Collector has a happy face every day

Shortly before the Salute to America Parade began Sunday afternoon, Harriet Waldo of Jefferson City spotted a hand-held fan with a happy face on High Street.

"Where did you get that fan?" she asked the woman waving it. "I collect things with happy faces."

Unfortunately, the woman couldn't recall the origin of the fan. Too bad for Waldo. She has been building her collection for 15 to 20 years, so she has fine-tuned her radar to look for elusive objects, such as a hand-held fan and a windsock. She really would like to hang up a windsock with a happy face.

"You'd think there'd be one out there," she said.

Looking at her collection gives Waldo a boost. The items range from Pez dispensers to potholders to a record cover for an album by The Funnies. Even her shower curtain features happy faces. They make her smile.

"Don't they do that to you?" she asked.

The 73-year-old former real estate agent and professional Girl Scout has reasons to smile. She recently completed drug treatment for breast cancer, five years after a mammogram detected a lump in one of her breasts. She is cancer-free.

Waldo initially visited her doctor because of high blood pressure. The physician found out she never had a mammogram and urged her to get one. Neither she nor her doctor felt the lump that the mammogram found. She elected to have a single mastectomy instead of a lumpectomy, and she didn't require chemotherapy or radiation.

Today, Waldo encourages other people to have mammograms. Sure, they're uncomfortable, she said, but they don't hurt. The test possibly saved her life.

"Don't put it off," she said. "I'm here, and I'm happy."

During Waldo's ordeal, friends made her meals and sent encouraging gifts and cards. Of course, they continued to keep their eyes open for objects with smiley faces. Not long ago a friend sent her a keychain.

Most collectors and aficionados of 20th century fads credit Harvey R. Ball, co-owner of an advertising and public relations firm in Worcester, Mass., with creating the smiley face on a yellow background.

He designed it in 1963 to boost the morale of workers in recently merged insurance companies, the Associated Press reported. Brothers Bernard and Murray Spain recognized the smiley face's consumer appeal and placed it on numerous items in the early 1970s, according to the Internet.

Waldo doesn't remember with which item she started her collection. Perhaps it was a sun-catcher she bought at the Apple Festival in Versailles or a large round sign she purchased at a store in Versailles. Whatever the case, she now numbers her collection in the gazillions.

Items perch on shelves, occupy boxes and enliven almost every room in the house. Waldo probably could round out her collection by searching the Internet, but she prefers to stumble across items or receive them from friends. Her favorite items include a card featuring the eyes and circle of the happy face reclining in bed and the smile soaking in a glass, just like someone might clean their dentures.


"I just love it," she said, "but I love all of them. That's my problem."

Originally from Jefferson City, Waldo also has lived in several other places, including the Lake of the Ozarks. She returned to the Capital City three years ago. She helps build houses with Habitat for Humanity and delivers food with Meals on Wheels.

She starts her days by walking two miles to curb her high blood pressure and maintain good health, and she encourages visitors to take the advice of one of her smiley face banners.

It reads: "Smile and have a happy day!"




William Painter: Inventor of the First Wire Opener?

In 1900, Crown Cork & Seal Co. began marketing a new type of crown cap bottle opener. Whereas William Painter's 1894 "Capped Bottle Opener" patent had specified a cast metal composition and a large lip to engage the underside of the cap, the new opener was constructed from a properly bent length of metal wire with a single small fret near the end to lift the cap. The new "wire" opener provided a wider and longer hoop handle that was noticeably arched to provide increased leverage for cap removal.

In August 1900, Crown Cork & Seal Co. ran a full page advertisement in the *National Bottlers Gazette* illustrating the use of the new wire opener. The shape of the arched wide hoop handle allowed the opener to rest neatly over the neck of any crown bottle when not in use and the wire handle could also double as a key ring. The openers were priced at 40 cents per gross.



The handle of the wire opener could be stamped with lettering to advertise the name of the bottler and a particular beverage or slogan. An October 1900 letter to the DuBois Brewing company of DuBois, PA, indicated shipment of a sample lot of the new steel wire openers and stated that, "if you order hereafter as many as 10 gross we can have your own lettering put on the handle if you so desire it."

