29th Just For Openers Convention April 25-29 Harrisburg, Pa. (I)

The excitement was building as we would break the JFO Convention attendance record if everyone showed up and we could get one more as we usually do at the last minute. The record of 47 was set at the 2000 Chicago Convention hosted by Norm and Judy Jay. In the end we got a last minute sign-up, Greg Thole, but Stan Summers never made it so we ended up tying Norm's record. Maybe next year in St. Louis we can break the record.

For once I was not scampering around at the last minute trying to get everything ready. Pat could not say the same and this would be the first convention for Jazzy and Snazzy. My openers I would be taking to Harrisburg were for the most part well organized and Pat had bought some new plastic tubs so everything packed neatly in her Ford Expedition. She had put in some long nights leading up to our departure so I decided to let her sleep in Tuesday morning and after everyone was ready it was 10:40 AM before we got on the road.

The actual driving time for us was six hours but with a couple of stops it was a little after five when we arrived at the Holiday Inn. Thanks to the driving gods we got around D. C. with no problems. The hotel was a two story job set up in a big "J" pattern. Our room was at the top of the "J" and as I would find out a dead end hall way that did not have much foot traffic. I still did well for the week but as most attendees found out it took a lot of walking to see if rooms were open. Jazzy and Snazzy had their own crate and overall they handled the new environment well. The only times they barked was when someone would knock on the door.

Tuesday evening a small group went to the local steak house. Convention hosts Ben and Cornelia Hoffman along with co-host David Hoffman and Gary Deachman joined the Stanleys for a fine dinner. Back at the hotel Ben had his room open and after some looking we went down to Gary's room. He was having a sale on lots of \$1 openers. I got several "G" pot metal Coors openers from the \$1 boxes. Being in a giving mood Gary gave Ben and me a few E-14 Cooks openers. He had a whole box and in my pile was one missing the last "E" on Evansville. We got a good laugh and searched the rest of his box as he had about 40 but this was the only one with Evansville misspelled.

I managed to get a few display cases out in our room but would have to wait until Wednesday to get a six foot table. For this convention I brought a lot of my flat openers from my collection for display. After some unpacking I decided it would be better to wait until the next morning to get eve-

rything set up.

Wednesday morning would be the first of five straight breakfasts at the hotel restaurant. They had a really good deal of 2 eggs, 2 strips of bacon with hash browns and toast for \$3.99. If you were a priority club member, you knock another \$3 off of your meal. By 9AM I had a six foot table in our room and had got things laid out when first the local newspaper photographer showed up and he was followed by a newspaper writer. Pictures were taken and the writer did an interview and the result was in the Harrisburg Patriot's Friday morning paper (article follows convention pictures). Overall a good article but how he got confused and forgot about William Painter being the inventor of the bottle opener I am not sure. Instead he had Joseph Spielbauer as the inventor and got that name from the inventor, Josephine Spielbauer, of the P-100 Rainier corkscrew which was shown in the article.

In any event we got some nice publicity but several members gave me grief about just picturing two openers supposedly each worth a \$1,000. It did draw several people into the Saturday show who were hoping they had one of those valuable \$1,000 openers. Wednesday saw about half of the attendees register and that is when I found out early that day that due to hotel renovations we would be spread far and wide. Pat liked our end room because if the dogs barked we only disturbed someone on the right side of our room. Thanks to Harold Queen we had lots of good Yuengling beer in the hospitality room.

By that afternoon many members were showing up and lots of room-to-room action was going on. The hospitality room was the size of two hotel rooms and we had plenty of room for everyone participating. Pat continually updated a master list of room numbers so you knew which rooms to go to. The newer members showing up all said one thing in common. "They had never seen so many openers!" Gary told me that evening that action in his \$1 box had been steady all day. From my schedule everyone who was suppose to be there had arrived except for Kurt Bachmann who had to deal with electrical problems at his house and Jeb Burruss was grounded in Chicago due to bad weather. Wednesday was not a good day to be flying in the U. S. though several other members had made it flying. Jeb would eventually get to the hotel at midnight completing an 18 hour day.

