by Saturday the value had appreciated to \$700. John was feeling a little uneasy as warning number two, **watch out when someone does not have consistent prices on openers** began to haunt him.

"The" collection arrived shortly after John returned from NABA. John's worse fears had become reality. He had made a big mistake. It's after midnight, but before I close, I would like to thank all our dear JFO friends for all your love and support as the woman who started John in this hobby, his mother, passed away while we were at the JFO Convention. I had told friends before we headed for St. Louis that this was a real possibility, but if it happened, it would be the best place for us to be as our JFO friends are our extended family. Unless you have been an active part of this close knit group, you can't possibly understand. Join us next year in San Francisco to find out.

25th Annual Just For Openers Convention April 9-13 St Louis, Mo

Once again the whole family would be going to a JFO Convention. Pat, Corkie the Yorkie and myself headed out of Durham about 10:30 on Saturday, April 5th. Our destination that day was Cincinnati and we made it by 9:30 that evening after numerous stops along the way (no antiquing though). I always want to work a rib dinner in at Montgomery's anytime we are near Cincinnati. The dinner was great but the weather was lousy, 35 degrees and just plain cold. What happened to the 70 degrees we left in Durham.

The next morning we visited Ardea Horn (wife of deceased JFO member John Horn). She was doing fine as well as her dog, Suki. Corkie finally found a dog she could get along with. After a one hour visit it was time to head to Dayton, Ohio to visit Pat's niece. Both the niece and her husband are stationed at the U.S. Air Force Base in Dayton. Melinda and Rich have a two month old baby named, Ben. The five of us went to lunch and Ben was a real angel. For some reason I do not remember being that nice of a baby.

At 3:30 that afternoon we headed towards Champaign, Illinois. We were to meet Dave Lendy's father in-law to pick up his collection to start selling at the convention. Dave had decided to concentrate on Illinois and especially Chicago breweriana (and openers). Pat missed a turned in Indianapolis (she blamed the navigator, your editor). We made good time and met Wayne just off the interstate at 7:00. He had 11 small boxes and one large box. Lets just say the expedition was full. By 11:00 that morning we were on the road to Ollie and Shirley Hibbeler's house at Lake of the Ozarks. It was about a three drive from St. Louis and we arrived mid-afternoon. All I can say is they have a great place but they gave it up to move back to O'Fallon and be near the kids and grandkids. Ollie's collection room over his garage is big with half the walls covered with openers and the other half with fishing lures and Indian relics. Ollie had been nice enough to not pack very much for the move so I would have a chance to see it.

Before we started serious opener talk, we were to meet Harriet Waldo and Jeb Burruss for supper. A nice twenty mile drive around the lake and we were at a favorite hang out for Harriet and Jeb (some smoky bar, go figure). Food was good and company was great. We find out at supper that Harriet is selling her place on the lake and moving back to Jefferson City (or Jeff City as the locals call it). Ollie invited both Harriet and Jeb over but it was getting late and they passed. He spent about an hour looking and \$1,500 later he had 35 nice "A"s to add to his collection. By then it was getting close to noon and I told Pat we needed to get back to the hotel. Corkie was last in the car as we made the three hour ride back to the big city. It was hard for me to believe that Ollie and Shirley would give up such a great place, but family comes first.

We arrived back in St. Louis at 4:00. Art Santen was ready to open up the hospitality room but we had to have the hotel clean it up first. Then came the set-up. Anheuser-Bush had been nice enough to donate Bud neck ring badge holders, cups, insulated bottles, reprint litho pictures and 30 cases of beer. What more could you ask for. Wednesday morning I was in a little bit of a panic as the hospitality bathroom door was locked and we were planning on using the bathtub to keep the beer cool. It was not a push button lock and actually required a key which the hotel had no clue where it was. In rode John Mlady to the rescue. He used a credit card and within 30 seconds had the door open. The next day Harold Queen arrived with 5 cases of Yuengling lager and we were set for drinks. Joe and Jackie Young arrived along with Bailey right before supper. They had been a little delayed as Joe scored 2 great can openers and several other nice openers and corkscrews at an antique mall on the way down. Joe was so happy he said he could go home now

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and it would be a great convention.