The new wire opener was not a great success as actual examples of this opener are somewhat scarce today and no more than five different advertising varieties have been catalogued. Oddly, although William Painter was awarded 86 patents in his lifetime there was no patent awarded to he or anyone else associated with Crown Cork & Seal for either a wire opener or a machine to manufacture wire openers. Perhaps CC&S decided that its new invention was not worthy of patent protection, the profit margins were too low, and the company preferred to focus its attention on its bread and butter product, the crown cap. Additionally, inventor Augustus W. Stephens of Cambridge, MA, was awarded a design patent for a flat metal key-shaped "Bottle Seal Remover" (US Patent D-34,096) on February 19, 1901, and his invention was a great success. His opener attached nicely to a key ring and the flat metal body provided an ideal surface for advertising; hundreds of varieties of beer and soda advertising have been catalogued on openers of Stephens' design. All of these factors likely led the anonymous inventor of the wire opener to forego applying for patent rights protection.



The collectors' organization *Just for Openers* categorizes the 1900 Crown Cork & Seal wire opener as type E-22 – a wide hoop wire opener bowed for better leverage. Some E-22 type openers are more flat or only slightly bowed and these were probably not made by Crown Cork & Seal. Ironically, corkscrew maker Edwin Walker of Erie, PA, was awarded a patent for a "Crown Opener" (US Patent 1,150,083) on August 17, 1915. Walker's opener was constructed from a single length of formed wire with two or more frets for engaging the crown cap. Save the use of two frets instead of one, his patent bore an uncanny resemblance to the 1900 Crown Cork & Seal wire opener – so similar in fact that if Crown Cork & Seal had chosen to patent its wire opener in 1900, Walker would have surely been liable of patent infringement. Yet in the patent world, inventions legally belong to those who apply for and are awarded patent rights, and Walker capitalized on those rights until his death in 1917. Others - most notably Harry Vaughan of Chicago - were assigned these patent rights and produced an inestimable number of wire openers for many years. The ubiquitous Walker-type wire openers were by far the most common of the pre-prohibition openers and thousands of beer and soda advertising varieties have been catalogued. Edwin Walker is remembered as the "father of the wire opener," but it seems that William Painter or one of his associates simply missed out on his chance of being bestowed that same title fifteen years prior.



From the last issue I did not find out who bought the non-beer M-3s from the Roger Steckler collection. Maybe word will leak out at some point. Tom Gormally has asked if anyone has both examples of the I-20-6 Hamms swivel opener? If someone does please send them to me to take pictures and show in the next issue. The wording in the handbook does not let him know which example he has.

Also John Cartwright writes that he got a P-6 Ashland Brewing on eBay this past quarter and is curious if it is a correction to the listings already in the handbook or is it a new UL? Here is the wording on his and two in the handbook are listed after it. Does anyone have either example in the handbook. If so I just want to verify the wording. John's look to be a hybrid of the listings shown.

This past quarter on eBay seemed to have more action on good openers. The top beer “A” was an A-19-UL Lone Star Brewing / Alamo Beer that Jeb Burruss had to have and he was successful at \$280.00. It is pretty amazing it took until 2006 to turn this one up with so many Texas collectors. Each week on eBay there are several of the fake A-9 Coca-Cola baseball players offered and darn if someone doesn't go big and one did this quarter bringing \$100. Most go for \$10-\$20 and are worth about \$5 each. As always “Buyer Beware”.

Good “B”s were common this quarter but certain ones brought high prices and lots of competitive bidding. The Coca-Cola “B-2”s are just common but nice condition ones still bring in the \$100 range and even the at one time hard to find steel version turns up fairly often. A nice B-9-1 Centennial Brewing brought \$109.16. A tough Montana opener to find and especially hard in nice condition and this one looked nice in the pictures.

Pat Stambaugh became the proud owner of a couple of tough Minnesota “B”s, a B-18-330 Ganser at \$114.27 and a B-21-375 Uncle Sam at \$89.88. It was the first time I had seen either one of these offered on the market. Outside of the above three “B”s nothing went very high but

overall a nice selection for beer collectors and some good soda ones also.

