## IN MEMORIAM

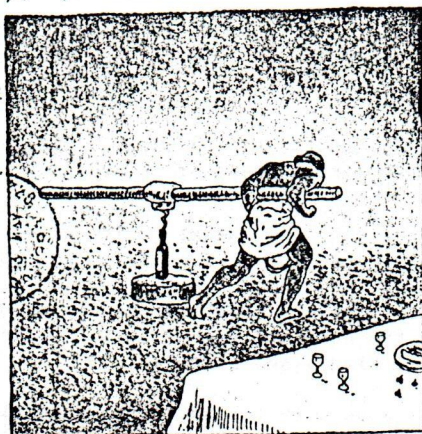

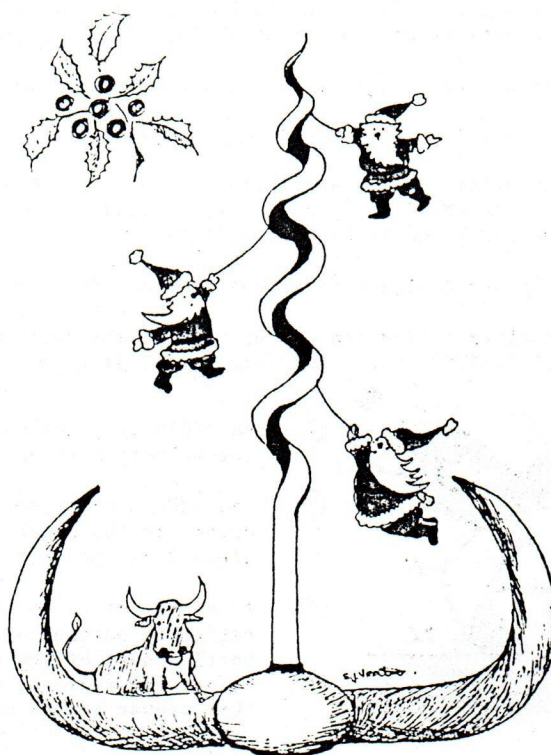

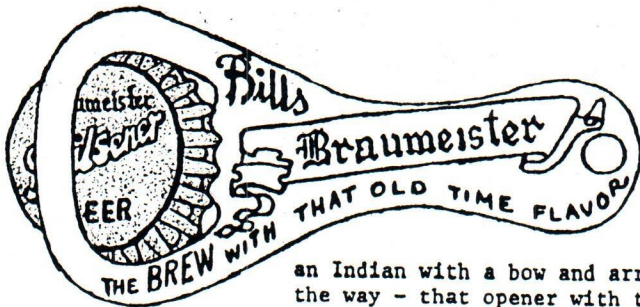

## OPENER TRIVIA #21 by Bill McKenzie

In response to the "Show and Tell" in the last issue of JFO answers were sent in about the inquiries that Jack Ford and Harold Kogut made concerning their openers.

Ollie Hibbeler and John Stanley wrote in about Jack Ford's A-35 type opener picturing

an Indian with a bow and arrow (reduced drawing on right). Ollie wrote: "By the way - that opener with the Indian with a drawn bow is definitely a brewery opener. It is from Cherokee Brewery Co. from South St. Louis, Mo. (pre-pro). This exact logo is on their salt glaze mug and etched glass. This brewery was located at the mouth of a very large limestone cave approximately 1/4 mile from the Mississippi River at Broadway and Cherokee Street. They utilized the cave for their operations. During the late 1930's, all of the 40's, and some of the 50's, this cave was used for an amusement arcade and beer garden. I know as I was in it during the late 40's and the early 50's. It is now sealed up."

John added the following information: "In Paul Michel's auction #16 for April 30, 1989 item #876 was the same opener as Jack has. It was described as follows - (Peerless Beer La Crosse, Wis.) logo only of full figured Indian shooting a bow. Opposite side is shoe and stocking with a gas key. The item sold for \$51 and Michel did not say how he knew it was Peerless Beer. Lynn Geyer had an identical opener in his auction #8 for Dec. 14, 1986. It was item #623 and was listed as follows - Cherokee? A-35 style and no brand name, only Indian with bow/arrow. Same logo as Cherokee Brewing. It sold for \$10."

Jack Ford wrote Harold Kogut informing him that the unusual tool he had acquired was not a bottle opener but an elaborate tack and nail puller one purpose of which often was to pull and hammer back the tacks in the lid of the old wooden cigar boxes.

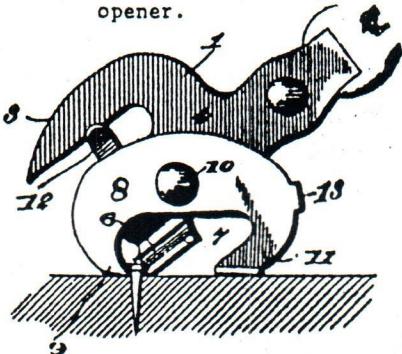
Joe Young confirmed that it was a tack and nail puller and sent in photostatic copies of four versions he has in his collection. I have drawn these as items ① thru ④ in this issue of Opener Trivia. Joe also sent in the original patent drawings of item ④ which illustrate how the tack and nail puller worked. A reduced size picture is in the lower left hand corner.

Both Jack and Joe along with Bob Nugent have an interest in can openers and since I have tried to include something for everyone in Opener Trivia I thought it would be nice to devote an issue to can openers especially for them. Jack, Joe, and Bob all have been very active in JFO and have been constant contributors to my column.

Below is an explanation of the tack and nail pullers and can openers illustrated in this issue.

### ABOUT THE OPENERS

- ① Joe Young writes: "a carpet tack puller and hammer patented in July 25, 1893 - named Columbia probably to take advantage of the Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893."
- ② Joe Young writes: "② is marked with the same patent date but there is no tack hammer."
- ③ Joe Young writes: "similar to ② but with metal handle."
- ④ Joe Young writes: "④ was patented Aug. 1, 1905 - patent awarded to Julius W. Quilling (Patent No. 796,352). As yet I don't know where Quilling was from probably from Southern Illinois or Missouri. The piece was found in Peoria, Illinois."
- ⑤ A small opener designed to remove the lid of a can of shoe polish.
- ⑥ A high quality coffee can opener made in the fashion of a finely minted coin or medal. Made by BASTIAN BROS.CO.ROCHESTER, N.Y. End (see arrow) is shaped and bent much like the end of an ordinary paint can opener.