We had the first of three straight suppers at Ryan's Steakhouse just down the street from the hotel. The cold weather was not letting up and it was not fun taking both dogs (Corkie and Bailey) in bad weather. After supper I let Art look at some of Dave's openers and he made some minor purchases. I spent the evening checking out Dave's openers myself and looking at Joe's nice finds. About every 20 minutes he would show up in the hospitality room with another "on the way down new find". And they say doctors don't get any breaks. Pat did get the laptop computer hooked up the internet with high speed access. Really neat to be sitting in a motel room and surfing the internet. I did not have a lot of time to look and thankfully eBay was pretty slow the week of the convention. Wednesday was the first big day for JFO Convention 25. A local distributor delivered the 30 cases of beer and by late morning we were all set for arrivals. So who comes in first? Cora had me bring in my "special" box. Ollie Hibbeler picked first and Art Santen got to pick from the Budweiser openers next. There were still a lot of great types left and lets just say I spent a lot of money with Cora. Once she opened her room up, it was like a bunch of bees on a hive. Not so much for being crowded but for hands moving very quickly trying to look at everything. Don had left a list of all openers in his collection and each one had a "replacement value". That was the asking price and even though Cora had individual sheets with each case and box, after a while it just easier asking her the price off of the master list. After an initial scan I had picked out about 15 more openers and corkscrews and I settled up with her later in the afternoon. By then openers were scattered everywhere in the room but a lot of smiling faces were seen leaving.

Our room connected straight into the hospitality room and I had set up two tables along the adjoining wall. It was very easy for me to bring Dave's openers out in either

boxes or small display cases. The first question would be "whose openers" followed by "what are the prices"? I would say Dave Lendy and just point at my head as we had discussed some prices for better openers but Dave left it up to me to price the majority of them.

Wednesday afternoon was busy with Cora and myself seeing lots of action as well most of the other rooms. There were some complaints about the two collections being offered for sale slowing down action for everyone else. Most members were just happy to have a shot at getting so many nice openers. I have been to every JFO Convention since 1986 and this was the most I had ever seen available (my first special thanks to Cora and Dave for making this possible). That evening I got into several other rooms and made a few purchases. Mostly I was busy selling in the hospitality room and taking care of Corkie the Yorkie. After 5 days on the road she was starting to get use to road travel and the room noise. Pat was busy behind the scenes getting ID cards ready and making additional runs to the grocery store. As usual during this week it was about midnight when I finally turned in.

Thursday morning was clean up and get the hospitality room ready as Art Santen started the first of 5 house tours. We had two on the registration form but with so much interest and Art wanting to have smaller groups, we ended up with 5 open house tours (3 on Thursday and 2 on Friday). Art liked groups of 6-8 as he does a two hour tour of his nearly 30,000 different opener collection. I just stayed in the hospitality room and kept on selling. I even pulled out some junk box openers (another collection that came out of Arkansas) so as to have a "nice variety": Pat was kind enough to keep me fed for lunches. Ben Hoffman was first up to look at Dave's "C"s and "E"s. He was followed by Verne Vollrath (Ben and Verne looked at them in their rooms) and then I just placed them on the big round table in the hospitality room.

Just about everyone bought something from me. Selling carried on through the evening hours, but I did manage to check out some more rooms and even traded an opener with my favorite eBay competition, Mike Krejci. I had an A-4 Schlitz he wanted and along with a little cash I traded it for a B-31 Blatz. As the night wore on I just kept selling and selling (in the end Dave was real happy) but the more I sold the less of a dent it seem to make in Lendy's collection. I did enter sales on the computer as

we went along. It was nice knowing at any one minute everything that I had sold. It was around 11:30 when we turned in Thursday night (some of the members were still partying next door).

For some reason I was up early Friday morning and had cleaned up the hospitality room when Pat came in with some terrible news. My mother had passed away the night before. It was pretty emotional for me the next couple of hours. I tried to go eat at Bob Evans but would break down crying from time to time. Mom had been the person who had gotten me started collection openers (bringing home a board of wire openers one day and saying this would be something neat to collect). My dad wanted us to leave and come home then but I told him I had a lot of people depending on me and one day would not matter. I told him it would give him more time to set up the funeral and notify family and friends. As word spread to the convention attendees, everyone was very supportive and I can thank you from the bottom of my heart for your words and support.