Thursday morning I got up for the 6:30 breakfast and asked at the hotel front desk if Jeb had made it and the clerk told

me had gotten in and if I saw him to tell him that his luggage had just arrived. Flying can be great or terrible and hardly ever in between. Thursday morning saw a few members head to the Rennigar's Flea Market for the early buying day. From the reports I got back most everyone who went found something. JFO member Tom Atkinson was set up and sold Larry Moter a nice E-8 Old Colony wire opener. It was also reported that another JFO member, Ken Ostrow, was spotted at the show.

Back at the hotel room-to-room was pretty active all day. All one had to do was go down to the hospitality room and tell people you were open and usually a small crowd would follow you back to your room. Most members reported to me that sales were good and with the 11 first time attendees many were like kids in a candy shop.

For once at a convention I can say I did not add that many openers to my collection. Pat always reminds me that I have everything so at some point it does get hard to add to the collection. Joe Knapp did sell me an interesting piece, an N-8 (opener and sliding cigar cutter) in an original box. The opener had no ad and the box was a specialty company from Boston but it was a really neat combination. That evening I worked out a trade with Josef L' Africain, one of the many corkscrew collectors in attendance. He received a pair of German folding legs corkscrew from me and I got a sterling golf bag, a sterling M-3 slider (he had found 5 of this one) and a new discovery wall mount opener from Topper Ale.

That night Pat and I had another meal at the hotel restaurant as it was just easy and somewhat quick to do. The returning shoppers from the flea market and malls shared their "great find" stories and of course more rooms opened up as most everyone who was attending had made it in. The only exceptions were Don Bull who was arriving on Friday and Stan Summers who never made it in and cost us breaking the JFO convention attendance record.

Some folks stayed up past 10PM but most everyone had turned in by then. I followed suit at 10:30 after always taking Jazzy and Snazzy out one last time to potty. This day was the first of three in a row with off and on rain. The girls were not excited about going out in the rain. They did adjust but with all of the truck traffic going by in I-83 and I-76, they always had something to look at.

Friday was another day of room-to-room trading and many folks did the flea market and antique mall round. The one

thing missing at this point was a convention opener. After eight successful production runs with the company in Indianapolis and despite me starting early for this year's convention the openers were supposedly in route from China. To say I was little stressed about it, would be putting it mildly. In any event a daily call to my sales girl at the company had only been yielding a response that the opener would be here tomorrow. Wednesday I got the same response and Thursday she was out sick but her backup said the openers had arrived. She then told me they were being sent UPS regular shipping which was 4-5 days to the hotel. I panicked one last time as she rechecked and they would be sent overnight. It would be a happy ending for everyone as I was handing them out by 10:00 Friday morning.

My sales picked up Friday as I had more time to keep the room open. The off and on rain continued so it was a good day to be inside anyway. Early that evening we rounded up a small group to go eat supper. I had to leave early as auction check-ins would start at 7PM. In recent years we have tried to do a small auction to continue the tradition and this time we did end up with some nice items but once again many did not meet reserve.

Auction check-in was between 7 and 8 and at 8PM Mark Woodard started his seminar on William Painter the inventor of the crown cap and crown cap opener. Mark had done a lot of research and had an extensive history of Painter from his early days until the successful run of his Crown, Cork & Seal Co. He registered over 80 patents and was always had several irons in the fire. Mark was just getting to Painter's invention of the crown cap and opener when I had to cut him short after one hour. Hopefully in the future Mark can make a Part II presentation on William Painter. Thanks Mark for doing the presentation and to Todd Milano for providing a projector that Mark could use.

The auction lasted about an hour and it did seem to drag on with many openers being passed on because the seller did not want them sold at the final price realized. Several people suggested we change the format and for next year we will also enter the seller's reserve price so the auctioneer will have an idea where to start the bidding and also we can tell the bidding floor what the reserve is if it is not met. The highest bidder would have an option to buy it at the reserve or to pass on it.

Late that evening I did some reminiscing with members and checked on the ball room as the hotel was setting it up for our show the next morning. By 11PM I was ready to

turn in. Jazzy and Snazzy seemed much more comfortable with their surroundings. It was a peaceful but short night of rest.