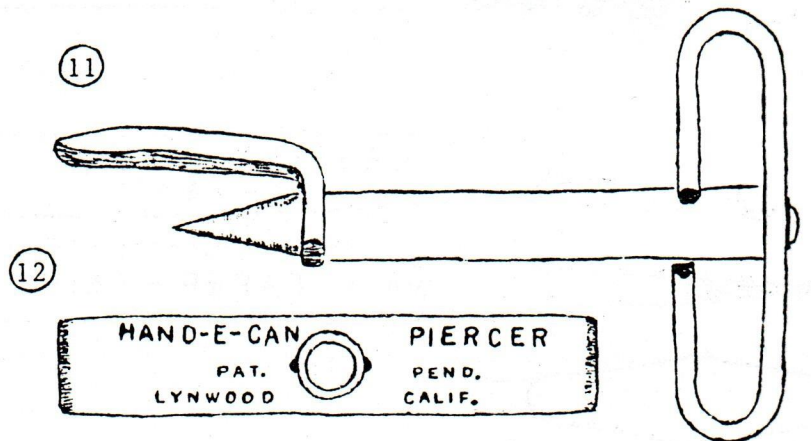
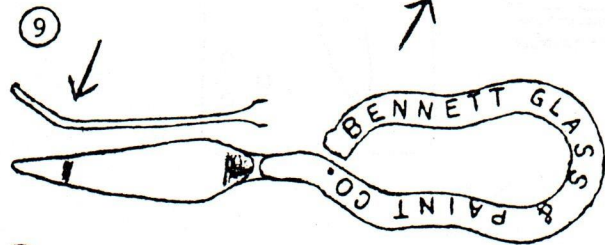
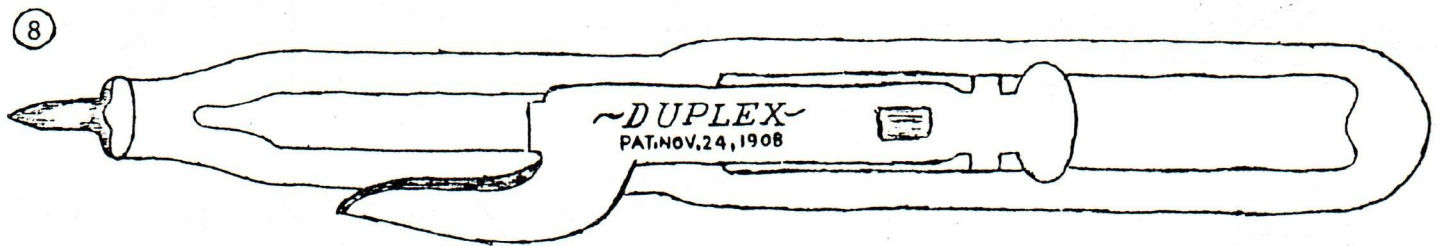
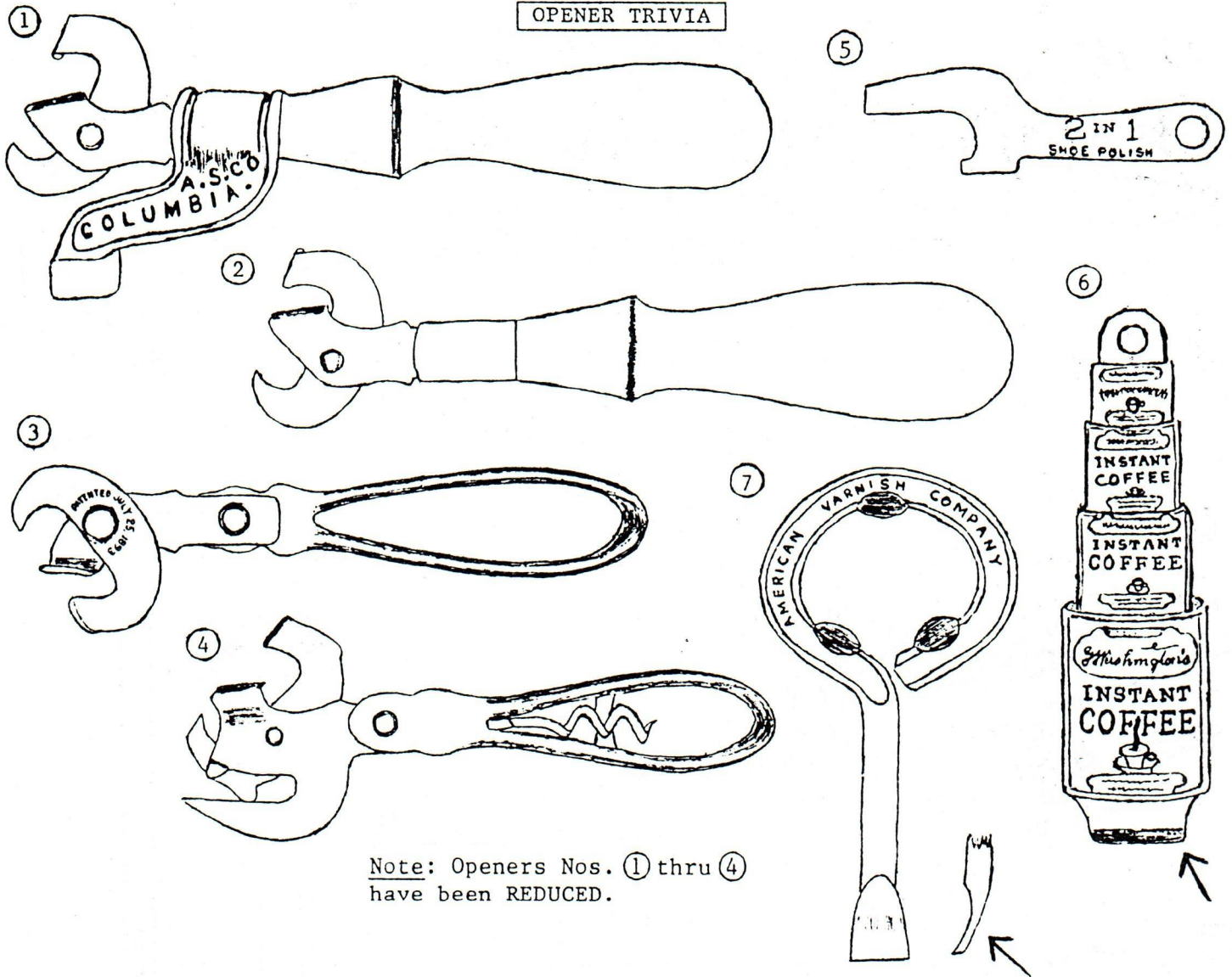


