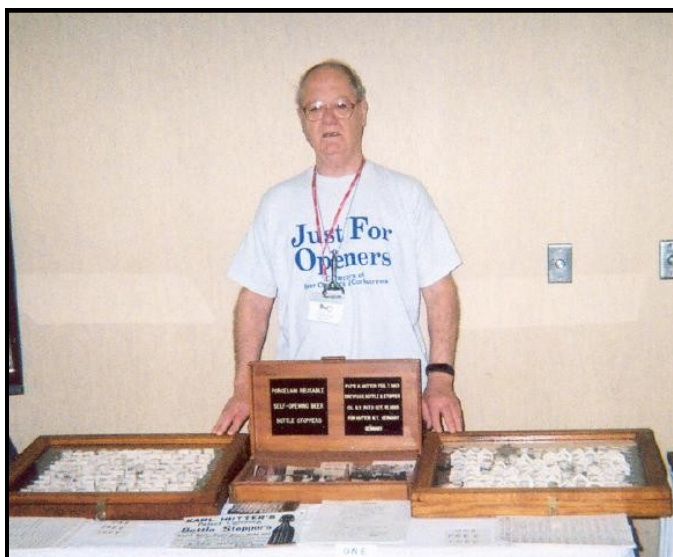

**Art Santen is the New "Guinness World Records" Holder  
for Largest Collection of Bottle Openers (32,411)**

Art Santen is the new "Guinness World Records" holder of the largest collection of bottle openers at 32,411. Art replaces former JFO member, Dale Deckert, who held the previous record at 20,884 set in 1998. Art started collecting in 1966 and I can only figure that a day does not go by that Art doesn't buy an opener in one form or the other to add to his collection. With my collection I have the 2,411 covered but need to get 30,000 more (non-duplicate) to match Art's collection. Congratulations Art and as always he has been a great ambassador for the opener hobby. Art's record was official on May 19, 2005. If anyone would like to challenge this record good luck. ### Hootch Owl Corkscrew by Donald Bull

Richard Smythe was issued two U. S. patents for the Hootch Owl corkscrew. The first was Design Patent Number 98,968 of March 17, 1936 and the second was Mechanical Patent Number 2,115,289 issued April 26, 1938. The Hootch owl was produced with both wire worms and web helixi. Although a variety of "owl" type double levers from England, Spain and Portugal turn up for sale, none is as desirable as the Hootch Owl.

In the April issue, John wrote in his eBay Trivia column "...and the top seller was a 'Hootch Owl' bringing in \$3,253.00 (seems like I traded Mr. Bull one a few years back for \$800.00 worth of beer openers, at least it found a good home)."

Now, John, of course you know those \$800.00 worth of beer openers are worth a small fortune today!

Yes, I sold a Hootch Owl on eBay for \$3,253.00 but it wasn't that one I got in that infamous trade that took the heart out of my opener collection (bring on the smiley face!). Don't fear, John, the Stanley Hootch Owl still resides in my collection.

And what about the one I sold? Well, I bought that one last year for \$400.00. A much better deal than \$800.00 worth of beer openers, right?

**27th Annual Just For Openers Convention April 13-16 2005 by Ollie Hibbeler #149**

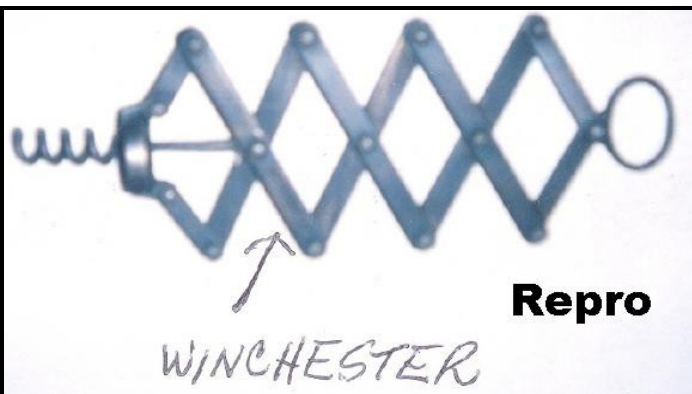

**27th Annual Just For Openers Convention April 13-16 2005 by John Stanley**

We were suppose to leave Saturday morning but it quickly became Sunday morning as the Stanleys had way too much to do to get ready for Omaha. Finally at 10:00 the Ford Expedition headed towards Omaha with lots of openers and we even had several boxes of openers and breweriana to bring along for Larry Moter. The first day we stopped in Knoxville to see Pat's sister and seven month old nephew. He really took to the old red head and of course was the sweetest baby while we were there. That night we made Nashville and stayed at the Holiday Inn Select (site of next year's convention). Final arrangements were made and JFO #28 is all set.

