

The STARR X style wall-mount bottle openers were first made by Raymond Brown Sr., the owner of a <u>Coca-Cola</u> bottling plant. During the Prohibition, soda companies used bottle openers more than ever.

The first canned beer went on sale in Richmond, Virginia made by Krueger Brewery. The pointed end of the opener was used to punch a hole in the top of the can in order to drink it.

When Was the Bottle Opener Invented?

At first, there wasn't even a need for bottle openers because bottles were closed with cork or wood and opened with a corkscrew. Then, in 1892 William Painter invented the first bottle opener – the Crown Cork style bottle cap. This was essentially a metal cap crimped over a bottle opening.



Painter also submitted a patent for a product that would help people remove this clever bottle cap. The lips on this bottle opener were designed to hook under the edge of the cap, while the pointed end rested on top of the cap. By lifting the handle upwards, the cap would easily come off. Painter's original handheld design has not changed much to this day.

What Are the Different Types of Vintage Bottle Openers?

William Painter's original bottle opener design is still popular today, but we all know there isn't only one style. In fact, a lot of the shapes and designs you might be familiar with originated during the 1900s.

You would be lucky to find any of the following vintage bottle openers at thrift stores or garage sales:

- Cast Iron

- Speed Blade Opener
- Wire Bottle Opener
- Flat Figural Bottle Opener

Using the same lever-action as a church key, wall-mounted bottle openers were even handier because they only required the use of one hand. Early designs often had the opener integrated into cabinets or coolers. For example, vintage Coca-Cola machines had an opener conveniently mounted on the front of their soda machines.

Cast Iron

Many vintage cast iron bottle openers don't look like the traditional shape you're familiar with. This type of bottle opener was often made into a variety of shapes and typically hand painted. Some of the most popular shapes were owls, anchors, and fish.



Speed Blade Opener

The flat metal bottle opener you most commonly see bartenders using is called a speed blade opener. First introduced in the 1950s, the speed blade made opening bottles...well, speedy. It also helped ease the pain in bartender's sore wrists. One side of the opener was designed to open caps, while the circular side was designed to slip down the neck of a bottle to pull it out of the cooler.

Wire Bottle Opener

Bottle openers started to be made simpler and cheaper since many beer companies were using them to advertise. In the early 1900s, Pabst, Miller, and Anheuser-Busch were competing for popularity, and all used bottle openers as promotional products.

Flat Figural Bottle Opener

Flat figural bottle openers are similar to cast iron openers because of their unique shape and design, but the difference is they're made of steel or brass. Some openers featured a small square hole called a "Prest-O-Lite Key," which was used to turn on the gas headlights on cars from 1910 to 1930 before electric headlights became popular.

Many of these vintage bottle openers make fantastic collector's items today. You can find nearly all these styles at garage sales, online auctions, or antique stores. The more popular collector's items are branded with companies or breweries that no longer exist. If you ever find a unique looking bottle opener, hold on to it because it might be worth money!

Why is a Bottle Opener Called a Church Key?

A church key refers to a specific style of bottle opener. If you're lucky enough to come across an older authentic church key, it can be a highly valued item. Typically, collectors enjoy finding church key bottle openers stamped with old beverage companies.

While we know that a church key is a specific style bottle opener, how the name came to be is a different story. There are actually several theories surrounding how early bottle openers received the nickname "church keys".

- 1. A bottle opener is called a church key simply because the opener itself resembled an actual church door key.
- 2. Early monks were rumored to be some of the best brewers. In order to protect their beer in monasteries, the monks needed to lock it away. It is thought the bottle openers reminded monks of their keys, and the nickname was born.
- 3. Another theory was that drinkers started calling their bottle openers church keys to poke fun at religious groups.

We may never know the true reason why bottle openers are called church keys, but we do know that the nickname does have to do with physical keys. Regardless of whichever theory holds true, you now know where this seemingly random nickname may have come from!

Did you know?

In 2005, Art Santen won the Guinness Book of World Records for his collection of 32,411 bottle openers!

How Were Bottle Openers Used for Advertising?

The 1893 Chicago World's Fair was the single event that caused the explosion of <u>branded bottle openers</u> in the beer industry. During this time, Anheuser-Busch and Pabst were in fierce competition for popularity and used bottle openers for advertising opportunities every chance they could get.

No one understood salesmanship better than Adolphus Busch. Anyone who met him walked away with a penknife or deck of cards, a corkscrew or bottle opener, each decorated with the company's trademark eagle.

Companies began to get creative with the shapes and designs of their bottle openers in order to stand out amongst the competition. Anheuser-Busch produced Budweiser openers from old beechwood tanks, and Pabst made glove-shaped openers to advertise sponsored boxing events.

Goodyear

In 1916, Goodyear began producing the zeppelin aircraft. During World War II, Goodyear created bottle openers shaped like the Corsair aircraft the company was manufacturing for the U.S. Navy. The small hole was made to hang on a chain or keychain.