- ⑦ An ordinary paint can opener, but what is unusual is its size. Small drawing at bottom right (see arrow) shows side view of paint can opener end.
- ⑧ The DUPLEX can opener PAT. NOV. 24, 1908. What is unusual about this can opener is the metal piece with the name and patent date. Ordinarily this piece does not have a can opener blade (see arrow).
- ⑨ An early paint can opener. The area with the advertising is similar in design to button hooks and milk picks (tool for removing cardboard milk bottle caps) of the same era. Will find many button hooks and milk picks before you ever see one of these. Small drawing (see arrow) illustrates that opener end is curved when viewed from the side. Marked: PAT. APD.FOR

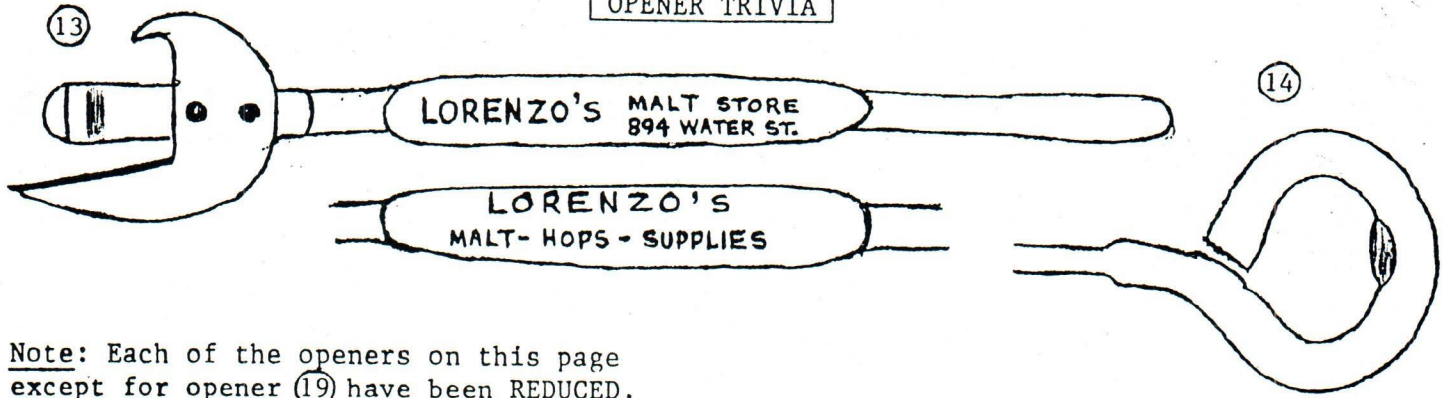

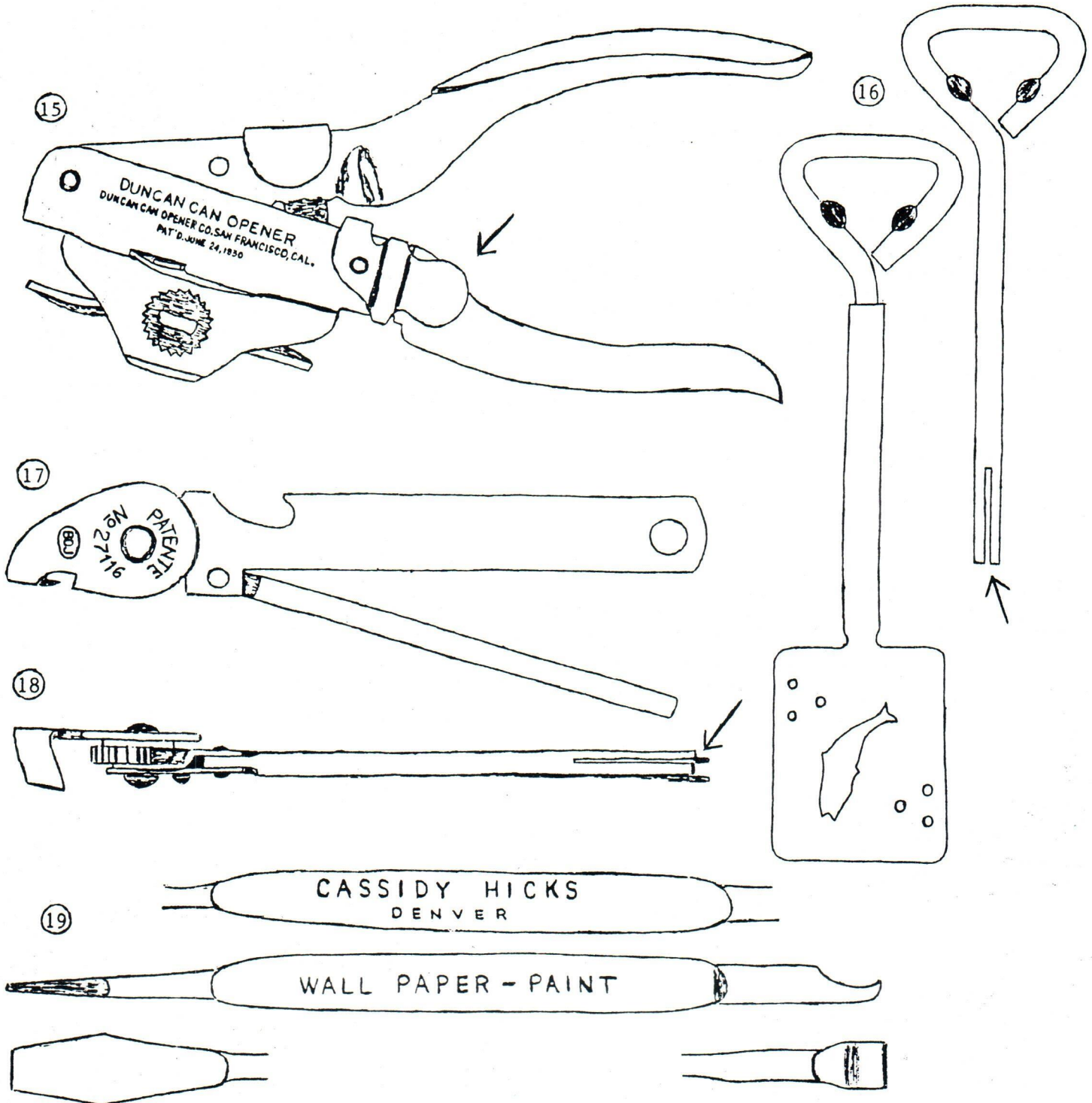

- ⑩ A B-type bottle opener with a can opener on it. Marked: PAT. APPL'D FOR MADE IN U.S.A.
- ⑪ An unusual opener probably designed to open a can of evaporated milk.
- ⑫ A top view (enlarged) of the handle of can opener ⑪ .
- ⑬ A prohibition era combination bottle opener/can opener. Lorenzo's was probably a store which sold all of the things needed to make home brew. I imagine many stores like this existed during prohibition. I wonder what city this particular one was located in. Isn't there a Water St. in Milwaukee or Chicago?
- ⑭ A top view of the bottle opener (located on the end opposite the can opener) part of can opener ⑬ .
- ⑮ The unusual feature on the DUNCAN CAN OPENER is a mechanism (see arrow) which locks the upper and lower handles together while removing the lid of the can. Patented JUNE 24, 1930.