Art had two more tours to do that morning and early afternoon and before I knew it, it was 1:30 and time to start checking auction consignments. Once again Verne Volarth was our fabulous auctioneer and I helped out by holding up and describing the openers. The auction was held near the pool area and I was told my "southern voice" did not carry well, but as always everyone had a great time. It was more of a chore this year trying to keep members awake as the auction ran close to two hours. About a third of the items were passed on either not meeting reserve or having no interest. Every year I claim I will let only better items in the auction but next year I will want to enforce my own rule and also ask everyone to only offer openers or corkscrews (no general beer items). Many thanks again to Verne for a very entertaining auction (and also to Pat who after a slow start with the computer getting all of the auction results keyed in).

With so many people leaving on Saturday we decided this year to have the group supper Friday night. Just about everyone signed up and the food was very good as we had a choice of strip steak, chicken breast or catfish. If you are special like me the cook would even let you have one of each (I begged hard enough anyway). Service was adequate and I was told later that anyone using a credit card had a hard time paying in the restaurant and ended up having to go the front desk to pay. Lets just say after staying at this Ramada for 6 nights, I found out why the

rate was only \$49 per night. Every morning I had to beg to get ice, get the room cleaned and the trash emptied in the hospitality room. Then Pat and I would spend the afternoon begging to get our room cleaned and to get fresh towels. Many members had the same problems and I apologize. Moral of this story is "you get what you pay for".

Friday night I spent packing up for the Saturday show and started having a blowout sell on some of the junkier stuff I had brought (junkier being mostly non-beer openers). By now most everyone had been through Dave's openers and I was trying to lighten the car up for the trip home (and make room). With the 30 case beer contribution from A-B, we were going to have a lot of beer left over so I took six cases of Budweiser home (that was loaded Friday morning). I was in bed by midnight but up early the next morning.

The first thing I did Saturday morning was to check out the show room set up. Thankfully Art had told the folks how to set it up and by seven we had some early birds (Ollie Hibbeler is always one) getting their tables ready. We had plenty of space (though all of the tables ended up being used), but the transportation to and from the show room required the negotiation of a half flight of stairs. Not easy when you have a bunch of openers for sale. Most everyone had set up and was wheeling and dealing when I finally completed my table at 8:30. The walk-in crowd was pretty sparse but a couple of local breweriana collectors did come and spent some money on openers.

Knowing people wanted to get on the road including Pat and myself, we started the voting and had the display contest over by eleven. As Joe Young said, it was 12 great displays and four in the Bill McKenzie category. The twelve displayers were, Russ Adler, Harriet Waldo, Harold Queen, Art Santen, Sam Marcum, Pat Stambaugh, Jim Osborn, Ben Hoffman, John Stanley, Bob Stahly, Bill Arber and Mike Krejci. In the Bill McKenzie category, Harold Queen, John Stanley, and Jim Osborn had entries. It is always great when members take the time to share their collections. Winners of the main display contest first place, Sam Marcum for his "Missouri Show Me Openers", second place, Russ Adler for his "George Walter Brewing Co/Adler Brau Breweriana" and third place was won by Mike Krejci for his "Schlitz Breweriana" display.

The "Bill McKenzie Best of Show" was won by your

editor again. When Art Santen said he had real nice displays made up, I figured this would be my best chance. I brought my P-30-4 A-B barmount corkscrew shown on the front page of the January issue. Several members asked me for next year to have a better reminder for this award as most everyone forgot that all you have to do is bring one of your "favorite" openers to enter this contest. Once again thank you to everyone who entered a display and its never too early to start thinking about next year's display.