Day two we left Nashville and arrived in St. Louis at 4:30 PM to stay with the Hibbelers. Ollie and Shirley have been in their new villa for two years and he finally had enough room to display almost all of his collections (fishing lures, Indian relics, Dental collectibles and of course openers). They are great hosts and we had a grand time. Ollie and I did manage to work out a couple of trades and spent most of the time talking openers and seeing everything he had displayed. He got a wire corkscrew for his collection and an L-2-15 Bud/Schlitz while I got a B-72-1 Bud and some miscellaneous other openers. The convention was off to a great start.

The next morning, Tuesday, it was time to head to Omaha. We were on the road by 10 AM and it was close to 5PM by the time we arrived. A few JFOers were already there including John Mlady (Host), Gary Deachman, Art Santen, Pat Stambaugh and Mike Krejci. It took me three hotel cart loads to get everything in our room. John Mlady had done a great job in selecting the hotel. Every room was a two room suite with the outer sitting room having a small kitchen with a full size refrigerator. I brought along a lot of openers for sale so actually ended up getting a five foot table from the hotel to display everything on. The sitting room became the opener room and Pat had the back bedroom all to herself. Corkie had either of the two rooms she wanted.

The members in attendance went out for supper and afterwards I started selling as I had orders to bring home a lighter load (these orders were passed along to Mr. Moter who in the end seemed to have more heading back than was brought out, oh well). Mike Krejci bought a C-3-1 Schlitz opener and my big sale was a B-2-1 Blatz (steel) to Gary Deachman for \$60. It was getting late and he said I want that opener and so I sold it to him. He proceeded to pay me \$60 and then asked a few minutes later

if he had paid me. I said no and charged him \$50 the second time. With John Mlady as a witness I refunded Gary the \$50 as he had been into "the medicine" a little heavy. The rest of night was spent swapping plastic with Art and Mike (one of the real joys of opener collecting).

The next morning at breakfast, Gary jumps me and wants his money back on the B-2. Nice little old John Mlady convinced Gary that he had paid me a \$110. Gary had gotten up early and even though John was still asleep yelled at him, "where did this opener come from that was on his table, its not mine". Since Gary woke up John to ask him the question, John said he couldn't resist telling Gary that he had paid \$110 for it. So I spent most of breakfast convincing Gary that it was only \$60 and even though he thought now that he had one in his collection that he also probably needed an upgrade as this was in nice condition. After lunch I finally got a table and was able to spread out all of my small plastics containers full of "rare" openers. Members started arriving after lunch. Sandra Emme bought several corkscrews with most being beer or miscellaneous liquor ad ones. Several JFO members spent a lot of time going through my many bags of beer and soda openers. The poundage was slowly going down. Most everyone had a sixth or fifth floor room, so moving around from room to room was very easy except there was no easy stair access between five and six so you always had to use an elevator. A side note for Wednesday was the fact with everyone having a nice two room suite, the hospitality room saw little use as everyone's front sitting room allowed 8 to 10 people to easily mingle.

Corkie and Pat were adjusting well to hotel life and about Wednesday evening about half of the attendees had checked in. We had a nice supper with Bob and Marge Stahly at "Drover's", the local steakhouse a quarter mile from the hotel. This would be my lunch and supper location for the rest of the convention except for the group meal Friday night and they were closed for lunch on Saturday. I will add that "wheeling and dealing" went late into the night Wednesday. Being near John Mlady and Gary's room helped to get a lot traffic flow at our end of the floor.

Thursday morning I spent trying to organize my openers a little better as this would be the busiest day for selling. With pretty much everyone else arriving there would be

This time she loped slowly towards her, got to John and Gary's doorway, made a turn into their room and headed into their kitchen. One of the high points on Wednesday was the arrival of Norm and Judy Jay. Norm simply looked great considering his major surgery he had back in January. Thursday was the biggest dealing day as the rest of the new arrivals showed up. Everyone thought Santa Claus had arrived when Ben Hoffman checked in. He had brought a lot of nice openers and made a lot of collectors happy including your editor who got a C-1 Liberty from him. We officially had 30 members in attendance and just about everyone had their rooms open for business at one time or another on this day. My "poundage" really went down on Thursday, between a lot of sales and my donating the rest of Dave Lendy's and Jerry Schele's "T"s and "J"s to Ben Hoffman. There were probably about 600 openers between the two piles.