- ⑯ A combination sardine can opener and bottle opener with a spatula for removing the sardines from the can. The fish and circle design on the spatula is cut out so that the oil or sauce can pass through. The bottle opener end pulls out of the tube exposing the slotted end (see arrow) for opening the sardine can.
- ⑰ An interesting foreign can opener/bottle opener/sardine can opener. I wonder what country it is from.
- ⑱ A side view of ⑰ as seen from the handle side. Notice that the handle has a slot (see arrow) in it for opening a sardine can. I wonder if the handle had any other purpose.
- ⑲ An uncommon type of screwdriver/paint can opener. Middle drawing illustrates opener as viewed from side. Top drawing illustrates wording on opposite side, and bottom drawings illustrate screwdriver and paint can opener ends as viewed from top.

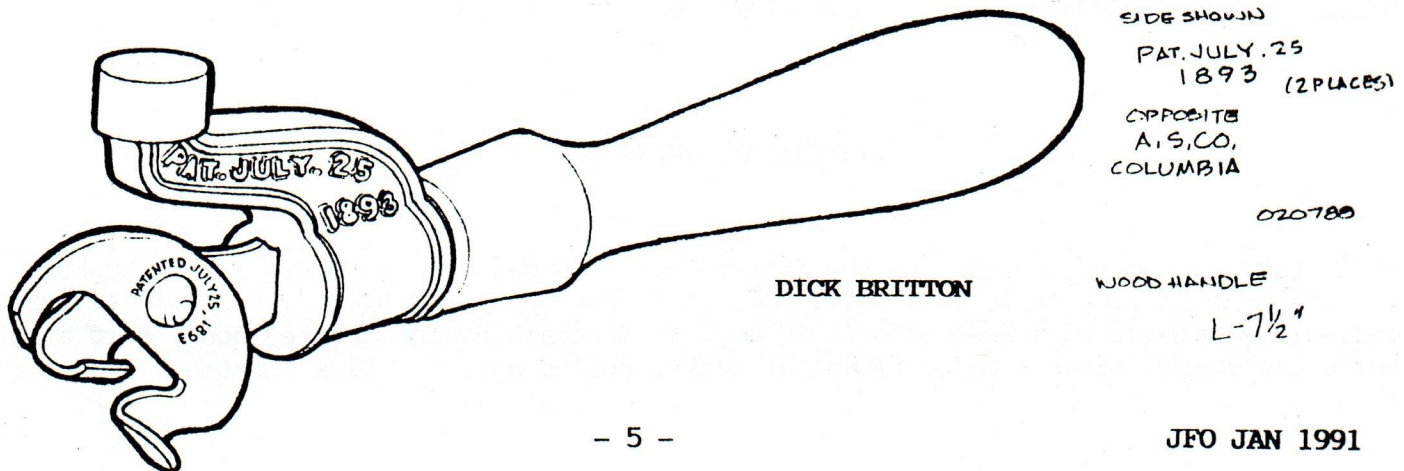

It is our "upstairs hammer." We use it mostly for putting up picture hanging nails and to pull and move the brass pins from the bread boards on which we hang our advertising match holders. # Technology opens up new vistas on the kitchen front

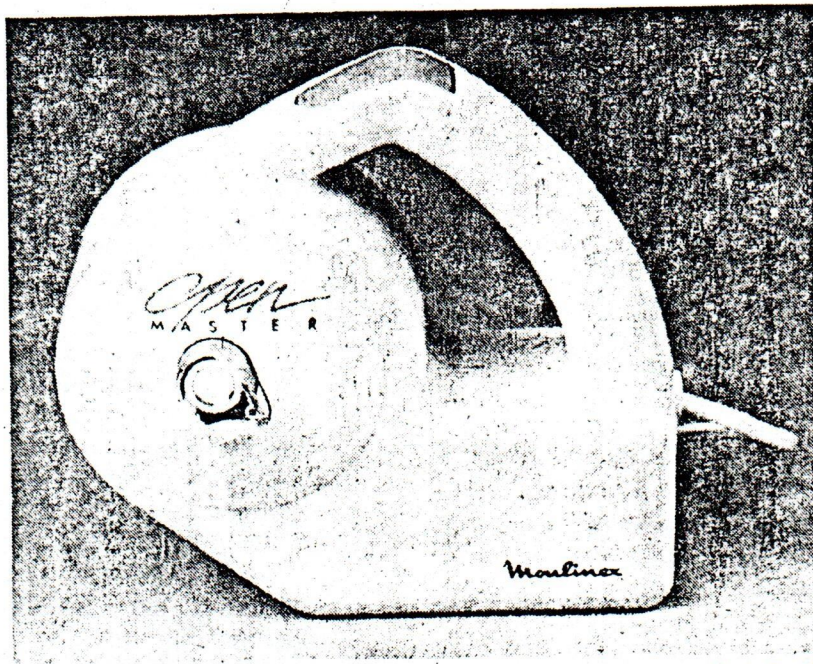

Working in a kitchen without gadgets is best compared to driving an unair-conditioned car on the hottest day of the year. Although a gadgetless kitchen and a steamy car will serve their respective purposes, their lack of features will ultimately make what could be pleasurable tasks monotonous.

