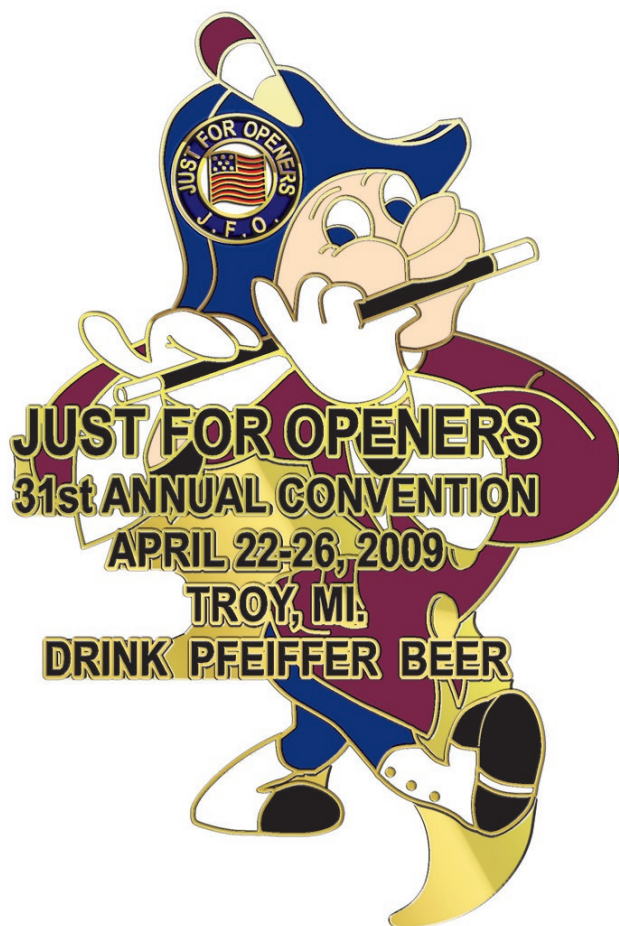

2009 JFO Convention #31 April 22-26 Troy (Detroit) MI

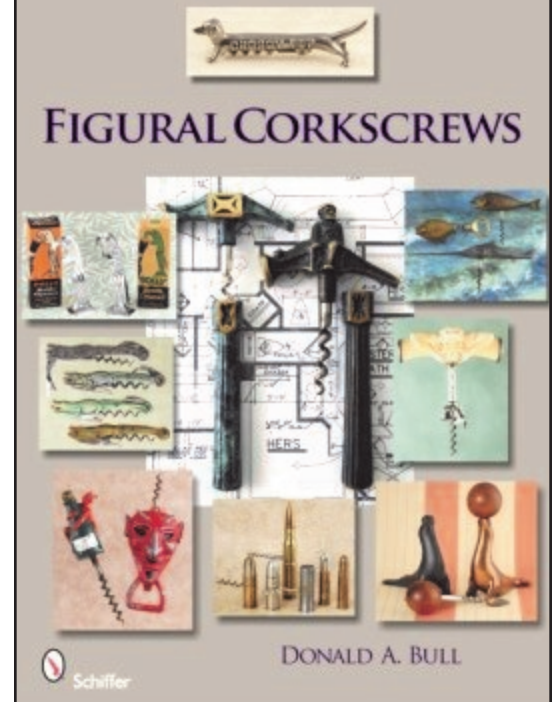

Joe and Jackie Young missed JFO again, but I think San Antonio is already on their radar. Hope so.

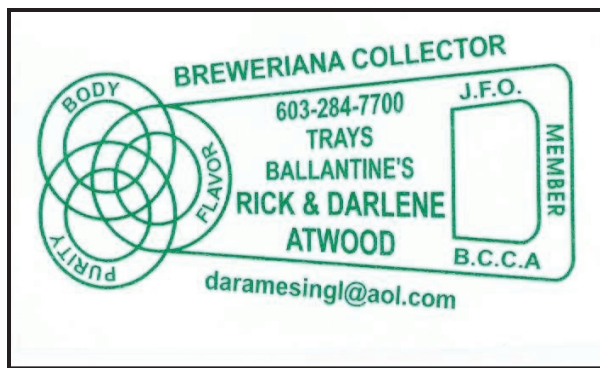
Jazzy just joined me. She likes to sit in my computer chair. Guess she wanted to say 'hello' to her friends at JFO.