On a side note the day before Ben stopped in an Antique Mall in Amana, Iowa and got a great wood handle corkscrew from South Omaha Brewing (P-51-41) in nice condition for \$15.00 (he ended up trading it to John Mlady). Ben said when you walked through the front door it was laying right in the middle of a big showcase. The mall is only 20 minutes from Scott Williams house and he checks it fairly regularly and amazingly Norm Jay had been in the mall the day before Ben and didn't spot the corkscrew. The "Opener Gods" were looking out for Ben.

It was double meal day at Drover's (always a 13oz. N. Y. Strip) as Pat and I had an early supper with Ben and Cornelia. I must add the about mid-afternoon I heard a familiar laugh from the Hospitality Room, Cora Whelan was visiting and most of the JFO wives were in there having a lot laughs. By the end of the day I had worked out the trade with Ben Hoffman on the C-1 Liberty (I think half of my good openers went back to PA), a "big trade" with Norm Jay, and a trade with Jim Osborn. So readers will know, many folks have asked me not to discuss trade details so I will have to be sketchy on what actually transpired. Lets say I got an A-B knife from Norm Jay and a nice P-18 Blatz from Jim. Once again everyone grabbed my good openers in exchange, but then what are friends for. Corkie continued to be a good watch dog and Pat just loved having her own room to sit in. Thursday night was the usual 11:00 turn in. The only problem with the hotel was that the air conditioning was not the best and the local weather had been getting a little warmer each day and it was hard to get the room very cool especially for sleeping. At least the openers did not start rusting.

Friday morning I spent a little time on eBay just looking at new items. Most of my time was spent reorganizing the bags of openers trying to combine and get things ready for the Saturday show. A bus tour was planned for Friday afternoon to John Mlady's house to see his collection, then a trip downtown to a brew pub, and finally a stop at the Crescent Moon Bar for supper. The Crescent Moon is owned by Bill Baburek who had graciously provided keg beer at cost and all of the equipment to use the keg. There was some room-to-room action that morning but most everyone was getting ready for the bus tour. Just about everyone rode the bus except for the Jays, Hanolds and Pat Stanley. It was a great day to do this, sunny and not too warm. It was about a 20 minute ride to John Mlady's house.

Now John is a serious Nebraska Breweriana collector (as well as any Falstaff Breweriana). The top story of his house has two rooms both dedicated to his collection. With space being a little limited, we went up in groups of

Herb Danziger did get a Fez Hat figural corkscrew and Pat turned up a couple of Minnesota advertising items (a letter opener and a tin). Several members wanted an auction and with Verne not being able to attend that left Gray Deachman and me to run the auction.

Before everyone got off of the bus we told them to the auction would be at 8PM in the same room as the Saturday show. I have been to a lot of JFO Conventions and beer shows in general and this is the first time I have had the show room on the same floor as my sleeping room in a multi-story hotel. This arrangement was great and since the hotel already had the room set up for Saturday, we just borrowed the room for a short meeting.

Only 10 items were checked in so it was a nice short and sweet auction. At least I thought that since we had Pat doing the recording, closely watched by Corkie. Gary was to be the auctioneer and I was the helper. Later on, I find out someone named Larry Moter had slipped Gary a

little pre-auction "medicine". Anyway things went pretty well except for that darn P-3-1 Blatz Hollweg corkscrew. It was in great shape and Gary and I tried to keep up with bids but twice we had the wrong bidder as the high bidder and we must add that Jeb Burruss was getting a little frustrated with our inability to run a "smooth" auction. Gary as usual said everything was "dynamite!". Usually Gary is wrong but in the case of the P-3 he was right. We ended up with over 50 walk-thrus and as usual the show went pretty strong until about 11PM and tailed off quickly the last couple of hours. In the 10:30 to 11:00 time frame we gave out the display awards. Jeb Burruss won first place in the regular display contest for his great looking "A-1" display, Mike Krejci won second place for his Wisconsin display and Ollie Hibbeler won third place for his wire corkscrew display. Jim Osborn won the "The Bill McKenzie Best of Show Award" for his B-45-1 Lemp Beer opener/corkscrew.