Saturday morning I was up by 5AM as I needed to check progress on the ball room. The doors were open and with David Hoffman's help we had to do some table rearranging but it would be our biggest space in years if not ever. The local beer guys can get 80 tables set up but we only had 50 with 5 reserved for displays. It was nice having lots of space and this year 14 members entered general displays and 6 entered items for the Bill McKenzie Best In Show award. Members were setting up for the show by 7AM. This is the one time during our convention that you can see in one room what everyone brought for the convention.

The Harrisburg Patriot newspaper article paid off as we had 4 to 5 people come to the show to either sell items or just check out what was going on. During the show we had 15-20 walk-ins. Not too bad considering that most anyone who collected openers or corkscrews in the area was in attendance. Quite a bit of bargain shopping was going on and as has been the case in recent years, by noon the show was winding up. Many members want to get on the road by noon and we had early voting (between 8AM and 10AM) for the display contests.

The winners were announced by 10:30. Todd Milano won the display contest with his outstanding tall display case of Harrisburg brewery artifacts including a lot of nice beer openers from that city. His wife Linda had spent hours mounting items on his four sided display. Second place went to Mike Krejci who I believe has all of the 50 some Hard Rock café openers issued for the U. S. plus he has many of the 50 plus issued world wide. He mounted his collection on a large metal board. It was very colorful. Third place went to Harold Queen for his great Yuengling beer display. Harold has almost all of the known Yuengling openers. Joe Young won the Bill McKenzie Best In Show Award for his Arrow Beer wall mount opener that is a new discovery. It was shaped like a tall bird house and as of now a unique piece.

Many thanks to everyone who took the time to enter a display for this year's convention. The show continued on and by noon many people had started leaving. By 1PM the hotel staff were breaking down tables and I was the last one to pack up and leave. Ben had the hospitality room open but I spent a couple of hours organizing and packing my displays. Pat's heavy duty plastic containers worked very

well for holding several Riker Mount display cases.

The remaining members were planning on a group supper that evening at the Appalachian Brewpub which was about 5 miles away in Camp Hill. We would carpool over and it was decided we would be there by 6PM. On a side note a few of the corkscrew collectors had a special invitation to visit Bert Giulian's home which was also in nearby Camp Hill. The group included Don and Bonnie Bull, Herb and Camille Danziger, and John Donoghue. Don asked me to go and I told him I could visit for about an hour and a half before I would need to meet up with the main group.

The corkscrew group ended up taking two cars and I rode with Don and Bonnie. It was about a 15 minute ride to Bert's and yes it was certainly worth the trip. Besides being a great host, Bert has a fabulous collection of world-wide corkscrews displayed in his wine cellar. The majority of his collection is displayed by country on three walls with four large boards on each wall. Joe Young is always telling me that seeing pictures is one thing but actually holding a piece in your hands gives you a much better sense of what it actually looks and feels like. Bert's corkscrews were held on by brass nails and so one could remove and look at individual corkscrews.

Don was kind enough to point some rare beer advertising corkscrews and spotted the "long" Electro-Chemical "slider" painted green. Until now I knew Don had a red one and another Pennsylvania collector had a red one so this made three that are known. Bert was a gracious host and after much salivating over his collection, we took some pictures and it was time for Pat to pick me up. Actually Bert lived about two miles from the brewpub.

We arrived a little late as most everyone was seated and Pat's Canadian cousins, Mike and Theresa St Amand had also ridden with us. Twenty-five members, spouses and the Milanos brought their daughter Hazel for the fine dinner served by the brewpub. Amazingly we had only one waitress and she hustled the entire time to keep up. Drinks and food service went well but once we got to paying with individual checks, things slowed down. Two late attendees, Bob and Marge Stahly, watched as we waited and the waitress would refigure checks. Eventually we all settled up and left Bob and Marge to finish their meals.