31st Just For Openers Convention Troy, MI April 22-26, 2009

Another convention we could drive to and the dogs could go also. Instead of leaving on Monday afternoon we left on Tuesday and the Expedition was filled up with just a small tunnel to see out the back. Of course most of the cargo was openers and corkscrews but the essentials for surviving a week long opener convention were all present. We left Durham at 7:45AM (and yes Boots we did steam clean the carpets on the way out the door) and arrived 9:15PM in Troy, Michigan. The Ramada seemed like a nice set-up but for a Tuesday night there were very few guests at the hotel but two of the early arrivals were Pat Stambaugh and Mike Krejci. It took about 45 minutes to unload the vehicle and the temperature was a very cool 36 degrees. We left 80 degree days back in Durham.

Right off the bat our electronic key gave us a problem. A hike back to the front desk corrected it but between our room and the hospitality room I made eight trips to the front desk to get it re-keyed. You never knew when it might happen but at some point the key would not work. As it turned out it was the only complaint for the Just For Openers group for the week. The next morning we got into the hospitality room for set-up and by 10AM I had my stuff ready on two tables and at 11AM, Stan Summers and Kurt Bachmann (two of the co-hosts) arrived with drinks and snacks. That afternoon we were in full swing as about half of the attendees would be showing up that day.

For once the hotel came through and kept most people close to the hospitality room. Pat did have to deal with some people being placed on the second but was able to work out a move for them down to the first floor. And once again this year my first sale went to Harriett Waldo, an H-1-28 Liberty. She is always around the action so it was appropriate her first purchase was an "H". A few miscellaneous sales was followed by Darvin Stilwell buying most of my "K" types. I needed the room back home and Darvin loves those bar mounts.

Wednesday afternoon and evening saw lots of partying and just having fun in the hospitality room. Of course walking the dogs every so often was a requirement and the day was a cold one but they seemed to adjust to hotel life pretty well. Some of the local non-member beer collectors dropped by and as always they are impressed with the JFO people and the hospitality shown by its members. I actually bought \$22.00 worth of new plastic openers from Mike Krejci. Mike is always checking out the brewery shops in his travels and had several new discoveries and new additions for sale.

Thursday was another busy day as the remaining attendees would be checking in. Room-to-room was going on all day. The weather was a little nicer and the action was faster for sure. After five years of owning all of the "C-2"s, it time for some to find a new home. Bill Arber needed the C-2-5 Tech and Gary Deachman needed three including the C-2-5 Tech with a bottle and the C-2-6 Scheidt. Gary's three would finish out his set of "C-2"s so Ben Hoffman and him are the only two collectors known to have complete sets of "C-2"s. Scott Williams added a P-51-UL Ottumwa Iowa Brewing wood corkscrew to his collection. Please note prices are omitted to protect the innocent.

The highlight of Thursday afternoon was Terry Fadina setting up in the hospitality room with some of the Dale Deckert Collection. Terry is "garagefullofjunk" on eBay. Lets just say he brought a lot of junk but he also had several good pieces, nothing too great, but several members jumped in and bought some of his openers. There were two tables full of stuff. I did tell Terry who lived nearby for the next round to bring beer, soda and corkscrews and to leave the cheap figurals and non-advertising items at home. Terry and his helper stayed about three hours and packed up late in the afternoon. They left the openers in the corner so I assumed he might be back late Friday but it would be the Saturday Show before he returned.

Room-to-room was in full swing that evening. It was sometime late Thursday when I sold Darvin 50 pounds of plastic for \$100.00. Ollie Hibbeler sure got excited but I told him it was time for someone else to have fun selling the "new stuff". Most of it was the remainders of Don Whelan's and Dave Lendy's plastic empires. I had been hauling the stuff for 4-5 years and it was time for it to move on. I believe each night by the time I took care of late dog duty it was between 11 and 12 PM when we turned in.

Friday would be a full of activities. It led off by Dick Britton giving a very informative seminar on cleaning openers. The highlights of his talk follow this article. Dick's speech was interesting because I figure I clean openers very well but Dick had carried it to a whole new level. I take the basic approach of using Oxalic Acid and then a 6 inch buffing wheel. This method works well for beer flats and most beer corkscrews. Dick has a much more complicated process because he was cleaning mechanical can openers which have many more moving parts. Dick was followed by Art Santen talking about his collection of corkers. Once again Art's was an interesting speech on re-corking a wine bottle.

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After the seminars we got organized for our luncheon trip to Rochester Brewing. Stan had lined up three friends to drive their cars in another JFO car pool. It was about a 20 minute trip to the microbrewery. We had a little over 40 people enjoying a great setup for lunch. Everything went well except when it came time to pay one of the servers had a hard time getting people the correct checks. In any event we got rolling from there heading towards our two house tours. Half of the group was suppose to go to Stan Summers' house and the other half to Jim Kaiser's house. I had eight counting myself in my car and we got mixed up (that was me) and I headed to Stan's first.