Most members seemed to do a lot of selling and trading

in the early hours of the show. By noon many members were packing up to head home. The convention was winding down and we ended up with about ten members staying Saturday night. That evening we socialized until 9:00 and turned in early as Pat, Corkie and I had a long drive ahead of us the next day (it was 20 hours driving for us from Durham to

Omaha). Of course my intentions of getting on the road early went by the wayside as Miss Pat had to have some beauty rest. We finally left Omaha at 9:30 the next morning and Pat was forgiven as she drove that night until 1:30AM in the morning. We made it all the way from Omaha to near Ashland, Ky (15 hours of driving). The next day it took us about 5 and a half driving to finally get home. It was another hour unloading the car and yes it was much lighter coming home than going out. Thanks to everyone who attended and hopefully next year, last minute cancellations will be able to attend (Verne and LaVerne Vollarth, Joe and Jackie Young, Kurt and Debbie Bachmann). Another great convention has come and past. Thank you very much John Mlady for making it so successful. Everyone please plan to attend JFO #28 in Nashville. As Ollie Hibbeler always says, "BE THERE!".

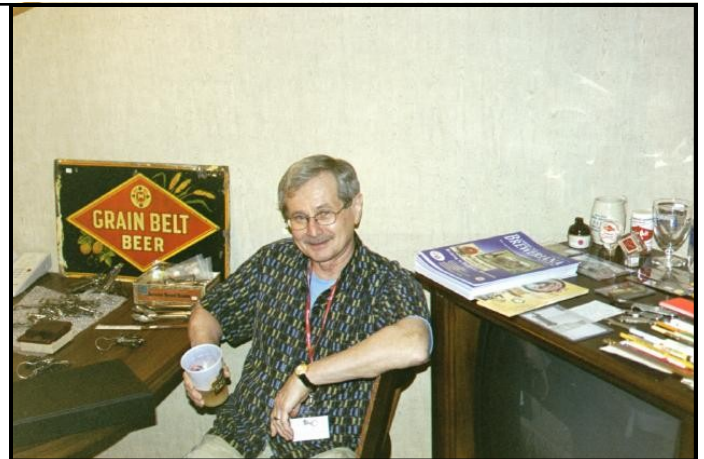

**Hopped-Up Happenings at the Dog-Gone-Good Super WinterSwap 16!!! By Kurt Bachmann (1)**

After being alerted to this show on more than a couple of occasions, I couldn't help but be naturally pumped up for this show. Collecting breweriana is definitely an all season activity and how could anything be better. Michigan wild game hunting was getting thin and the ice fishing a little suspect, the freezer is full, so as the Mid-Michigan Chapter of the BCCA exclaims "Foam Matters". I was first alerted to this show by the flyer for a "Beer Advertising Show!" depicting a photo on the cover of a pre-pro brewery team sitting around a wooden keg. I don't think they were exactly familiar with the concept of working as a team. Back in the day that concept was reserved for baseball. They didn't appear to be smiling, but they did seem as happy as an opossum eating spent malt. When I saw the ad in "The Auction Exchange and Collectors News", a local publication that has recently gone the way of the big boys and is published by AntiqueWeek. It was listed in the classified section under shows and said Beer Advertising, Buy-sell-trade Show, had the date, place and time and site for more info as [www.MI-brew.com](http://www.MI-brew.com).

This just happens to be the site of the infamous fellow member Gary Bauer. It has been my long standing belief that while I am working on natural home remedies to create magnetic pulls, Gary has invented some type of industrial strength super magno that can locate and confuse enough electrons until every Michigan bottle opener is sucked into his cache. Lucky for me he always seems to have enough spares to offer, that I can trade for openers I don't have. When I saw the show described in the "Michigan Beer Guide" under worthy breweriana events there was no further question that it was a must attend show.

Super Winter Swap 16 was described as "If you love brewery history or collect brewing/beer memorabilia, you wouldn't want to miss Super Winter Swap 16. Michigan's Dog Gone Good Chapter of the National Association of Breweriana Advertising will be hosting this event. It will be a festive occasion celebrating Michigan's legendary brewing history." (Now that was an understatement.) "During Super Winter Swap 16 you can browse through tables full of glasses, bottles, cans, trays, and lithographs of breweries gone-by. Remember names like E&B, Frankenmuth, Goebel, Stroh, Sebewaing, and many more.

Brewery Collectables Show in a Brewery!" (If that description doesn't get the blood flowing of every American breweriana collector, well it would take too long to describe.) It went on to say, "Enjoy a fantastic atmosphere for a breweriana show. Mountain Town Station has been in operation since 1996 in a rebuilt Ann Arbor railroad Station. To accent the railroad décor, there is a large collection of vintage breweriana and other advertising gracing the walls and shelves. Craft brewed beer will be available along with free brewery tours. (<http://www.mountaintown.com>)

I always take items I think are sought after and really cool to the show, but always manage to come home with more than I could sell or trade for. That really eases the pain of trading something. Lord knows how I hate to part with anything. Many say it's the thrill of the hunt, but what if you don't have doubles? Should you go without or hoard every example? The flip side is that when you sell or trade a piece to a real collector, seeing them flush with color, skin with goose bumps and a smile from ear to ear makes it all worthwhile. This is what adds great joy and puts you at peace when you trade a great example on to a real collector.