The show was winding down fast and by noon many members were packing to leave. The St. Louis Dispatch did send a photographer and later a reporter to cover the show. I did announce that next year's convention would be in San Francisco and I forgot to thank Art Santen for the wonderful job he did hosting the 25th Convention. Word did get out that we were running short on covering convention expenses and Herb Danziger's wonderful wife, Camille, begged for a contribution from each atten-

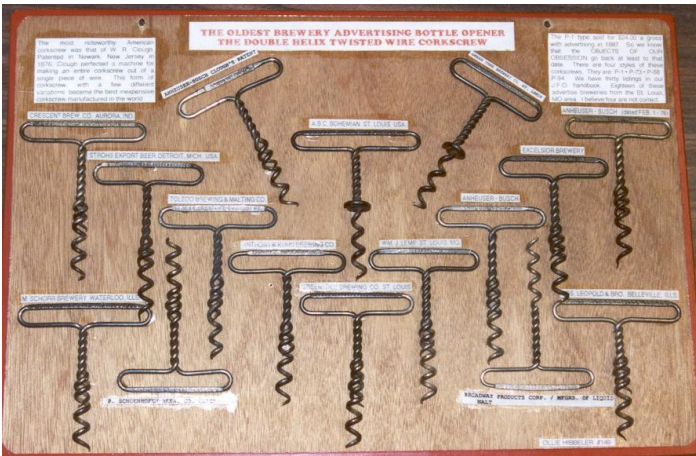

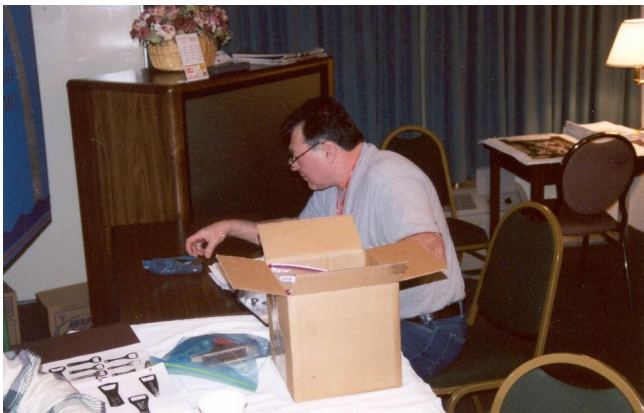

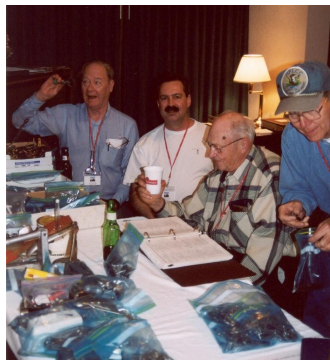

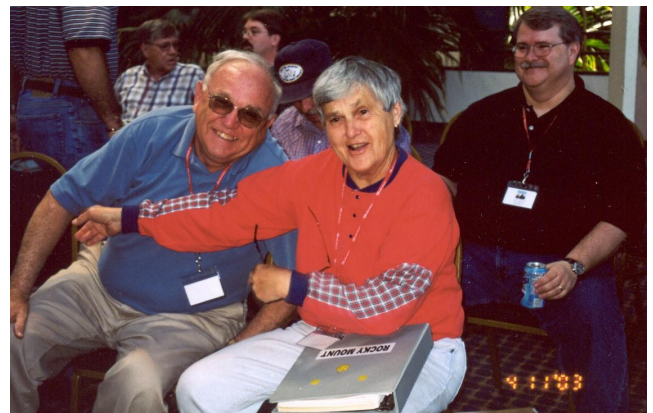

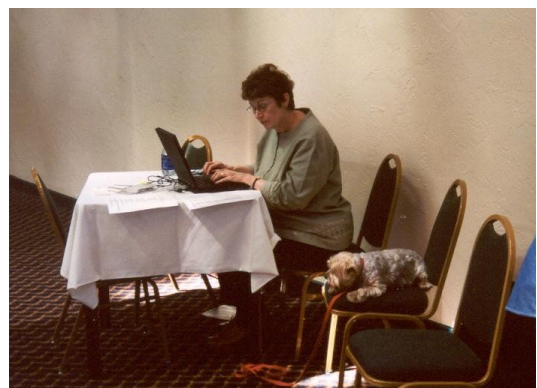

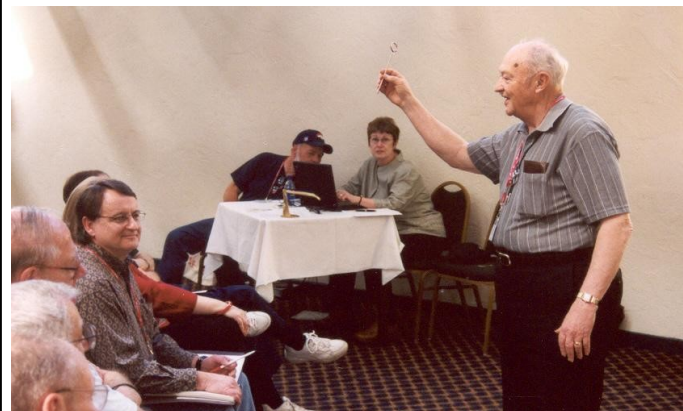

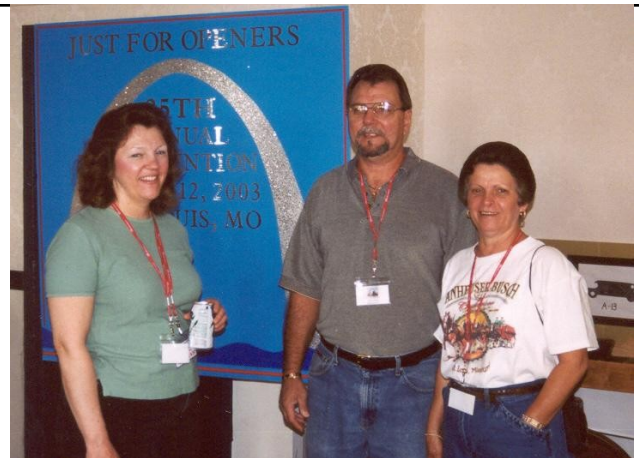

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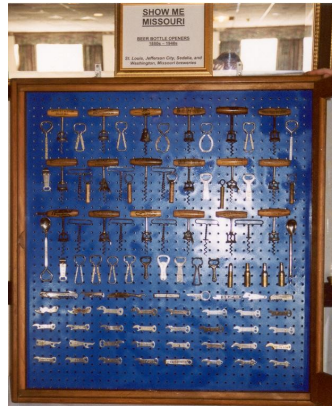