Let's just say both Stan's and Jim's breweriana displays are awesome. Stan's house and converted stable sit on a tall hill overlooking a beautiful creek area. Stan's little museum is in the stable area and he had everything very nicely displayed on the walls, on the ceiling and lots of pull out shelves holding glasses and etc. A really neat place to display beer stuff. Stan and Pat (his Pat) were very gracious hosts. After 30-40 minutes of drooling over his collection (and yes he had lots of nice openers displayed) it was time to head over to Jim's house. My only knock on Stan's place was "who the hell still lives on a dirt road!" I guess for the scenery you have to be in "the sticks" a little bit.

By now the temperature was around 80 and very warm for Michigan for that time of year. Thankfully the Expedition was keeping everyone cool as it was another 15-20 minute ride to the Kaiser house. This time everyone was waiting out front. Jim and Cheryl lived in an "upscale" neighborhood and folks did not want to barge into the wrong house. We were warmly greeted by Cheryl and headed down to Jim's basement. He has one room in the basement dedicated to "Detroit Area" breweriana and some other choice pieces above his bar area in the basement. One wall was covered with beer trays and I assumed he had all of the Detroit ones, but was actually missing four or five.

Your editor honed in on two G-5s from Detroit to get pictures. Jim has the only known examples of a G-5-50 Mundus and a G-5-46 Union. He had several other nice openers and lots of neat Detroit area items. Considering he had been collecting "only" since 1985 he had amassed an eye-opening Detroit Breweriana display. Once again we spent about 30-45 minutes checking the collection out and by now it was around 3:30 and time to head back to the hotel. Detroit traffic would be kicking in since it was a Friday afternoon. Many thanks to Stan and Jim and their spouses, Pat and Cheryl, for opening their homes up for JFO members. Its always great seeing special collections.

We made it back to the hotel by 4:15 despite rather heavy traffic. Next up was a small auction and I decided it would be best to have it after supper. We scheduled check-in for 7:30 and for the auction to start at 8:00. As usual at this event we miss Verne Vollrath when he does not attend so Gary Deachman and I try to fill in. At least with Gary everyone can hear him. He sometimes does not follow auction protocol but he gets the job done. I believe the high lot sold was a B-1-34 Peter that brought \$25. In recent years the auction has been more for entertainment than for material offered. The hospitality room was packed and we can say everyone had a lot of good laughs. Hopefully in the future Verne and LaVerne can make it back for another JFO meeting.

After the auction there was some room-to-room activities but I was trying to make sure the show room for Saturday's public show would be ready. It was just off of the main lobby and the hotel was nice enough to give us access that night as they had everything set up and ready to go. Dick Britton had moved his 60 some boards and had covered three walls with his display. About 10PM I got the doors locked for the night and most everyone turned in a little early.

Saturday morning a good crowd was already forming in the show room by 7AM. After taking care of the girls (Jazzy and Snazzy) I was ready to haul my stuff down and start getting displays ready. The room size worked well with 40 six-foot tables. Dick Britton's boards provided a nice backdrop to the scene and all through the morning we had good foot traffic. About 9AM Terry Fadina made it in and took up four tables with remnants of the old Deckert collection. About 10 members descended on his tables and Larry Moter was elected the "wire expert" as Terry brought one box of wires on the first load. After about an hour he headed back home to get more beer openers and wires. Most openers were loose and you would just turn the box over and several sets of hands would help do the looking.

This year we had nine general displays and four entries for the "Bill McKenzie Best of Show" award (best single opener or corkscrew). For the general displays Pat Stambaugh won first place with his display of Minnesota openers. Dick Britton won second place for his 60 some boards of U. S. made openers, can openers and corkscrews. Darwin Stilwell won third place for his "Just For Openers" display with the letters covered with various style openers. Other displays included Ben Hoffman B-74s, Mike Krejci's Hard Rock Café openers, Art Santen's "St. Louis

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Brewery” openers, Bill Brunner’s “Potosi Beer” openers, Ollie Hibbeler’s “Beer & Music Go Together”, and John Stanley’s “Michigan” openers.

I won the Bill McKenzie award with my D-22-1 Marx Brewing combination bottle and cigar box opener. Other Bill McKenzie displays were Ben Hoffman’s B-50-4 Monocay, Mike Krejci’s N-113-1 Budweiser and Art Santen’s “What Is it” (dang if I ever found out). A big thank you to all members for bringing displays and sharing your collections with fellow members. Pat Stanley shied away from giving out the awards so co-host Stan Summers performed an admiral job in handing out the plaques. If you come to San Antonio next year plan on bringing a display. Big or small take the time to share your collection.