The directions to the show included a map and written directions from every compass point. Everything except the train schedule. Since the show is located in the Northern section of mid-Michigan, a check of the weather activity was definitely in order, and to everyone's delight there was a lull in the snow action that made for smooth sailing for the trek to the show. We decided to wait until Saturday morning to make the trip. Up at our normal waking time, 4:00 AM, brewed some coffee, loaded some last minute items into the ride and off we went. It is about a 2 ½ hour trip for us, so we wanted to have plenty of time to stop and pick up our son and make it to the show. The weather was perfect and the excitement of the show made traveling in the darkness a pleasure as we arrived just as the sun was coming up full blast over the horizon in Mt. Pleasant. We stopped to pick up our son who stays just Southwest of town while he finishes up his last year of school. We had time to take out our buddy, Blake, our sons chocolate Lab, and watch him flush out a few ring-necks that were hunkered down in the deep base of snow. Off to the show we went. We quite often have brought all of our children to trade shows during their entire life and they actually like to go and do this with the "old people", mom and dad. This is another testament to the fine comradeship and family environment that is present along

with the brotherhood of fellow collectors. A chance for a poor college kid to have free beer and good food might have been a draw. (Sponsored by Mom and Dad) Although he has developed quite an affection for advertising depicting hunting scenes, which he plans on acquiring after he graduates and starts making the big bucks.

Hats off to Mountain Town Station who let the club use almost 75% of their available space for the club to host this fantastic event. Special pricing on beer and great food helped to make this a dream come true for chapter members and a pure delight for walk in participants.

As is the par for most of this chapters functions, there was a vast array of hard to find and sought after items. Walking into a variable museum of trade breweriana and brewery history could not accurately describe this event. The "Raiders of the Lost Ark" would have been jealous to find items of such importance to the history of brewing in Michigan. Only being open for four hours makes this a relatively short show, but the vibrant excitement that fills the air, hangs over the gathering, which is only muffled by the cheers and occasional roars of sustained laughter that beams from the rafters of the historic architectural building.

One of the highlights of the show for me was a Blue Ribbon liquid malt can that Fred Clinton had on display. This brought back vivid memories as this was the first type of malt that I used to brew my first batch of beer. I used a recipe I read in the Mother Earth News in the Spring of 1978. When I went to the elevator in Armada to get the malt, the gentleman behind the counter told me it was the best malt money could buy and that my cows would love it. When I told him I wasn't going to put it on my feed, I was going to make beer with it, he said I would like it too. The first ribbon I ever won at the Michigan State Fair was for beer.

The show stopper and best of show for me was a pre-pro etched glass from the Tivoli Brewing Co Detroit Mich. Altes Lager "The beer in the green bottle" that I acquired from Stan Summers. Stan gave me a \$25 discount if in turn I agreed to buy him a beer. My son and I helped Jim Kaiser and Stan load up there exhibits into the car and decided to have a quick lunch afterwards. Kaiser was showing the strength and exuberance of a man half his age and refused the helping hand. Summers had so many show stopping items on display that we forced our help on him. On the way back in we noticed Mark Brooks

packing up so we helped him load up and talked him into having lunch with us. While we were outside Stan, being the consummate ladies man, had corralled my wife Debbie over to a table large enough that we could all be seated and we joined them for a fantastic time lead by some spirited conversation. Gary Bauer had slipped us a map to the afterglow party at his place and I asked Kaiser and Summers if they were going. Stan said they had been there the night before and were going to head home. Once again I learned a quick lesson in collecting, "The early bird gets the worm". If I had a nickel for every time I have seen a chapter or club member coming out of a show, antique store or extravaganza while I was on my way in, I'd be rich. Note: If you get there at daybreak, you will find someone who got there the night before.

