BILL ENNIS is trying to accumulate all RAINIER openers from both, Seattle & San Francisco. He states that he has a long way to go as he only has 30 of the 53 known. (See his ad).

LARRY JAEHNERT writes: You have seen my name in JFO. If you do not know who I am, here is a brief autobiography. My collecting of breweriana items began when my father told me to gather Schmidt scenic cans to take and sell at a national antique car swapmeet. The first year that I took the Schmidt cans to the swapmeet at Hershey, PA, I sold over \$100 worth. I collected & sold cans for about 3 years there-I quit collecting cans and started collecting, buying, and selling breweriana. My collection of breweriana consisted of only Minnesota items. I knew and could sense that beer cans were going to be a dying fad, and that they have become, except among the clubs and serious collectors. I am a member of the BCCA and our local North Star Chapter of it. I am also a member of the ABA, NABA and JFO. I started buying, selling, collecting cans as a 9 year old, and now, 9 years later, breweriana collecting has skyrocketed (along with the prices). I never noticed the openers and corkscrews from the beginning of my collecting and I kick myself for some of the rare openers that I traded and sold away during my first few years. My father sparked the interest in opener collecting by buying one for me at a fleamarket when we were on vacation. He says it was the biggest mistake that he ever made. That was about 4 years ago. I gradually started to pick up openers along with the breweriana. My small collection started growing like a vine. I decided that collecting Minnesota openers is the only way to go. I envy people who limit themselves in their collecting, it is more of a challenge. My collection grew with interest & curiosity. I then joined JFO and was termed an opener "freak". I now have close to 300 different Minnesota openers with only a handful of corkscrews. Over half of these openers are pre-pro or during prohibition openers. I have recently swayed my interest to include the states of North and South Dakota. (Good luck, eh?) All I have is a Dakota napkin, no openers. Can anyone help? I have 200+ openers from A to M to trade or sell if need be. No one has many that I can use, but I am still persistent and try hard to find them. For the past two years I have traded for only 10 openers with members in JFO other than Don Bull. Don has supplied me with many excellent openers. I try my best to help out other members and to obey the rules of fair trading. I wish for more involvement in JFO. I am trying my best for my age and my resources. I will be 19 this month and I am attending the U of M and working part time. My favorite opener is an A-30 Premier Brewing Co. It is on the face of my calling card. I have bought hundreds of openers from 1¢ to \$20. I have not hit onto the openers that are really high buck yet. 6th Annual JFO Convention Update



TEN LE LUDANS...

The Mohawk, Oneida, Onondaga, Cayuga, and Seneca Indian tribes occupied an area across upper New York State and were known as the five Iroquois nations. The names Mohawk, Oneida, Seneca, and Iroquois are all known to breweriana collectors as the names used by brewing concerns in that area. The latter will be of the most interest to the opener collector as it was the Iroquois Beverage Corporation which had the

Indian openers made.

The first brewery in Buffalo, New York was founded by Jacob Roos in 1830. The brewery remained in the Roos family's hands until 1887 when it became the Roos Co-Operative Brewing Company. During Prohibition (1919-1933) the "brewery" produced soft drinks and near beer under the name "Iroquois Beverage Company," and it was one of the first companies in Buffalo to resume production of legalized beer after the Repeal of Prohibition in 1933. In 1955 the (then) Iroquois Beverage Corporation became part of the International Breweries, Inc., conglomerate headquartered in Detroit. This company had branches in Findlay, Ohio; Tampa, Florida; Covington, Kentucky; Frankenmuth, Michigan; and Buffalo, New York.

In the early 1950's four types of figural openers in the shape of an Indian were used as giveaways at dinners, meetings, and on special occasions by the Iroquois Beverage Corporation. One of these types (photo #1) was also produced for International Breweries, Inc., the conglomerate which purchased Iroquois in 1954.

Several years ago I learned that supposedly ten variations of the Iroquois Indian opener were made. I had three variations on hand in my collection and I began my search for the rest. By April of 1979 my collection had grown to seven variations, and I had heard of three others from fellow beer advertising opener collectors. I catalogued them as follows:

TYPE R-1 (Photo #1)

Variation #1: Red plastic Indian with cap lifter molded into body. Headband marked "Iroquois." Reverse marked "Iroquois Beverage Corporation, Buffalo, NY, 14-54, Iroquois Indian Head Beer and Ale."

Variation #2: Same as #1 except reverse marked "International Breweries Inc., Buffalo, NY 14-54, Iroquois

Indian Head Beer and Ale. TYPE R-2 (Photo #2)

Variation #1: Tin and steel Indian.
Bronze tone. Marked "Iroquois Beverage Corp., Buffalo, NY, Iroquois Indian Head Beer and Ale" on reverse.

Variation #2: Same as above except chocolate tone.

TYPE R-3 (Photo #3)

Variation #1: Magnesium Indian. Headband marked "Iroquois." Reverse marked "Iroquois Bev. Corp., Buffalo, NY" on three lines.

<u>Variation #2:</u> Same as above except aluminum.

Variation #3: Magnesium Indian. Headband marked "Iroquois." Reverse marked "Iroquois Beverage Corp, NY" on five lines.

Variation #4: Same as #3 except aluminum.

Variation #5: Same as #4 except painted brown, black, red, and yellow. TYPE R-4 (Photo #4)

Opener in the shape of Iroquois Indian without marks. Top is hinged over compartment which held a light-

Count them. that's ten little Indians. It seemed logical that there should be ten. and then along came another type R-3!; it was made of brass.