Todd and Linda Milano invited Pat, myself and the St Amands to their house. They lived a couple of miles away and Linda and Hazel took off to do a little advanced clean-

ing. Todd served as our guide to his house. We stayed about an hour and I learned that Todd is not only "Mr I-7" but he likes little advertising "smalls" in general. He had also recently acquired the etched glass door insert from the old National Brewing Co. of Steelton, Pa. It now served as the Milanos coffee table and was just an outstanding piece of breweriana. Todd's opener collection is in the basement "opener room" along with his other collectibles. We had a very enjoyable visit and at 9PM we started back for the hotel.

We arrived back and the hospitality room was cranking up. A lot of joke telling and reminiscing was going on. Ben, Harold and Dave Hoffman had done a great job running the convention. By 11PM most everyone had turned in and Ben closed the hospitality room door for the last time. A special thanks to Dick Yuengling the owner of the Yuengling Brewery for donating a keg for the hospitality

room and a model truck that we raffled off Friday night (won by Richard Kaisch). Pat and I got to say our good-byes that night and saw several people check out the next morning. We had one last breakfast with Gary Deachman and Mike Krejci.

The Stanleys were slow getting ready but we headed home at 10AM. Our only side tour was in Gettysburg as we drove around the main square and drove by some of the battlefields. In the early 80's through the early 90's I and then Pat and myself had made a few trips to the twice annual Gettysburg antique show that set up on the main streets near the main town square. We arrived back in Durham by 5PM and after unloading the Expedition I had to mow the yard. Cleaning up my convention openers would have to wait but we were already making plans for next year's convention in St. Louis. Ollie Hibbeler will be helping and he always says, "Be There!"