After lunch we headed over to Gary Bauer's place for the afterglow party. I had never taken the time to go to Bauer's even though we have talked in the past about another passion of both of ours, home brewing. I knew it was going to be a special time when on the way to Gary's my son spotted a Bald Eagle perched in a tree along the road. We couldn't believe our eyes. That is one of the things you hear about but never witness for yourself. We backed up to sit and stare at this marvelous creature. He moved his head from side to side, as to let us know that he knew we were there, but never moved from the limb he was on. That was only the beginning of what was to come. Gary has an awesome collection of Michigan breweriana mostly dating to pre-pro. If you missed the afterglow party, you missed what would have to be one of the highlights of your life. I did manage to steal some conversation from Gary. I mentioned to him that the only other display of bottles that I've seen that came close to his was that of Rex Halfpenny. The main difference being that Rex drank the contents of every bottle in his collection and Gary's are pre-pro. Most of these had been consumed before the Mid-Michigan Chapter taste test. Gary stated that he had seen Rex's collection at a Christmas party in the late 90's. He described a couple of gentlemen that were there with some Belgium beer and that they were opening a brewery called Dragonmead. That was when we figured out we had both been at the same party but didn't know each other.

Then, as if I hadn't had enough excitement for one day, Gary invited me to taste an Imperial Stout and a Barley Wine he made that had been aging. Mellowed to perfection in no way could explain the fineness and absolute pleasure it was to sample both of these beers. Either of

## “Opener and eBay Trivia”

From the last issue, see Don Bull's response on the “Hootch-Owl” deal we made several years ago on an earlier page in this issue. There were no responses on the origin of the B-14 Virginia Brewing Co. opener shown in the last issue. For now I will pretend it is from Roanoke, Va. No questions were sent in for this issue so I will move on to my eBay analysis.

Another nice quarter for openers and corkscrews but I did notice the number of results I am reporting are down about 15-20 from the last issue. Still eBay is going strong and leading off with the “A”s, your editor lost a battle for an A-2-UL Budweiser and F & S to Jim Osborn. The only official A-2 U. S. beer opener we had listed was from “Elder's Good Beer” but is most likely a distributor. So the A-2 sold on eBay was the first “official” U. S. beer known on this style. Jim had to pay at \$169.49 but was a very happy buyer. A real Coca-Cola sword A-12 did sell for \$87.61 but the repros have certainly hurt this one as at one time this was a strong \$200.00 opener. The second A-20 Coca-Cola from Bellingham WA that I have seen on eBay went very high at \$264.77. John Cartwright can't seem to buy a break when this one appears on eBay as he lost out again. I did have to chuckle about the two A-29-65 Widman openers as they were on at the same time and the nicer condition one sold for less than half of the one in worse condition. You just never know. JFO member Dick Friedman who has become a very serious Coca-Cola collector bought his third A-35 Coca-Cola leg opener from Washington IN. It was not listed in the JFO Soda book and Dick has bought all three that have been on eBay (trade bait??). For the most part this quarter a normal nice selection of “A”s with some very good ones being sold but not a lot of really good openers being offered. Each quarter seems to have a lot of repeats such as the A-9 Schells baseball player.

The “B”s were highlighted by Bill Arber adding a nice B-2-45 Interboro at \$88.99 to his collection as he keeps closing in on finishing all known B-2s (he still needs 10 good ones). I beat out the “Pennsylvania Gang” (Ben and Harold) for the B-5-UL Howell & King at \$57.56. Sometimes when I sell on eBay, I do not check to see if I sell one I actually need for my collection as was the case with the B-12-2 Gold Top. It bought by an Italian collector. A lot of nice “standard” “B” keys were sold this quarter and Craig Green really wanted the B-18-637 North Pacific at \$155.38 (there were five other common “B”s in the lot). Mike Krejci got three of the four B-18, B-19 and B-21 ULs since he has gotten a passion for UL openers. He

did get a flat tire going up against Jeb Burruss for the B-24-2 Auto City. Jeb is closing in on the known B-24s and is down to needing 10 of those. Then we get to the B-23 Coca-Cola from Pacific Bottling Works and yes just like the A-20 Coca-Cola, Dick Friedman beat out John Cartwright at \$264.77. Graig Green wanted an upgrade on his B-72-2 Spokane and got a nice opener for \$139.49. Finally a style not in the JFO Soda book, a Vaughan Unique, marked with Coca-Cola brought 262.00. I will add that about 10-15 of the “B” openers listed saw your editor either finish second or third and on eBay there aint no consolation prize. Oh well hopefully all of those openers I lost out on found some good homes.

Not much in the way of good “C” and “D” types. Bill Arber did fill another hole in his collection with the addition of the C-1-5 Schreiber at \$102.50. The C-17 Newfoundland Brewery opener from Canada shows how that market has really changed on eBay the last 2 to 3 years. Early on I could get pretty any nice Canadian opener for a reasonable if not cheap price every time. Recent years has seen some very serious Canadian collectors enter the market and now I am very lucky to get anything at any price. The D-1-9 Strohs had not sold in quiet a while and realized a high price at \$66.01 as the demand is always high for this opener from Detroit (the sister one to this, a D-1-39 Strohs, always does well also).