Opening a can is a prime example. Whether you use a manual or an electric can opener, both will open the can, but they leave sharp edges, and many times allow the top to fall into the contents. That means you risk the safety of your fingers every time you fish the lid out of the liquid.

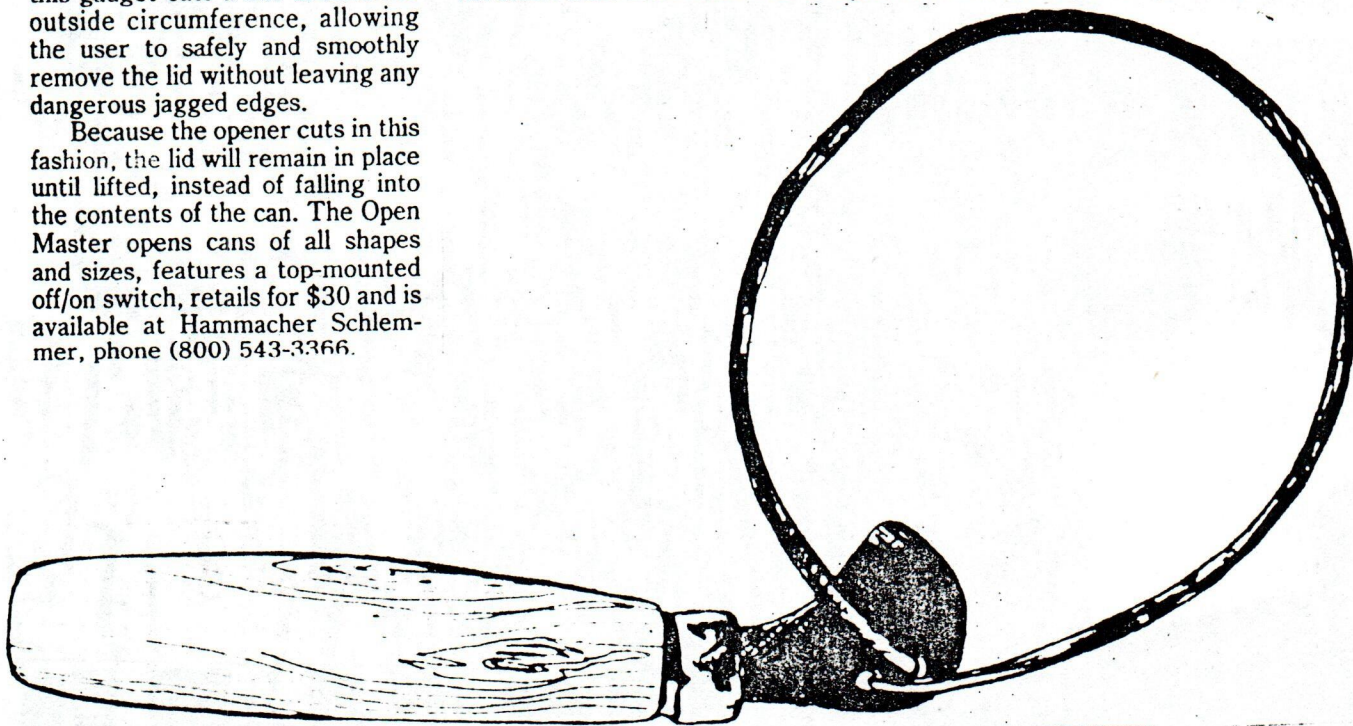
That's what makes Moulinex's new Open Master electric can opener unusual. Instead of piercing the inside perimeter of the top, this gadget cuts a line around the outside circumference, allowing the user to safely and smoothly remove the lid without leaving any dangerous jagged edges.

Because the opener cuts in this fashion, the lid will remain in place until lifted, instead of falling into the contents of the can. The Open Master opens cans of all shapes and sizes, features a top-mounted off/on switch, retails for \$30 and is available at Hammacher Schlemmer, phone (800) 543-3366.

# Collection spans 20 years of looking

If ever anyone came up with a better or unusual can or bottle opener, Lyle Lewis of Bella Vista probably has it. He owns a collection of 850 of them, mostly arrayed on pegboard across 15 feet of a basement room of his house.

They hang there in all sizes and shapes. A number of them are "church key" look alikes but are collectors' items, Lewis explained, because they have different logos on them. One of the most unusual items in his collection not only incorporates a can and a bottle opener but a cutter for nipping off the top of a soft-boiled egg in an egg cup.

Lewis wandered into his opener collecting as he followed his wife around at flea markets and shows as she collected glass.

He learned that can and bottle openers were items of choice among a certain collecting set. He got into it for openers because it gave him something to do while his wife browsed — and the hobby was inexpensive. He's been at it since 1970.

Lewis has continued his collecting since moving to Bella Vista from Minneapolis in 1985, where he was in driver's education and school administration.