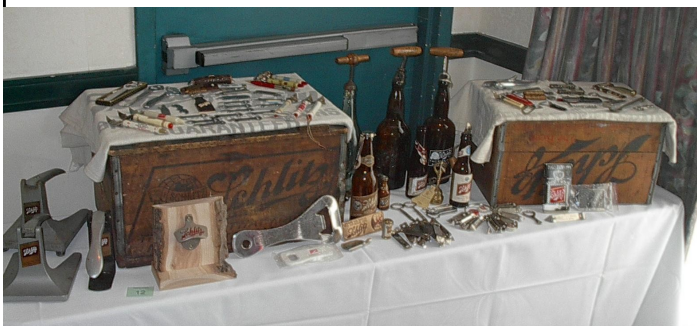

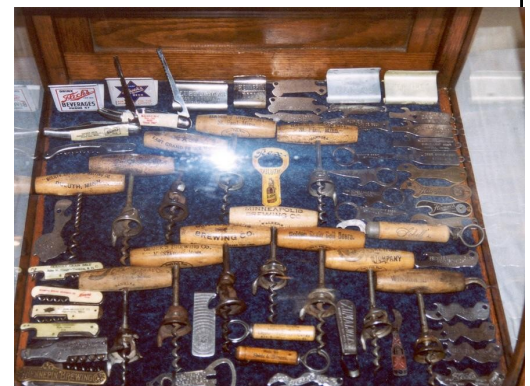

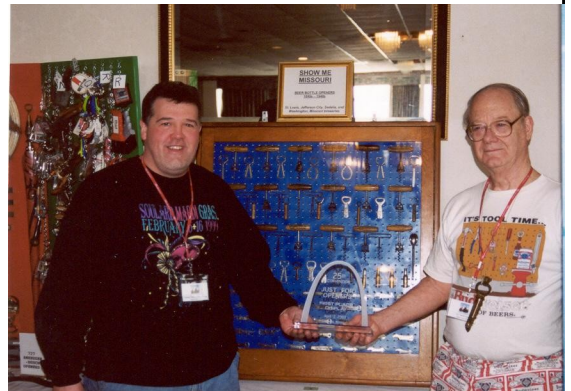

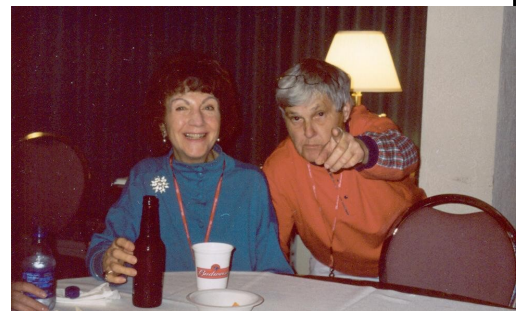

“Opener and eBay Trivia”

The past quarter definitely had it ups and downs on eBay. There seemed to be several good openers on at one time or streaks where hardly anything good was being offered for sale. Ebay has raised its fees and maybe we are seeing a small percentage of dealers and sellers going back to traditional markets (shows and malls).

The “A” types were highlighted by the first offering I have seen of an A-9-8 Eureka being offered for sale. Ed Kaye has chased one for years with no luck, so I bid real high and got beat (went for \$149.49). Being a Pennsylvania baseball player you would figure more would turn up, but maybe next time. Non-Beer A-13 cars were plentiful and yes Harold Queen officially has over 100 different ones and gets strong competition on almost everyone. Several Coca-Cola figurals were offered and the only real surprise in prices were the A-9 fake baseball player bringing \$128.50 and an A-15 eagle head bringing \$281.00. The A-9 I could understand someone being suckered in but the A-15 was average condition and at least one other A-15 was offered for sale this quarter bringing much less. I also chased after the A-33-6 Fauerbach but was blown away by a real serious Fauerbach collector. In my collection is a very worn one but the one on eBay was real nice. If you watch the eBay auction results you can certainly get a good feel for openers that are really not that tough to find as we once thought such as the A-29 Pepsi-Cola.

“B”s saw several nice examples offered. A very tough B-2 Interboro in rough condition brought some spirited bidding before finishing at \$177.59. I know of one other B-2-45 and it is Mark Barren’s collection. The nicest to date B-2 Coca-Cola (steel) was offered and brought a good price at \$223.50. The steel B-2 Coca-Cola is much harder to find than the brass opener and it is very hard to find in nice condition. A wide variety of B-18 thru B-22 openers were offered and the best being a B-22-68 Montgomery. I bid my usual \$133.99 and finished third with Pat Stambaugh taking home the prize at \$157.50. The only “B” in this line that I am trying to get all of them is the “B-22” style. I have over 80 and need over 50 more. My luck will hopefully be better if another Montgomery ever comes on the market. Jim Osborn got a great buy on a B-2-20 Acme for \$31.00. It is a tough B-2 to find in beer and yes Jim, I forgot to bid (by the time the October issue comes out I will have turned 50). The final “B” highlight was the B-23 Spinner for Dr. Pepper from Oklahoma City Okla. It seems like all of the serious

Dr. Pepper collectors were on this one and the final price of \$222.25 proved this was true.

Nothing unusual in “C”s was offered with the only one of real note being a C-13-UL Silver Bar from Florida and bringing a high price at \$49.00 (it was really in rough condition). There have been several D-1-39 Strohs / Detroit offered in the six years I have been on eBay and most have brought not good but great prices. I thought \$51.00 was high for one and that price paled in comparison to the other two with each one going for over \$100.00. Someone got a steal on the D-7-2 Schoenhofen at \$14.01.