By now Terry Fadina had returned from a quick trip to his house to pick up more beer and wire openers. Once again everyone descended on his tables. At one point I looked up and anyone could have come in the first six rows and walked off with anything as all in attendance were at Terry’s end of the room. It must have been from the years in storage but after picking up a few openers your hands would be covered with dirt and grime. Washing it off took some major effort as it seemed to be glued to your hands. In any event most people seem to have a few items they wanted to buy from Terry. Besides Larry being the “wire expert” I became the beer opener pricing person. I told Terry that Dale Deckert had traded his good beer openers for cast iron figural openers so most everything left was of the common to medium level of value.

Your editor ended up buying 25 openers. After Terry priced them \$500.00, I passed on an average grade A-17 Coca-Cola opener and we settled on a price of \$250.00 for the remaining openers. The show was close to being over by now and word came my way that Dick Britton had decided to let some people remove openers and corkscrews of their choosing from his boards. In one way it was very sad to see but I guess Dick figured he had better sell what he could to collectors who were present. He had spent at least 20 years putting the collection together and countless hours cleaning and building the displays. Not many members knew this was going on but I found out as the boards were being removed for storage. I guess life does go on after opener collecting ends?

After the show we moved back to the hospitality room. A nice crowd gathered and I passed around what I had added to my collection for “show and tell”. Not many good beers ones with the best piece being a Canadian P-87 Silver

Spring Brewery. I did sell one of Fadina’s openers to Ollie Hibbeler, an A-4 Star Bottling from Web City, MO (Harriett you left too early!). Plans were made for a group dinner at a place Kurt and Stan recommended, Kurz’s Dakota Inn and Rsthskeller. It is a German style restaurant. We car pooled down. Once we got off of the interstate, the short ride to the restaurant made me wish we had some armed protection with us. The one time nice German neighborhood had become a semi war zone. The parking lot had a fence around it with razor wire on top. Once inside the crowd settled into 4 tables. The third generation owner showed us an A-20-53 Kulmbacher spinner opener that was put out by the restaurant sometime in the 1930s.

Once Stan Summers and his wife Pat arrived Stan pulled out the same opener (I had gotten it on eBay and Stan worried me until I traded it to him and you know who came out on top in that trade). The food was great but it did take a while to get served. We learned from Pat Summers and that Stan and she came here when they first met. It was really neat hearing the history of the place and checking out some of items on display. We made a quick dash back to the interstate and arrived back at the hotel at about 9PM. Thank you Kurt and Stan for a great group supper. Certainly a nice ending to the convention. We did keep the hospitality room open until about 10:30 as most everyone turned in for the drive home the next day.

Jim Kaiser was nice enough to take Gary Deachman and the Atwoods to the airport the next morning at a very early hour. The Stanleys finally got loaded up and were on the road by 8:30. The Expediton was really packed going home as I brought the extra beer back with us (about 5 cases worth). It was all interstate and it was uneventful as we made it back home at 10PM that night. Jazzy and Snazzy were happy until they found out they were getting a bath. Thankfully we had the next day off and of course I spent time cleaning up all of my new treasures.

Another great convention and thanks to everyone who attended and a special thanks to the Michigan contingent for making everything run as smooth as it did. As I write this article San Antonio is set as next year’s convention city. The rate will be \$129.00 a night. We will be down on the “River Walk”, the place to be in the city. The airport is just 15 minutes away. The Alamo is just 3 blocks away. Lots of great shopping within walking distance. Everything is bigger and better in Texas and this show will be the same way. Jeb will be getting lots of support from the local beer collectors. I say “Remember The Alamo” and Ollie Hibbeler says, BE THERE!

Cleaning Openers Seminar By Dick Britton

Cleaning openers can be a challenge for anyone especially in methods to present a suitable specimen. After 20 years of attempting to bring a metal/plastic item to a condition of presentation, using an array of cleaning/polishing products & "elbow-grease", I let the collection speak for itself.

The products shown here (at the seminar over 20) will to a greater or lesser degree clean metal; some work well-others with varying results.

My generalization of rust is as follows:

- 1) Mild rust/general oxidation: usually where no excess water or food acid were present or undue exposure.
- 2) Minor pitting & finish deterioration: used around water, etc & general handling. Surface is basically intact.
- 3) Excessive rust: heavy pitting, plating diminishing & original finish compromised. Lettering illegible & restoration unable to bring to a more pristine condition.