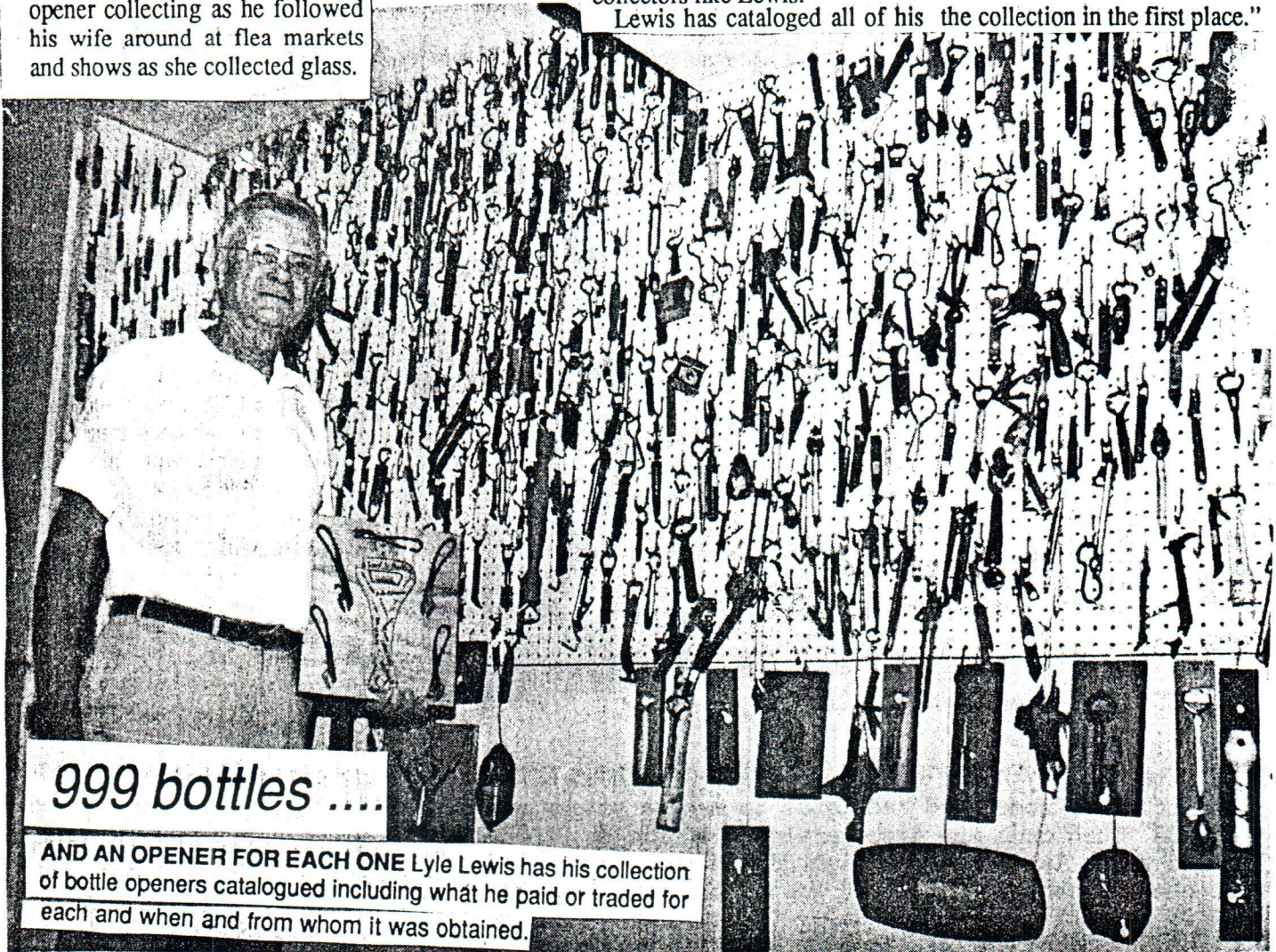
Lately he's concentrated on items with a spoon on one end and a bottle opener on the other. "I don't find many conventional openers any more that I don't already have," he said.

Opener aficionados have their own national publication named "Just For Openers" and an annual convention. "I went to the convention in 1988 and it was thrilling for me," Lewis said. The "Just For Openers" publication carries

photographs of collections plus drawings of individual openers considered unique by their owners. There also is "The Handbook of Beer Advertising Openers and Corkscrews" that is the Bible for collectors like Lewis.

Lewis has cataloged all of his openers including what he paid or traded for each and when and from whom it was obtained. "Most people don't want to sell, just trade," he said, "unless it's in an estate and the wife didn't like the collection in the first place."

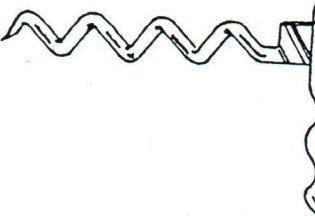
# KITCHEN TOOLS

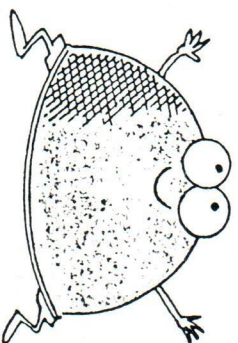
A lot of corkscrews I have known,

to make you pop your cork!