A lot of nice wires were sold this quarter on eBay and one of the nicest was a E-3-UL Texas bought by Jeb Burruss for \$58.78. It was mint and out of a salesman sample kit. My favorite was an E-4-UL Hygeia I bought for \$88.87 (in great condition also). My apologies to Larry Moter (“King of Wires”) as he was second place on both the E-3 and E-4. Some tough “E-14”s were sold with the big-boy being the Schutz & Hilgers at \$89.99. I was runner-up but Pat Stambaugh sold me an extra he had for \$50.00. It was the first time I have had a chance to get one. For members who do not know, “Oyster” advertising wires (and most are E-15s) are desirable though the usual price range is \$10-25. Two good “E-17”s were sold and we finally have a serious Canadian opener buyer as he beat me out on the E-16 Berlin Lion (I like E-16s any and all). His eBay handle is Cam.Mac and he went high this past quarter on several Canadian beer openers (and they were all tough ones).

The “F”s were highlighted by some good soda ones but nothing real unusual. I did not spot any really good FBOC openers and only list a couple of prices in passing. In the “G”s and “H”s two boxes of the same opener were offered. The first was a box of G-4 Barq soda openers. A fairly common opener before and with 144 more found they will probably flood the market. The other unusual small hoard was the H-3-48 Koenig. I have only had one chance to buy before and it is in my collection. Someone was lucky enough to find at least five and the last sold only brought the opening bid of \$9.99. It went from fairly rare to somewhat hard to find. The H-2 Dr. Pepper was the first one offered in a couple of years and brought a fair price \$109.11 (the first one offered on eBay a few years back brought \$275.00).

“Opener and eBay Trivia”

A dealer in Iowa did offer two different “I”s made from the “Ro-Loc” process. These are very hard to find and especially hard to find in nice condition. I listed just a few of the “K” type results as many were offered but few were in nice condition. One very desirable L-2 was offered from the Home Brewing Co. in St. Louis and it does reside in Durham, NC at the present time. It is only the second one I have heard of with the other being in Norm Jay’s collection. Good “L-4”s were few and far between this quarter.

As usual a lot of “M-3” sliders were offered but most were the common ones with two nice Senate sliders both bringing close \$200.00 each. The bottomless pit known as the home of “M-19” Coca-Cola “Fake” brass openers saw these being offered by two different sellers and the price ranging from \$20 to \$150. Go figure how a common fake can keep generating so much interest. The supply seems to be endless. Mike Krejci ran me off the road on the M-89 Budweiser as I had the sister one to this without the anniversary dates on it.

In my wildest dreams \$100.00 would buy the somewhat common N-4 Haberle any day of the week. Twice this quarter I would have been short. Both offered were very nice but neither really mint and that what it take to get a \$100 bid normally. A couple of sellers had to be very happy. The N-5 Coca-Cola knife was the first one of these I have seen offered for sale (anywhere) and the only one of these I had seen before was in Thom Thompson’s collection. Though I did not show it, an N-6 Lembeck & Betz just sold for \$180.00 with well used blades and the an excellent condition one sold two months ago for \$57.66. Same comparison for the N-46 Hamms money clip with the spread being \$30.00 for one and \$100.00 for another. Two very good but not great condition N-54s were on the market and both brought very generous prices. Another tough Coca-Cola knife (N-517) brought a good but not great price at \$229.50.

Wall mounts for this quarter can be summed up by saying some fairly tough ones but no high dollar ones were sold. As is the usual case the Starr X wall mounts continually see good numbers offered for sale but most are common and even the ones considered rare are for the most part hard to find but not impossible.

The “P” beer corkscrews had many nice examples offered including the P-5 C. Conrad Budweiser, a nice P-5-UL

Riedel from Wisconsin, and the usual good numbers of nice A-B knives and many not so nice A-B knives. This market never seems to let up even for the off-grade knives. The tough to find P-514 Coca-Cola had the small blade broken and still brought \$255.00, a tribute to its scarcity.

General corkscrews saw a nice quarter with some very rare examples offered for sale highlighted by an English Roper 1885 Patent bringing \$10,300.00. The happy Canadian seller had a starting price of \$9.99 and I am sure they are still celebrating. Many good U. S. patents were offered and all one needed was a fat checkbook. God bless the serious corkscrew collector. A couple of hard to find can openers were even included in the results as a tribute to “Mr. Can Opener”, Joe Young.

Just a side note to the Starr X collectors. One seller on eBay has a site that lists all Starr X openers, with a “Value Guide” and rarity guide. The site <http://openersworth.com>.