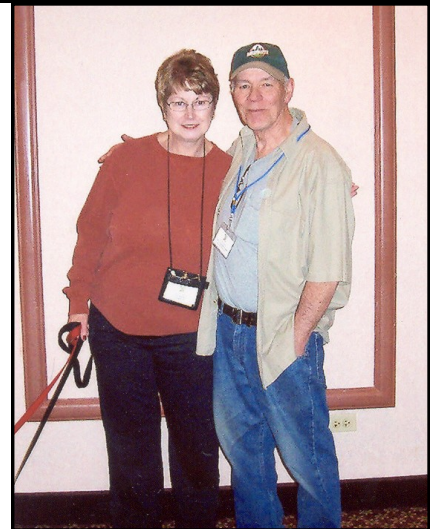

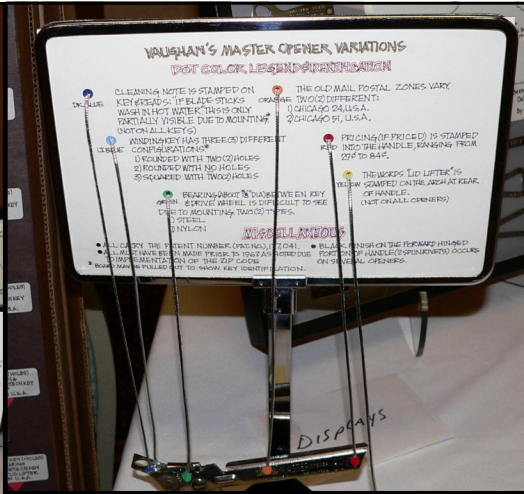

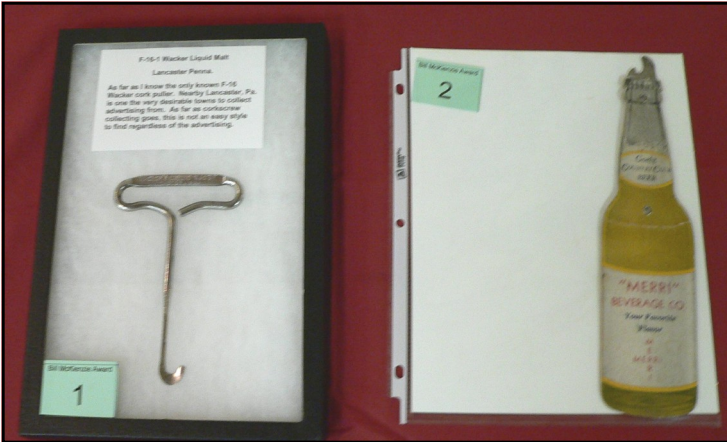

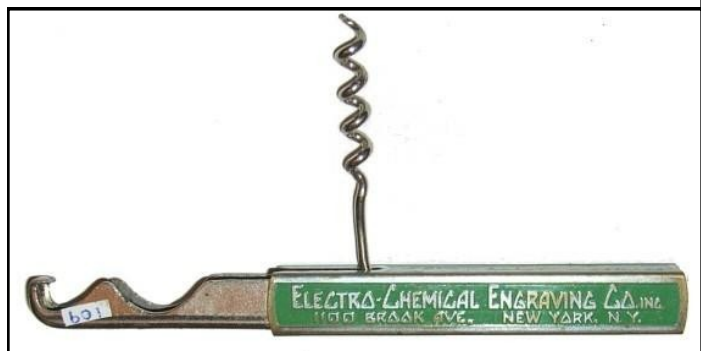

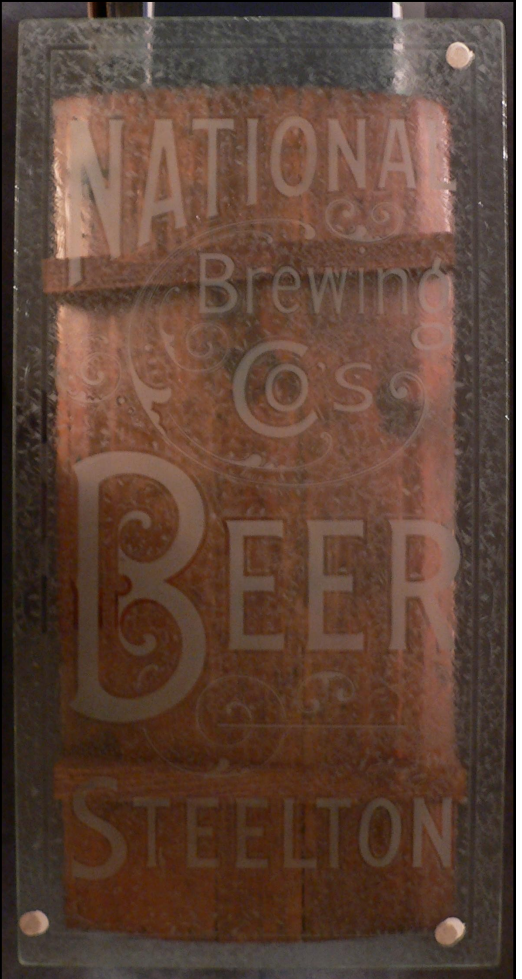

Collectors don't keep hobby bottled up

Ask Harold Queen how long he's been collecting bottle openers, and his wife, Boots, will pop up and say "too long!"

Their room at the Holiday Inn in Fairview Twp. erupted with laughter -- apparently, it's a common response -- as some of the nearly 50 collectors from the "Just for Openers" bottle-opener collectors club munched on pretzels between touring one another's collections, neatly laid out on the beds in their respective rooms.

The humble convention this week mirrors the humble bottle opener's genesis.

On Feb. 6, 1894, in Baltimore, Joseph Spielbauer (*should be William Painter*) of the Crown Cork & Seal Co. created the opener as part of the company's cork-and-metal bottle cap, invented two years earlier.

Bottle openers were in their heyday beyond the first half of the 20th century.

The advent of the twist-off cap in the 1960s, however, signaled the decline of the openers.

"Right now, Just for Openers has 244 members," said John Stanley of Durham, N.C., one of the organizers of the convention.

"But there are a lot of closet collectors out there," he said.

"Most of us start out collecting them, thinking that we just have to be the only person in the world who would want to collect bottle openers," Stanley said.

"And then we go on eBay and find them being sold there, and find out there are clubs whose members all collect bottle openers, and your first thought is, 'You've got to be kidding!'"

In fact, interest in the hobby might be on the increase. The Just for Openers convention this year broke previous attendance records, at 48.