STEP 1:

- 1) Mild: Most metal cleaners or polishes will restore to near original finish. A coating of wax (paste preferred) or clean acrylic spray, clear lacquer or clear nail polish will aid in long-term show conditions.
- 2) Minor: Rubber abrasion (electric erasers using pink pearl or gray ink refills) do an outstanding job although some finishes exhibit "swirl" marks that can be further polished out. Quad ought ("0000") steel wool and subsequent coarser grades, either used plain or dipped in a cleaner/polish is very effective. Try using on a portion of the item not normally seen checking for results.
- 3) Heavy: Hardened scarifying materials (like file-grade steel) or fine cut files will knock-off "rust buds". Pitting will remain. Smoothing the surface to enhance the appearance. Additional buffing with a wheel, using various grades of compounds will give excellent results. Any plating will suffer when this condition exists. Most cleaning agents will endanger plating. Cast items generally do well except for deep pitting. Using acid based mediums such as muriatic, picric, oxalic, naval jelly, lemon juice, vinegar (all acid base) will take out rust, but also attack all else, such as paint, coatings & plating. I prefer not to use any acids due in most part to a ghostly-grey finish left behind which must be in turn reworked. If using acids, control the dilution rate for a better result.

My favorites are the creams & liquids. Using combinations of any of aforementioned in conjunction with cleansers work best for me. Some creams such as Maas. Lustre, etc. do an excellent job, however, after storage (couple of years) leave a sort of haze, which can be re-brightened with a soft polishing cloth. The one I've found to be the most effective & no residue or haze is "Mr. Metal". Applied with minimal effort, appears to do the job. Several types of cleaners are dedicated to aluminum & work really well, even used on other metals.

If cleaning plastic or plastic combinations with metal, several available cleaners/restorers are available thru auto supply stores. They will brighten, remove minor scuffs, scratches, etc. Be careful if paints are an embellishment as it will be removed as well. Use a gentle cleaner (diluted ammonia) & a soft cloth with little finger pressure to avoid paint loss.

"Simple Green" & others of this type (semi-hazardous-may be removed from the market place) will cut-thru all kinds of crud. They work well but also take off paint. Again less than full-strength (diluted) is recommended. Remember, a soft cloth & little finger pressure to avoid loss.

When in doubt, use water first! Check cloth for paint removal.

Tools used in my experience are dental tools (picks, etc.), very fine files, mini-screwdrivers, wire & nylon cleaning brushes. Most used in conjunction with a soft cloth around the tool. The all-time favorite is the Dremel tool. Easily adjusted for speed & pressure. Attachments are wire brushes, buffing wheels & other bits. Wire wheels may leave marks, and will have to be buffed out using rubbing compounds. Others include 3-M brite pads, pipe cleaners, very fine

(wet grade) emery paper used with Teflon based oil as lubricant.

SIDEBAR: Went to our local flea market the Saturday after JFO & saw 2 electric erasing machines. Haven't seen any in years!

Discussion brought up a couple of ideas. One: use of electrolysis with a battery, submerging the part. Might work – never tried. Another was a mini sandblaster available thru Harbor Freight Tools. Sounds interesting. It's priced at \$29.95, but does not have replacement nozzles. Anytime you push blasting media thru a ceramic or metal nozzles you get considerable wear – eventually rending the tool ineffective. I have a phone number to call to see if nozzles are replaceable but as yet haven't followed up. It could have potential.

Cautions: When using acids, hand & eye protections are a must. High-speed rotary bits – eye protection a must. Using an apron of suitable material helps stop the fast-flying little wires that will impale themselves to skin & clothing.

In reality, a small book could be compiled on opener restoration. Each type of metal used could require individual attention. Rust, wear & oxidation all leave metal in less than brand new pieces. This far, I've had little disappointment except for some either wholly plastic or partial. Metal can endure (for the most part) a lot of restorative procedures. Original finish may be compromised, but in the end, they are presentable. In discussing all the products used, we seem to get the job done. Using any single approach or tool may work, but using a combination of methods will get the best results. To state that any one method is better is debatable. Also, endeavors by others are not mentioned here.

So far, I've never met an opener I didn't like (prefer the good ole U.S.A. models) & no doubt will continue to look & find an occasional opener, although they seem to be much harder to find or affordable.

The methods noted here are examples of putting an opener in its best presentation & hopefully will assist others with maybe a new idea or product. To be sure, there have been some omissions or something performed not noted here. Others may also have a system. This was to present a general overview of one person's attempt. Should other methods deemed noteworthy for dissemination to the JFO subscribers be known, please forward that information for inclusion in a future newsletter.