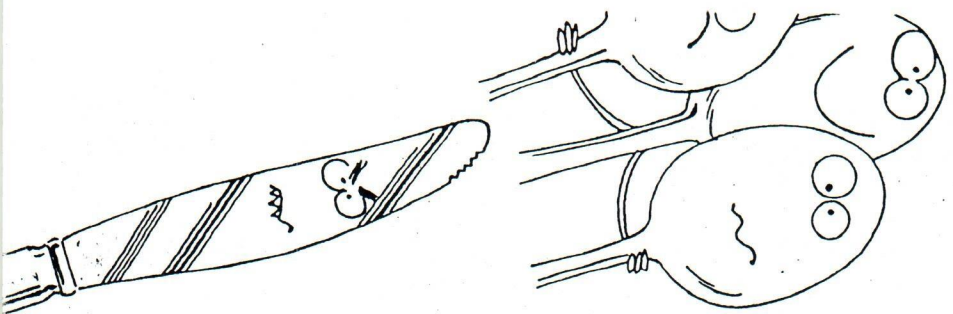
In almost anybody's kitchen, spoons

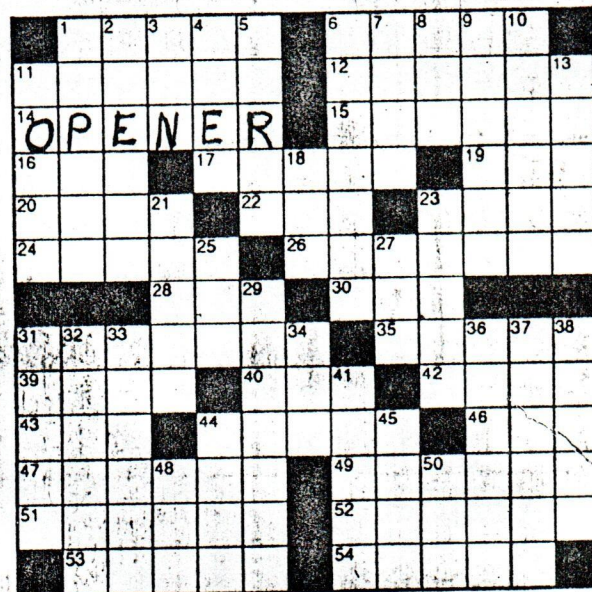

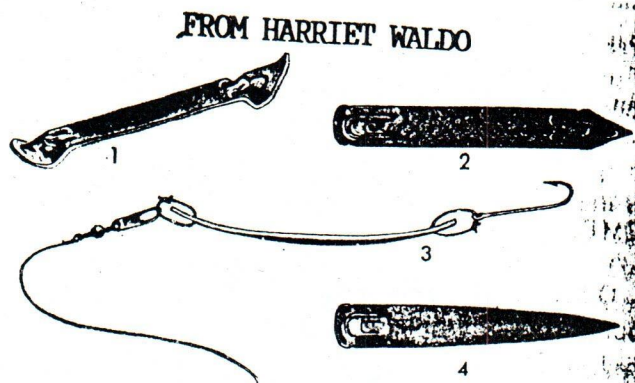

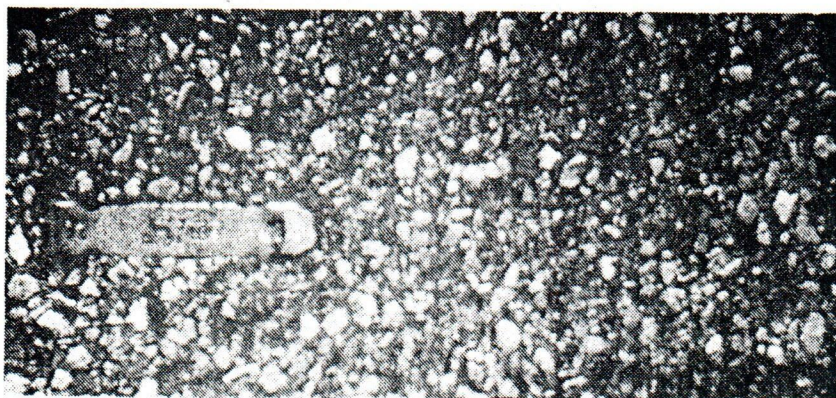


LOYD RICHARDS OF BELL, IL. CLEANING WEEDS FROM

How to make a trolling spoon from a beer-can opener. Take an ordinary beer-can opener (1) and pound it flat with an ax or hammer. Also hammer it along center X's to make it slightly concave (2). Then pound it into a mild crescent shape (3) to give it a fluttering action in the water, and attach monofilament loops for line and hook. If a file is available, opener can be tapered at end to give a minnow-like shape (4).

### Barbecue magic

Dear Heloise: Last summer I didn't spend a penny on charcoal lighter fluid for lighting our barbecue grill. With this year's summer months fast approaching, I would like to share my method of eliminating the charcoal lighter fluid most of us thought was needed to start a good fire in the barbecue pit.

I washed out a one-gallon paint can that had a wire handle and, using the triangle end of a can opener, made about a dozen holes around the bottom outside of the can, then cut out the bottom of the can with a crank-type can opener, making it open on both top and bottom.

When I decide to barbecue, I place the can in the bottom of the barbecue pit, ball up about six half-sheets of newspaper and put them at the bottom of the can and fill the rest of the can with charcoal. Then, using the holes along the bottom, I light the paper in several spots.

Because it's contained in the can, there is very little flame and the paper just smolders, but the heat is enough to light the coals and in a lot less time because of the chimney effect of the can.

When the coals are ready, I simply lift the can off the grill by the wire handle using tongs or a barbecue tool, and the coals spread out of the bottom and are ready to go. The can cools quickly and is usable all summer. — Jessy, Annandale, Va.