The openers themselves are rare, but not gone. "They still make them, but you don't see them all that much any more," Stanley said.

Stanley has about 3,000 bottle openers, and they range from simple wire openers to a stamped steel version that represents a man astride a Harley-Davidson motorcycle.

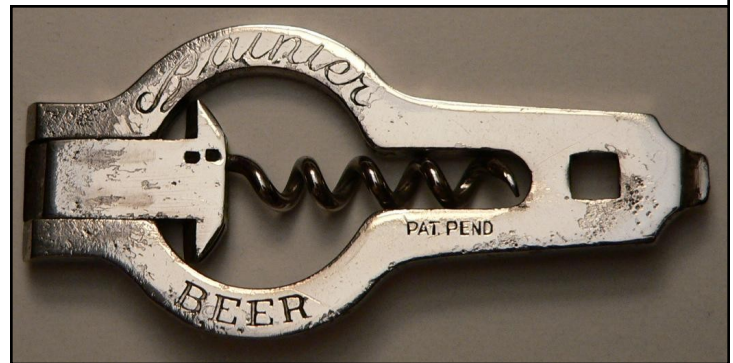
"It's called a spinner," he said. "The idea was, you put it down on the bar or table and gave it a spin. When it stopped, whoever it was pointing at paid for the next round."

OK, so fine art it's not.

But some of the openers are extremely valuable to some folks.

That Harley spinner, for example, could bring as much as \$1,000 from the right collector.

“Opener and eBay Trivia”

For a good while now I have been commenting about eBay slowing down as far as good items are concerned but this past quarter was an exception. Many nice openers were offered for sale for a change though the number of good corkscrews were much less than normal. Many sellers feel that summer is the slowest time on eBay and I guess corkscrew sellers were not in the summer selling mode.

Many good “A”s were sold and I must take credit for the top seller, an A-33 “Bounce Back To Normal Drink Coca-Cola”. The “big fish” is one of my favorite types and I had never seen that Coca-Cola slogan on a bottle opener. It must be my favorite as I had to pay \$465.00 for it and spent close to two weeks going back and forth with an eBay store in the state of Washington before receiving it. They had an automatic check-out that wanted to only charge \$2.00 shipping but for once I wanted priority mail and insurance. It took close to a week to get the correct shipping total and then apparently due to internal poor communication another week of receiving emails saying I had not paid when I had with PayPal. In the end it was a nice opener.

The top beer “A” was an A-60-1 Narragansett Indian and the first one I had seen for sale on eBay. Art Johnson was the winner and \$322.00 was a fair price considering scarcity and the number of collectors who want this opener. Art had missed one year ago at a local yard sale by just a few minutes. So he figured what the heck it was time to jump in and get this one. Next high on the list was an A-28-UL Chattanooga Brewing from an agent in Lynchburg, Va. Some Tennessee collectors fought hard before it sold for \$238.49. A special note that this same ad can be found on three other “A” styles; A-13, A-35 and A-42. Certainly unusual since southern beer openers are not that common.

The tougher of the two A-15 Fortune Bros openers brought \$224.55 (#16). I had sold mine to Jeb Burruss a couple of years ago for \$50. I guess I should have sold it on eBay. But really it is tough to find but not that rare and certainly the price is super retail. Several other nice “A” styles sold including the A-10-1 Muehlebach for \$169.49, an A-34-3 Gilt Top for \$128.49, and finally an A-1 “So Much Better Pepsi=Cola” for \$135.83. The A-1 ended up in my collection and I was told some Pepsi collectors thought it was a repro but not this one. Supposedly three “A-1 Pepsis” were found in the late 1980s in a Maine Antique Mall but this was the first time I had seen one offered for sale.