In the mid-1900s, the lemon-line soda 7UP launched their "Freshen Up" campaign, and they used branded bottle openers to advertise their new slogan. The campaign was aimed at making 7UP a family drink for all ages. In addition to promotional items, print ads were also included in this marketing effort.

What Are the Imprint Methods for Bottle Openers?

Different materials call for different imprint methods, so the design doesn't wear off and looks professional. Laser Engraving

Laser engraving works best with metal bottle openers. The only downside with this process is that you can't engrave color. However, engraving can have a higher perceived value if you are aiming for an upscale design.



Pad Printing

Plastic bottle openers are commonly customized using pad printing. Using pad printing, you can add several different colors to your design.



Screen Printing

Bottle openers coated in rubber or PVC are normally customized using screen printing. Screen printing is the most cost-effective method for single-color designs.

When choosing an imprint method, be sure to consider what you want your design to look like. Designs that have several colors might look best on a plastic bottle opener because it can be screen or pad printed, while plain text would look best engraved on a metal bottle opener.

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


What Are the Parts of a Bottle Opener?

There are three main parts to a bottle opener that makes it so useful: the tooth, fulcrum, and lever.




Tooth

This is the part of a bottle opener that catches the underside of the cap. This part can also be called the lip.




Fulcrum

The fulcrum exerts force on the bottle cap, causing it to lift off the neck of the bottle.



Lever The part of the bottle opener you hold is the lever.

This diagram shows each part of a bottle opener!



There are many <u>different types of bottle openers</u>. Some are even twosided. The large circular end is used to pull a bottle out of a <u>cooler</u>, while the toothed side is used to open the bottle.

How to Use a Bottle Opener

Grab your favorite bottle of soda or beer. Here is how to use a bottle opener to pop the top!

Hold the lever of the bottle opener in your dominant hand and the bottle in the other hand.

Wedge the tooth under the bottle cap and rest the fulcrum on top of the cap.

Lift the lever upward while keeping a firm grip on the bottle.

Discard the cap in recycling.

How is a Bottle Opener Made?

Bottle openers are made in mass production using a computercontrolled <u>die cutter</u>. This allows for a large quantity to be made at the same time.

Here are the steps used to make a bottle opener:

- 1. A digital file of the bottle opener is uploaded to a computer.
- 2. Die cutting is used to create an outline on a large steel sheet.
- 3. Holes are punched out of the sheet using drill bits.
- 4. If the bottle opener has any branding, it's done using engraving or screen printing.
- 5. Excess steel is removed from around the bottle opener.
- 6. The finished bottle openers are shipped to stores.
- 1. Step One: Upload an Image



A digital file of the bottle opener is created. By working from a computer, the manufacturer can change the measurements and color before the die cutter is used.

2. Step Two: Die Cut the Metal




A sheet of steel or aluminum is placed onto a die cutting machine. The die cutter is used to outline the shape of the bottle opener into the sheet.

3. Step Three: Drill the Holes




A set of drill bits controlled by the computer are used to make holes in the metal sheet. A bottle opener will have either one or two holes. One is the toothed fulcrum (the part that pops the cap off the bottle), and the other is used to bring the bottle out of a cooler.

4. Step Four: Decorate the Lever (Optional)



Once the final design is cut into the sheet, a laser is used to engrave a logo, name, or advertising message on one side of the lever. This decoration can also be done using a screen printing machine.

5. Step Five: Remove Excess Metal



The sheet is placed in a mold and the excess metal is removed from around the bottle opener.

6. Step Six: Ship to Stores



The process is repeated until a <u>wholesale order</u> of bottle openers is ready to go. These openers are then packaged and shipped to stores around the world!

How Does a Bottle Opener Work?

A bottle opener is known as a simple lever, which works based on the laws of physics. When a bottle opener is in use, there are 3 forces acting upon it:

- 1. The force of your hand pulling up on the lever
- 2. The force of the cap as it pulls down on the tooth
- 3. The force of the fulcrum on the cap



The harder you pull up on the lever, the more force on the tooth. The more force on the tooth, the more likely the cap will pop right off. It's basic physics in action! Your science teacher would be proud.



What is Metal Forging?

Forging is another way to make bottle openers. It is the process of shaping a metal object by heating it in a fire and then hammering it. While this method is not used for mass production, forged bottle openers are a popular hobby.

Professional blacksmiths are able to forge bottle openers using steel, drifts that shape the holes, and a giant oven to fire everything inside. Some even do it the ancient way with a hammer and anvil!

Metal forging is best left to the professionals, so don't try it at home! You could get burned or seriously injured if you don't know what you're doing.



Do I Need a Bottle Opener?

You can technically open a bottle without a bottle opener. House keys, lighters, scissors, and belt buckles can all pop off the cap. However, it's definitely safer to use a dedicated opener if possible.

Also known as a bar blade or paddle opener, speed openers are most commonly used by bartenders because they reduce strain on the wrist from continuously opening bottles.