Wire openers, “E” types, saw some good examples but nothing too exciting except for the E-32-1 Wehle and I guess Ed Johnson needed to fill that spot in his collection as he paid \$67.97. It is only the third example of this opener I have seen. “F”s were fairly slow also except I did fill two slots in my collection with the F-6-86 Ackemann (it was mint condition, one of those rare times the seller description was on the money) and the F-38-1 Gutsch (though I paid dearly for this one). The best buy in this area was by Jeb Burruss on a nice condition F-2-UL advertising “Budweiser & Jax” at \$12.27.

Figural Bottle Openers (FBOC) were in short supply for good ones and as always lots of the common ones were available. The cast iron figural market has really been slow on eBay but like a lot of areas of opener collecting it comes and goes in cycles. I am sure when some “new blood” enters this market things will pick up. “G”s and “H”s saw some good examples offered but then I was chuckling again as an H-2-67 Hornung sold for \$43.50 and then a couple of weeks later, one sells for \$6.50. Something closer to \$6.50 is a truer value. One good “I-

7” sold but I did not realize it was this good as an I-7-40 Stroudsburg brought \$75.99 (Todd Milano has created a monster called “I-7 Hysteria”). We even added a “J” result as Ben Hoffman sold a nice J-8-10 Hudepohl for \$11.01.

“K” types or barmounts saw lots of activity in the K-2s (as usual) but also several very nice examples of “K” were sold this past quarter. Joe Young sold a K-12-1 Lone Star in great shape for \$570.00 (condition was key) and believe or not has another great example of the K-12-1 that he is offering for “trade bait” (see photo). Only the second K-2-9 Lone Star I have seen was sold for \$255.00. A nice K-6-1 Pearl sold to Richard Poeth for \$152.01. I believe Richard is down to needing a K-10 to complete his “K” type collection. “L” types saw limited action with few results listed. Please note for you new collectors that the L-2 A-B bottle corkscrews are very plentiful and there are always examples being offered on eBay. Prices run from \$20-\$50 depending on condition.

“M” types saw many sliders offered as usual but only one good M-3, a Deer Park (#40 Blue) and it brought \$150.29. Jim Osborn added another M-1 to his collection when he bought a #4 Haffenreffer for \$204.50. Not sure what stirred the fire on M-19 Miller openers as a normally \$10-\$20 opener hit big three times at \$102.51 (MIB), \$68.00 and \$41.00. Same logic when buying the M-25-1 Lemp as I stated for L-2 A-B in the last paragraph, always available and worth \$25-40 depending on condition. The real action in the “M”s was with “M-73”s as Chris Quimby sold several nice beer examples. One of the best deals this quarter was bought by Mike Krejci when he got a “MIB” M-130-1 Blatz opener for \$23.50. A very unusual hard to find style. He didn’t even blow the horn when bidding, only afterwards when he was celebrating.

“N” styles saw a lot of Coca-Cola results with the biggest result being a N-44 Coca-Cola knife bringing \$214.38. It was the first N-44 Coca-Cola knife I had seen on eBay in some time. The N-5 West End Brewing beer knife is becoming very common but in nice condition still brings a good price as one did this quarter at \$125.00. Someone got a good deal on the N-26 Coca-Cola jar opener from Washington GA at \$26.50. I did shove Dave Lendy over to get the N-111-UL Fisherman’s knife at \$41.01.

A west coast seller sold his O-2 soda wall mounts and most brought decent prices and showed that this market

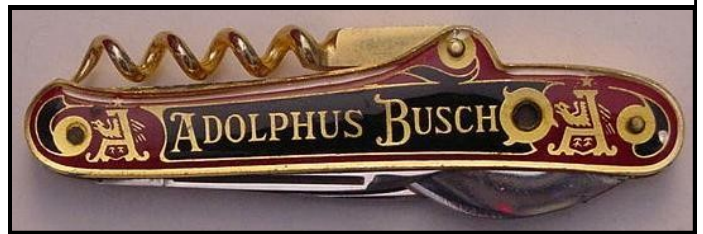
had slowed down quiet a bit since a couple of years ago. Most from this collection were in very nice condition and in years past would have brought a premium but not this time. The O-17-1 Rolling Rock originally sold from the brewery for \$15.00 plus shipping and has continually brought \$30-50 on eBay but this quarter saw one bring \$91.00 and then a month later one brings \$16.06. Once again go figure. The “Starr Market” continued leveling off as more examples are turning up than collectors and the prices have for the most part fallen off. The O-502 “Side Mount” Coca-Cola in nice shape was a good deal at \$330.53 but then who knows what a good deal is in this market anymore. I really wanted the O-19 Coca-Cola from Danville VA but Dick Friedman came through and took it to Texas at \$169.49. I also would like to own an O-19 Pepsi-Cola some day but the one on eBay this quarter was just too rough.