“B” types were headed by a nice B-11-1 Rainer (Var A) selling for \$224.55. This opener was followed by a mint B

-18-148 Schuster selling for \$160.38. Once again a big battle between two Minnesota collectors occurred. Some nice brass “B-2”s sold with the leaders being a B-2-5 Fresno and a B-2-6 Hamms both selling just over the \$100.00 mark. Soda notables were a rusty B-21 Coca-Cola opener from Oklahoma City with a Coca-Cola Oklahoma City metal key selling for \$149.38. So sometimes rust does not matter. “C”s were headed by the ever popular C-17-37 Largay having three examples ranging in price from \$26.00 to \$51.00. Three examples of the C-13-69 Magnolia sold and ranged in price from \$28.78 to \$52.55. Both are desirable openers and both come on the market quiet frequently and they seem to worth more along the \$20.00-\$25.00 range.

“D”s saw one notable sale of a nice D-11-1 Hagerstown selling at \$38.99. At one time this was a good \$75.00-\$100.00 opener. Just too many have appeared in the market place. “E” types saw a few good openers sell but the top one was from north of the border. A Canadian E-16 “The Berlin Lion Brewery Limited” brought \$89.99. “F”s had two nice openers highlighting sales lead by a F-14-UL Chattanooga Brewing Co. A few of the F-14-1 Atlas Brewing openers have appeared on the market but it was the only beer ad seen on this style until the Chattanooga was turned up by a seller from Missouri. Not cheap at \$271.99 but it is a one of a kind at this point. Schwarzenbach collectors chased hard after the F-6-20 before it finished at \$152.50 (possibly a record for an F-6). Once again the first I have seen offered for sale and you may never get another chance. Jeb Burruss got a great buy in a F-5-UL Pfeiffer and Marx Beers from Michigan for \$20.95. Very few F-5s have actual beer ads.

Cast iron figural openers saw some action and Terry Fadina who is selling the Dale Deckert collection has a weekly offering of cast iron, beer openers, wall mounts and openers in general. His nice offering of the FBOC-429 Coyote lead the way for FBOC openers by bringing \$1,250.00 (BIN Buy-It-Now). “G”s saw two interesting results. Two G-5 Brading’s Stags Head Lager openers sold for \$116.49 and \$16.42 respectively. George Vine who just issued a new Canadian Beer opener book (currently sold out) had turned the first example last year for his collection and then found two more. The first one on eBay brought the high amount and by the time a third example showed up the lower price had kicked in. You just never know but George turning up three examples in about a year’s time of a previously unknown opener is also very amazing.

“H”s were not very exciting but I did add a H-1-34 Star to my H-1 collection. Only 8 to go fill the set out (check my want ad). We jump to the “K”s and another K-9-1 Blatz was sold and brought \$479.94. The last few have been in the \$400.00-\$500.00 range as it is a style many people want to own. See what you started Herb Haydock (Herb discovered the first one we knew about back in the early 1980s). Moving on to the “L”s and will the supply of L-2 Anheuser-Busch bottle corkscrews ever dry up. NO!!! as every quarter there are 20-30 sold. The A-B boys had to have at least a million made. On the other end of the spectrum a nice L-2-8 Standard from Chicago brought \$315.00. Not cheap but considering condition and rarity a fair price. A seller from Milwaukee keeps the market for L-4s busy with what we think are fantasy openers but he sure has a lot of nice condition ones to sell and about 6-7 different brands to offer. They are the “foil” label L-4s and who knows maybe he found a small hoard or maybe he makes them up.

Lots of “M”s and “N”s sold this quarter. Many of the nice items were from Don Bull’s non-corkscrew knife collection. Leading off the “M”s was a nice M-2-8 Harvard selling for \$189.00. “M-1”s and “M-2”s will always be desirable and especially ones with bottles and in nice condition. Sliders or “M-3”s were rather calm in the action category but the usual commons and tougher ones in off condition were auctioned this quarter. A notable sell was a “M-6” bell from Jack Dempsey’s Restaurant bringing \$128.51. I assume the boxing collectors wanted this one as most non-beer bells go for under \$10.00. Then it was a wild quarter for brass muddlers on eBay. Numerous high final results and a couple of not seen before soda muddlers that brought big money (Moxie and Whistle). The Schlitz bringing \$246.50 was hard to understand as the ones I have seen before have brought at most \$50.00 and the Moxie and Whistle openers come out of nowhere and look to be fantasy items. We will let the market determine the trend for these as already in July a couple of more examples of the Moxie and Whistle have been sold.