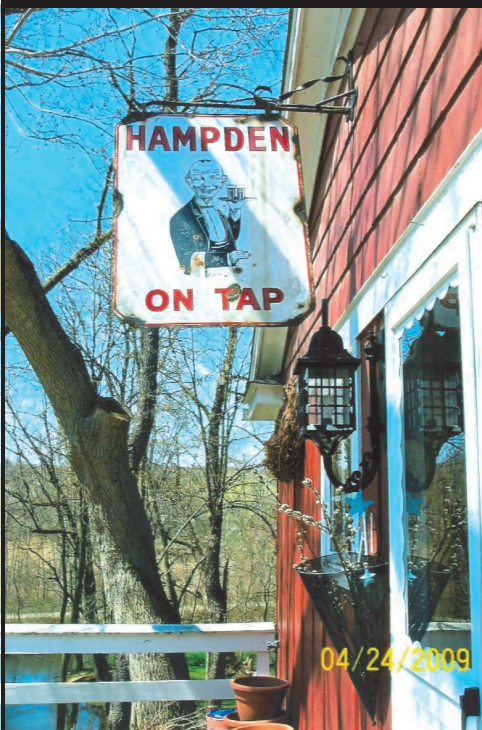

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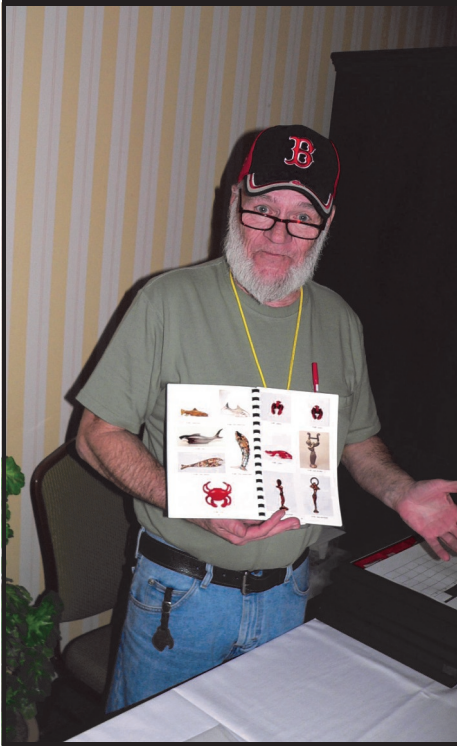

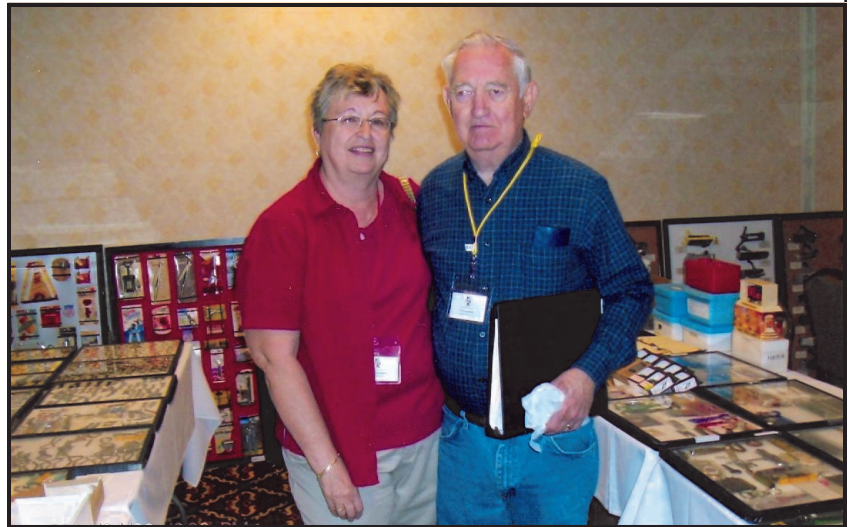

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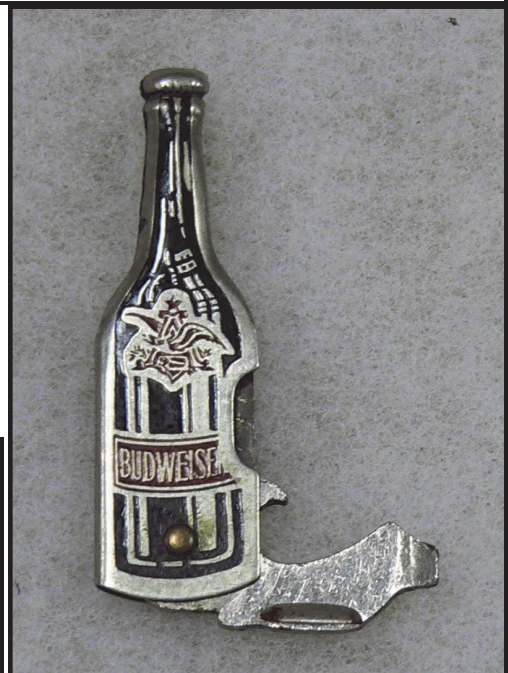