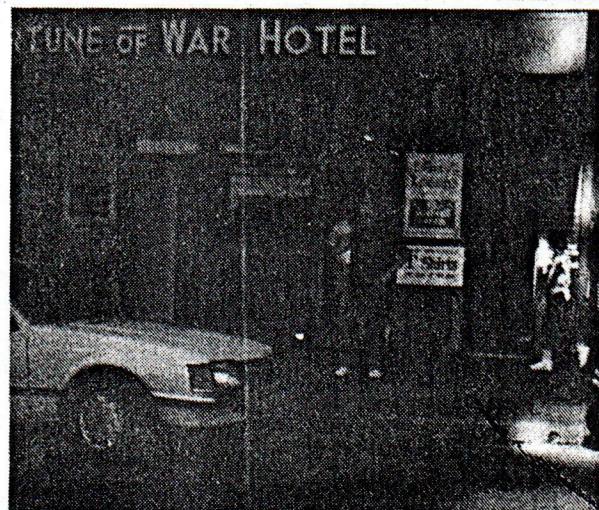

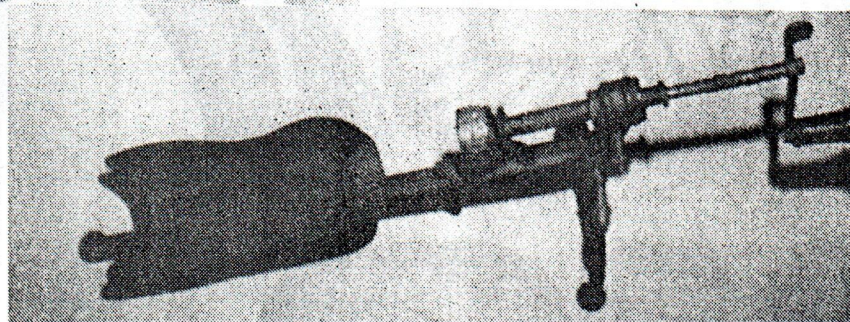

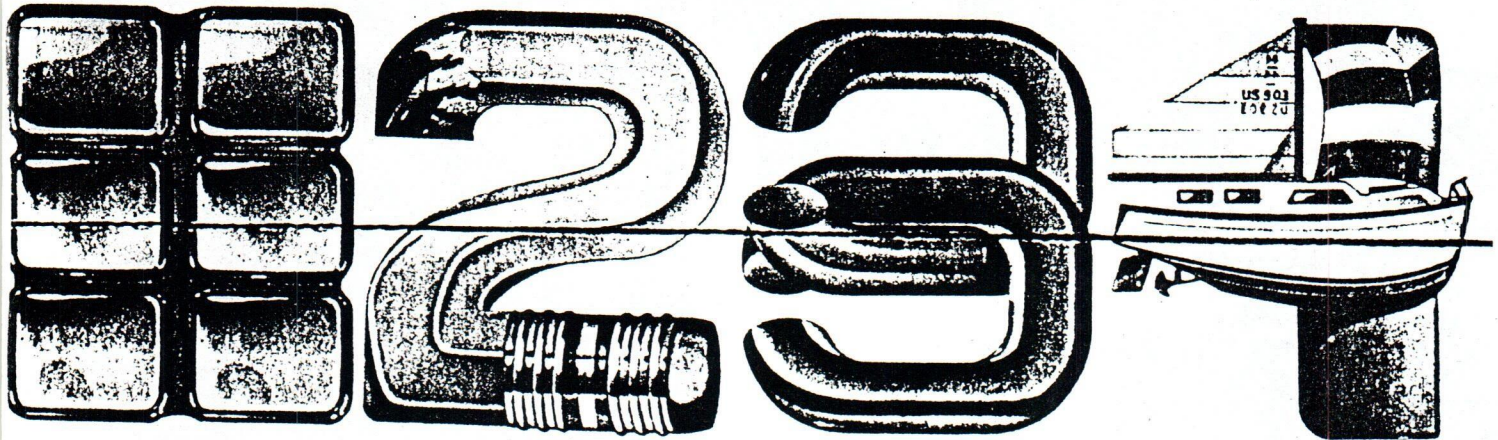


This picture of a cork screw Circa 1850-1900 was taken through a glass case. It is

This past Oct., Dorothy and I spent our Holiday in Aus. & N.Z. Although we spent most  
of our time sightseeing, I did find time to go to several Breweries and second hand stores.  
The Carlton Brewery in Melbourne, Victoria was closed. In Dunedin, N.Z. the Brewery tour  
started after our tour bus left for the day, but I picked up some literature from their  
office. I brought back 290 openers, mostly souvenirs of the cities that I visited. I did  
get 10 Aus. beer openers and 15 N.Z. beer openers and 1 Figi beer opener. They believe in  
brewing many different types of beers in both countries. In Aus. I tested 50 different  
brands of beers. In N.Z. I tested 20 different brands. They also have several Micro Brews.  
In Aus. & N.Z. there is a chain of stores called Beer Essentials. Everything they sell has  
a beer name on it. This is their logo. It is also used as a price tag.

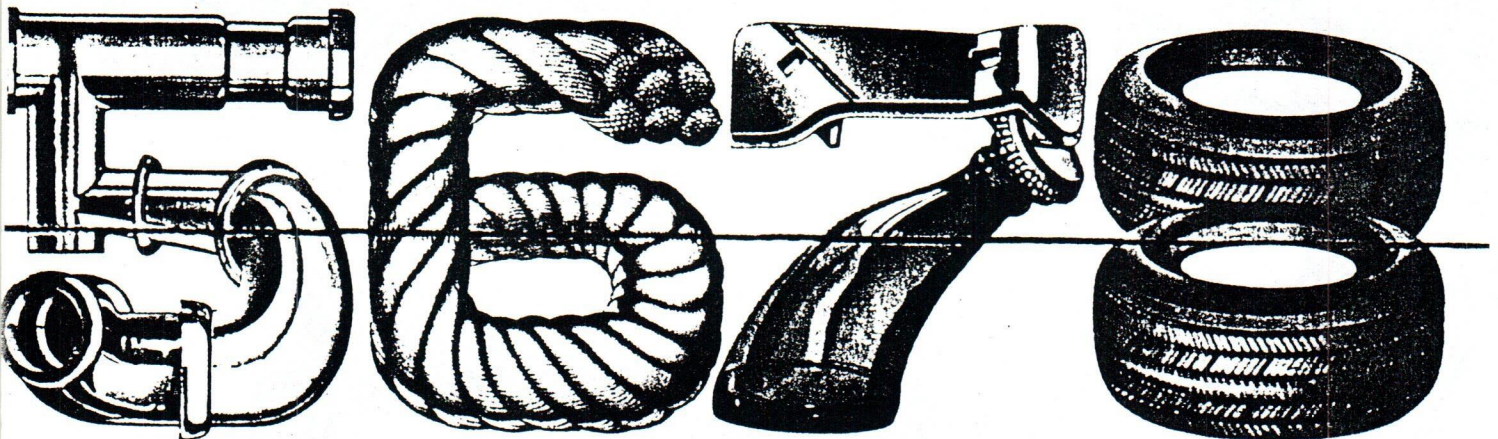

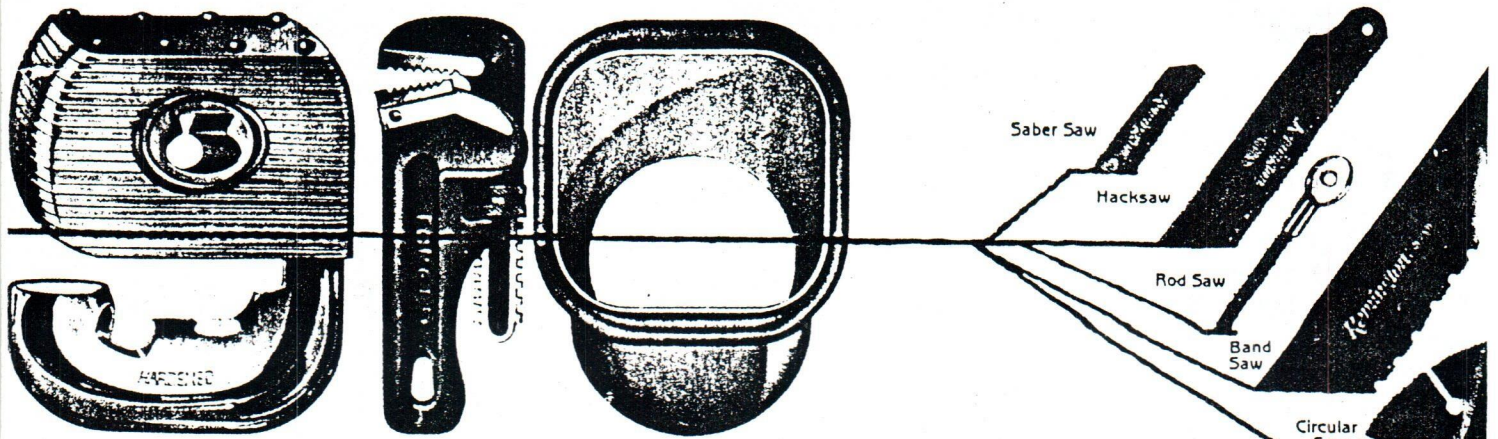