The Bull auction results are scattered though out and some of the notables were the nice N-4-4 Budweiser knife bringing \$202.51, two N-54-1 Blatz knives bringing \$203.49 and \$291.00 with the nicest one bringing the highest price, and finally several nice Canadian beer advertising knives bringing as much as \$162.50. Don made a lot of collectors happy and you rarely see any more this quantity of nice beer knives offered at one time. I will finish up these categories by saying the real surprise was a M-73 Texaco slider missing the corkscrew and selling for \$128.25. Nice com-

plete examples have been selling in the \$75.00-\$100.00 range the last couple of years on eBay.

“O” types or wall mounts were led by a nice O-1-UL Goetz Pilsener Beer being sold for \$76.00 and that one was added to the Stanley collection. Lots of Starr and Starr X sold as is the norm on eBay and the most desirable were two openers out of the former Dale Deckert collection. An O-5-39 Schlitz (painted light blue) brought \$535.00 and an O-505 “Big Bill” brought \$330.00. The Schlitz has turned up a few times and is very sought after by Starr collectors. I paid \$390.00 for mine so if you need one get the check-book ready if and when another one turns up. The only other “Big Bill” on eBay had sold for around a \$1,000.00 so \$330.00 seems like a bargain. Congratulations to JFO members Lyle Ennis for getting the “Schlitz” and Don Stinson on obtaining the “Big Bill”.

Beer corkscrews or “P” types saw some steady action and the highlight was a P-79-2 Blatz (folding metal legs) bringing \$1,030.00. A style that is very desirable by beer and especially corkscrew collectors. The “Flash” corkscrews or P-6 style with paper labels around the wood sleeve saw many offerings and I listed the high lot at \$225.83 for one from Stuebenville, Ohio with a picture of an Indian. Most sold in the \$30.00-\$60.00 range as maybe the initial excitement has worn off. There are literary hundreds of different ones from seemingly every town in the United States.

Beer knives with corkscrews had a few A-B knives sell but nothing out of the ordinary. One interesting “P” sale was a P-51-UL from a Honolulu distributor for Olympia beer. A Hawaiian collector really wanted it and paid \$172.19. Ben Hoffman got a nice buy on a P-45-1 Ballantine bar mount at \$133.50. At one time a few years back the price would have been \$400.00-\$500.00 and then in 2002 I paid \$300.00 for mine from fellow JFO member, Tom Atkinson. The last couple of years the price has been around \$200.00 but I guess once again too many have come on the market place.

For once general corkscrew activity was pretty limited this quarter. At least for the better pieces. Leading the way a 19th century folding French Perille corkscrew that brought \$5,655.00. It does seem that like other areas of collectibles, eBay has brought many examples of items onto the world market and as more and more items appear that at one time were considered scarce the price has dropped accordingly. American patents that five years ago were double what they are now is solely because of the number that

continually turn up such as the Brady U-Neek patent, the 1892 Mumford patent and even the 1878 Tucker patent. As with any collectible it will be interesting to see how the market trend goes in the future. One area of corkscrews that remains strong are Syroco pieces. Even the rare Knight has been found often but always commands a strong price.

This was a nice quarter on eBay for my collection and hopefully many of you added some nice openers and corkscrews to your collections. With the major beer shows this summer it should be interesting to hear what turns up at these events. Hopefully in October I can give nice updates on finds made at these shows and that eBay follows this quarter with another strong one.

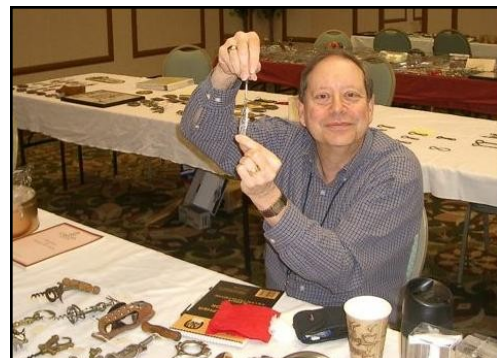