Then we get to “P” beer corkscrews and lots of good activity this quarter. John “Woody” Cartwright captured several nice wood handle corkscrews but the real highlights were the Anheuser-Busch knives. Only one high priced example this quarter, a P-26-UL in great shape with Red and Blue enameled handles bringing \$2,930.00. A lucky seller in Illinois found a pile of P-25-3 A-B knives in their original pouches and boxes. The story goes she found at least 20, maybe 26 and maybe more. Thanks to some research by Don Bull (he got the numbers from a knife expert, Bernard Levine, and additional information as the seller had contacted Levine), I also learned that these knives were made in 1952 and only have Germany stamped on one blade. The seller sold a couple at \$125 each, then a couple at \$135 each and then the price jumped to \$200 each as they were selling quickly. Being the astute collector I am, I jumped in at to get the last one at \$200. When I got the knife, it was very easy to recognize it as a poor quality compared to other A-B. Instead of handles with enameling the handles appear to be plastic. Even though they are “mint”, the blades on mine would not close properly (the wire cutter blade would hit on top of the smaller second blade). I immediately asked a refund from the seller as she claimed in my buying ad the knives were from the early 1900s. At first she was not going to, claiming she had changed the ad to say 1952 but then when she realized she was wrong, she agreed to refund my money. As you can see from the results, one sold for \$301.51 (from another seller). The seller is still listing them at \$200.00 each but it really is “buyer beware”. As Ollie said in his article when its too good to be true, then something ain’t right.

The other “P” highlight was the P-79-1 Ladies Folding Leg corkscrew bringing \$1,581.00. Not much less than a similar example for the last quarter. We even showed a “Q” result as they rarely bring more than \$10 but a Q-8-4 Hamms did bring \$16.51.

Corkscrews in general were very active with many European examples bringing excellent money with the top example being an 19th century English corkscrew with a retractable worm bringing \$9,345.53 (remember John Patton its only money). A nice sterling US 1894 Puddefoot patent ladies leg brought \$5,057.00 which was the top US selling piece. I do know that the older corkscrew collectors keep telling me they are glad they got their nice corkscrews years ago when the getting was good. I even added a couple of “Hagenuer” (Made in Austria) examples. These are very desirable openers and always see lots of bidding activity on eBay. Until next issue, happy hunting and I hope you don’t hear someone’s horn sound. If you do, just remember, “they had to make more than one”.

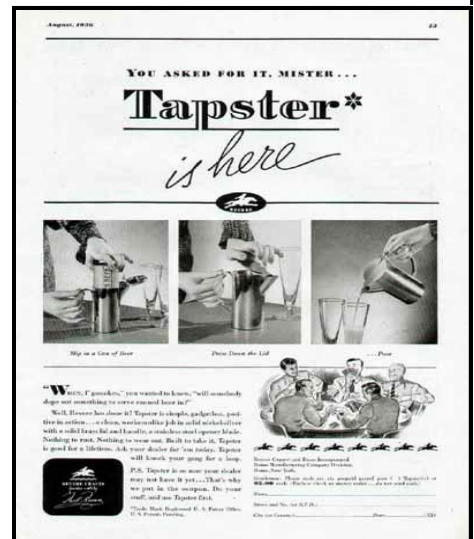


A “New Discovery” A-B knife that

Norm Jay traded me at the convention. This one we had been working on for a couple of years and I finally got him to trade it. Marked “Anheuser Busch” on plain steel handles, with corkscrew and two knife blades. Both blades marked “Christian Solingen”. Most likely a “Salesman Sample” knife???



A pretty common style is the M-21 Rainier opener with a Sterling collar. Last fall one sold on eBay for a fair price of \$36.00. What was interesting was the description of the opener by the seller. They stated that Rainier was made by the Seattle Brewing and Malting Co. of Seattle and that the company moved to San Francisco in 1916 when prohibition came to the state of Washington. They then claimed the opener was issued around 1895, made from Reindeer horns / antlers especially for the Alaskan Gold Rush trade. Do any of you West Coast collectors know if this is true? Interesting claim but I really wonder how accurate it is?