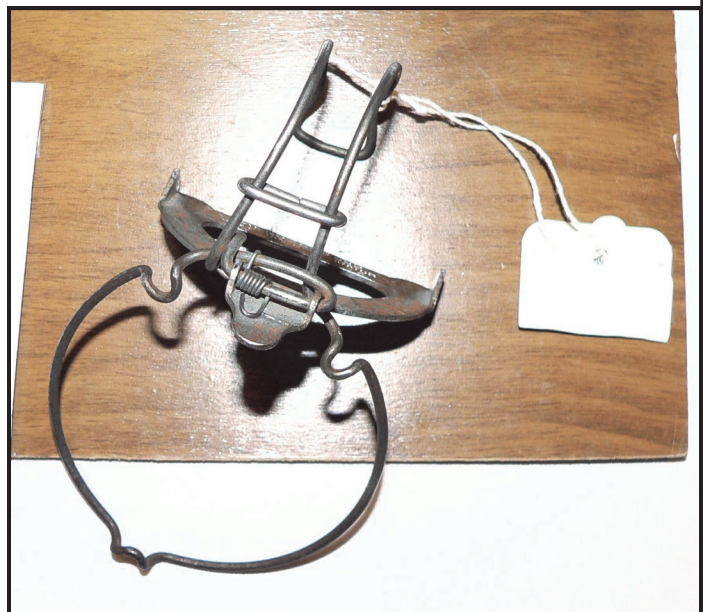
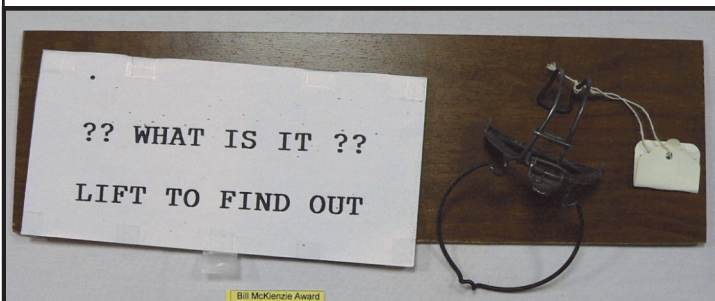

“Opener and eBay Trivia”

The time has come for me to realize that Pat is right. I have most of the openers I need so I should not complain about eBay being slow. Most of the good things being sold already reside in Durham, N. C. As was the case the first quarter of the year I was thinking this has been a slow three months but the second quarter did have some very nice items. No one responded to Joe Young's inquiry about the folding cork puller piece shown in the last issue.

Leading off with the “A” figurals was an A-13-13 Hauck. I knew thirteen was an unlucky number and that is why I was runner-up when it sold for \$169.49. The bad part was I owned an example years ago and traded it to a more savvy JFO collector from Los Angeles. After passing the 20 mark in beer A-13s, it is one of the eight I need to complete “the set”. In any event the eBay one now resides in Tennessee. Remember people they almost always made more than one. Two pretty nice A-14-1 Rainier bridges sold for \$91.99 and \$118.83. These are fair prices in today's market.

The “A”s will be concluded with a mention of a new fantasy opener, the A-60 Indian Motorcycle. This is a large (5”) version of the A-60-1 Narragansett Indian and is made of aluminum. It is also very thick. I put in the one high result of \$81.00 but several sellers on eBay have offered the opener starting at \$9.99. Mine costs \$14.44 on a buy-it-now. With so many being offered for sale you should easily get one for under \$20.00. A nice conversation piece but it certainly has the feel of a cheap opener.

“B”s saw a lot of action and the high lot was a B-45-2 Lemp that sold for \$282.00 and now is owned by our convention host for next year, Jeb Burruss. He has to upgrade his displays! Considering desirability and rarity the resulting price is not unusual. Jim Osborn added a B-70-1 Liberty to his collection for \$177.50. A very hard type to find. Next high item was a B-21-111 Houston that sold for \$170.00 on a “Best Offer”. The seller was asking \$300.00. Let me add that both prices are very high. A B-14 Coca-Cola opener from Danville, Ky. brought \$103.50. On the high end for a B-14 but it was not listed in the Color Soda Book.

On another note, a B-21-69 Rettig sold for \$110.27. A seller was watching as a second one was listed and sold for \$56.55. A fair price would be \$50-\$60, but when an opener is rarely offered for sale, you can throw any previous book prices out the window. Jeb captured another rare opener, a B-24-19 Howell & King for \$102.50. I have a

pretty decent memory but got one cheap at the Charlotte Flea Market in the early 1990s. At the following JFO Convention, Ben Hoffman jumped on it and I remember thinking it's just a B-24. I had not seen another one until this one appeared on eBay.

The “C”s types had one run away leader, a C-13-232 Zynda selling for \$204.49. It was in somewhat rough condition and drew plenty of interest. The one example I owned in 1995 was sold for \$20.00 that same year. You never know. A Cigar Box Opener, CBO, in style RND-10 (Round Head) from the Greenville Cigar Mfg. Co. brought \$180.50. The rarer CBO types continue to bring very good prices.