Wall-Mounted Opener

Regular bottle openers require two hands: one to hold the bottle, and one to hold the bottle opener. With a wall-mounted opener, you can open a bottle cap with just one hand. Some wall-mounted bottle openers also come with a container or magnet to catch the loose caps.



Card Style Bottle Opener

You take your wallet with you every time you leave the house. Card style bottle openers are especially handy because they fit right in your wallet. Wherever you go, you'll have a bottle opener at arm's length.



Key Chain Bottle Opener

Without your keys, you can't start your car or open your front door. So why not attach a bottle opener to your keychain? Keychain bottle openers are small and lightweight, so they won't weigh down your keys.



Sunglasses Bottle Opener

Sunglasses and a bottle opener are two essentials for the summer, so why not put the two together? The arms of these <u>sunglasses</u> have an integrated bottle opener on the end.

Why Does a Paint Can Opener Have a Bottle Opener?

Have you ever used a paint can opener and wondered why the opposite end is shaped like a bottle opener? While you can certainly use it to open a bottle of <u>Coca-Cola</u>, it's there to provide leverage to pry the paint cap open.

Trying to open a can of paint with only a thin metal handle would not be easy. The bottle opener shape at the end of a paint can opener gives more surface area for your hand to push down on to pry open the paint lid.

What is the Other Side of a Bottle Opener For?

Some bottle openers have design or shape at the bottom of the tool that can be used for more than just removing a cap. The other side of a bottle opener can be used for:

1. Opening a Can

The pointed end of this bottle opener is designed to poke a hole into the top of a can. The contents can then be poured out, or the rest of the top can be removed.



2. Attaching to a Key Ring

You've probably noticed many bottle openers with small holes on one end. These holes are most commonly used to attach a key ring. You can then put it on your keys or simply hang it up.



3. Removing Pour Spouts from Liquor Bottles

This speed blade is different from the ones with a circle on the other end of the opener. The other end of this bottle opener is designed to easily remove pour spouts from liquor bottles with the tapered side of the circle.



What is the Circle Side of a Bottle Opener For?

Most bartenders use a speed blade that has a circle on the opposite end of the bottle opener. The circular end is used to slide down the neck of a glass bottle to pull it out of a cooler. This prevents bartenders from having to get their hands cold and wet. When you see a bottle opener with a unique opening or shape on the other end, it most likely has a purpose! These are all features that make bottle openers even more unique and useful.

How to Open a Bottle Without a Bottle Opener

Have you ever brought bottled beer to a friend's house only to realize you don't have a bottle opener? Next time you or someone you know forgets a bottle opener, you can use items around the house to pry open the cap. The countertop, a lighter, a key, and a belt buckle are all items you can use to open a bottle!



Countertop

- 1. Position the rim of the bottle cap on the corner of the countertop.
- 2. Firmly hit down on the bottle cap with the palm of your hand.
- 3. Gently pull the bottle down simultaneously.

DISCLAIMER: Not all countertops are created equal. Some may be less durable than others and result in potential damage using this method. Proceed at your own risk.

Lighter

- 1. Grip the neck of the bottle with your non-dominant hand.
- 2. Wedge the end of a lighter under the rim of the bottle cap.
- 3. Lift the lighter up as if you were using a real bottle opener.

DISCLAIMER: Do not use the end of the lighter that produces a flame to open the cap. Be mindful of avoiding damage to the lighter.

Key

- 1. Grip the neck of the bottle with your non-dominant hand.
- 2. Place the point of the key under the rim of the cap while keeping the key flat.
- 3. Gently twist the key upward to pry off the cap.
- 4. Repeat until the cap comes loose.
- **TIP:** This method also works with a flat-head screwdriver.

Belt Buckle

- 1. Make sure the belt is not on your pants.
- 2. Use the belt buckle like you would a normal bottle opener.

Bottle openers can be used to:



Loosen Plaster

If you're doing some renovations and patching up a wall, you can use a bottle opener as a scraper to remove plaster. It can be especially useful for getting into small cracks or where the wall meets the ceiling. While it may not be a carpenter's favorite tool, it still comes in handy if you don't have another tool to use.



Remove Grout

Grout can be stubborn to remove if you are fixing or replacing bathroom tiles. However, you can use a bottle opener with a sharp can opener end to dig up old grout. The pointed end fits perfectly between the tiles!



De-vein Shrimp

When you can't seem to find a paring knife to peel shrimp, grab your bottle opener to help you with the job! The sharp end used to open cans is the perfect shape to de-vein shrimp. Use the bottle opener to simply cut a slit down the middle of the back side of the shrimp and remove the black vein before peeling.



Cut Packing Tape

When you receive a package in the mail, sometimes you just can't contain your excitement to open it up. You can use a bottle opener to poke through and cut packing tape to open a package!



Screw Nails

Depending on the thickness of your bottle opener, you can also use it as a flat head screwdriver. It might come in handy for quick projects or when you can't find your tools!