The “E”, wire types saw a couple of interesting sales when an E-6-136 Fresno first sold for \$121.00 and then a second one followed and only brought \$15.50. The \$15-\$20 price range is fair and just a couple of crazy bidders went after the first one. I must add that I have “gone crazy” many times on eBay. If you bid enough it will happen to everyone. One other “E” of note was an E-23-30 Walla Walla from the Bill Mugrage collection. Only the second one I have seen and it was in nice condition and went for \$136.49.

One interesting “F” result was a F-21 Coca-Cola spoon opener and corkscrew from the Coca-Cola Bottling Co. of Billings, Mt. The price realized was \$132.49 but the corkscrew was broken off. At one time I owned this opener with a corkscrew (thanks to Ollie Hibbeler) but sold it three years ago. I guess you can claim it is just a F-4 but the riveted handle was not just for looks. A G-1-65 Southern Pacific brought \$85.48. This opener has generated a lot of questions as to whether it is beer advertising or railroad related. Jack Ford listed it originally and made a great point. Why would they put a bottle outline of the opener if it was just for the Southern Pacific Railroad? Does anyone have a definitive answer?

A copper Pabst Tapster, K-4-1, sold for \$142.50. With other sales the last few years, this is a little high but considering the piece is rarely seen these days, the price is inline with the current market. A buy that I was happy to make this past quarter was a L-2 National Brewers & Bottlers Gazette. Not cheap at \$160.27 and not an official beer listing but it is a nice “go-with”. Our friend on eBay, “airborne306”, had a busy quarter selling those drop down bottles with openers for fantasy American beer brands. All put on decals and he has also started offering his American

beer brand decal N-5 knives again. Be careful and ask around if you are not sure!

Now I can move onto those darn “fantasy muddlers” or “M-19”s. The Coca-Cola ones finally slowed down and now more of the Dr. Pepper, Moxie, Orange Crush and Whistle openers are being offered. The Color Soda Book was published in 1999 and no one had ever seen these brands on a M-19. About three to four years ago they started appearing on eBay. The Coca-Cola “reproduction” was around a couple of years before someone had the idea to make these other brands. As always with reproduction and fantasy items, buy at your own risk and only pay so much. For me \$20.00 would be a max value.

Maybe the M-25-1 Lemp bullet corkscrew is harder to find than a L-2-1 Anheuser-Busch bottle corkscrew but the price one sold for this quarter, \$127.50, was very high. A good price is in the \$25-\$50 range. A somewhat rough N-78 Chero-Cola fob sold for \$120.27. A good price for excellent condition and not when you have a lot of rust (my good grade was generous). The celluloid part was in nice condition but the fob was pretty rusty. One of my favorite categories, “Starr Wall Mounts”, had one of the “rare ones” sold. The O-5 Glasco Coolers Galscock Bros. of Muncie, Ind. brought \$270.25. Many Starr wall mounts have seen big drops in value but the really hard to find ones still generate good interest and big prices.

Beer corkscrews or “P”s had many A-B knives sold and for the most part, the normal price range of \$150-\$300. A couple of bar mounts were sold, a P-30 Erie Manufacturing selling for \$484.00 and another P-35-3 Minneapolis Brewing in rough condition sold for \$255.00 (one sold last quarter in similar condition for the same price). I am not sure if a P-100-1 Rainier selling for \$271.39 was a decent buy or overpriced. The corkscrew was missing and looking at the piece it does not seem it would be that hard to replace the worm. If one can replace without too much trouble then the buyer got a nice buy?

General corkscrews still see lots of “common” action on eBay but the really good pieces are being sold through the ICCA Web Site. Results on eBay saw many German folding legs and several German celluloid mermaids sold this past quarter. Nothing special sold that I would comment about. Certainly in the future the route that the ICCA has taken may be the way many collectibles go. A club runs a great auction and most of the good items in that arena are sold through the club auction. Ebay has definitely concen-

trated on new retail items as its future. It is almost like an auction version of Amazon.Com. For now eBay collectibles at least for openers still see lots of nice pieces sold but long term I do not hold out hope that this will continue.



A-60 Indian Motorcycles

Shown with an A-60-1 Narragansett. This new aluminum opener is big, 5” long and thick (3/8”). Many sellers on eBay and most start it at \$9.99. A nice conversation piece but that is about all you can say for it.



L-2-UL St. Louis Lager Beer

Dave Lendy is the proud owner of this UL. Amazing etched graphics with the following ad, “Anheuser-Busch Brewing Association (Eagle in A) St. Louis Lager Beer (In Logo)”. No brass plate, etched into the body. It came out of an old Anheuser-Busch collection. It is still amazing what turns up in the world of breweriana. Great find Dave.