“C”s and “D”s saw some action with the highlights being a C-17-37 Largay bringing \$53.06 (previous examples have all been in the \$40-\$100 range) and a new opener, a C-49-UL Hauenstein, bringing \$51.00. It is astounding that good pre-pro openers bring \$5-\$10 and a new opener can bring such a high price. Maybe it was a promo piece. Time will tell. Only a few “D”s and a decent condition D-11-1 Hagerstown was bought for \$36.88. At one time this was a good \$100-\$125 opener. Just too many have been found to maintain that price level.

Wire, “E” types, saw some action but overall it was a slow quarter. Highlights were an E-4-261 Pioneer (from Fairbanks AK) bringing \$87.98 (I believe the horn sounded on this one) and an E-6 Saskatoon Beer (Canadian) bringing \$55.50. Two fair prices for a couple of hard to find openers. Larry Moter did get a good one in an E-4-UL “Gold Seal with every meal / Same” and we assume it is from Washington state.

“F”s were a little slow with a couple of Coca-Cola openers leading the way. A F-27 Coca-Cola brought \$152.56 and a F-29 Coca-Cola Superior NE brought \$150 (BIN Buy-It-Now was used). Once again Larry Moter struck getting a nice F-27-11 Travis Beer (from Texas) for \$52.59.

“G”s saw some good action and were highlighted by a G-1-45 Southern bringing \$52.09. A very hard G-1 to find, I have one and until now had never seen another one offered for sale. A G-4 Dr Pepper brought \$94.00 which is a little cheap considering it has brought in the \$300 range. Now that several have turned I guess all of the “real serious” collectors have one. The G-25 Coca-Cola Glascock Bros was rough but not a bad price at \$75.00 as anything from this bottling company is popular.

“H”s, “I”s and “K”s were slow this quarter with very few decent examples offered. The fairly common K-2-2 Falstaff was surprising when it brought \$83.00. Compared to the previous two quarters, “L”s were very slow. It was interesting that a group of four slender bottle “L-4”s were offered by a seller in Milwaukee and three of them are not listed. But I agree with Jeb Burruss that since they had “foil” labels they were probably fakes. Hard to believe at this time that someone could turn up three L-4-ULs at one time. It is also possible they may have come

from a display but in reality the foil label openers are the easiest to make. For now I will not list them in the Handbook. The UL brands are Goebel, Falstaff, and Pabst.

The “M”s saw a lot of action this past quarter. Several highlights were worth noting. First was a common M-3-17 S-K slider (average condition) bringing \$177.50 when \$27.50 would have been a fair price followed by a M-3-43 Queen City bringing \$227.55 (once folks knew this variation existed several have turned up and \$100 would have been a good price).

Then we get to the M-25 “bullet corkscrews” and three with top load corkscrews with ads for “Old Forester” did well but \$305.50 was way up there for something that does turn up from time to time. Don Bull was selling this one out of Alf Erickson’s collection (more later).

Next was my favorite opener to sell, a M-27 Lone Star spinning belt buckle. One brought \$292.97, a record, when they can be had all day for \$20-\$25 and free if you can get one from Verne Vollrath (he is getting low on his supply). Like its counterpart the “Lone Star Beer” belt buckle, they are very common but a lot of Lone Star collectors exist in this world and a lot willing to pay whatever for a Lone Star opener.

Finally several “M-73”s sold this month but the high seller by far was a mint M-73-4 Missoula bringing \$274.49. Corkscrew sliders are always popular and I am just glad that the general corkscrew collector can get a M-73 Chicago 1934 World’s Fair pretty easily since it is the most common one.

“N” types were popular this past quarter and several nice Coca-Cola knives were offered in “eBay-Live” auctions (buyers pay a premium). Results shown are before the premium is applied and prices realized include the first N-4 Coca-Cola I have seen for sale anywhere and it brought \$275.00 and looked to be in excellent condition. The other high lot was an N-87 Coca-Cola bringing \$375.00.

Car collectors went crazy for the N-20 advertising Marmion, Hudson and Essex cars and it brought \$143.49. I wanted it badly and was very happy to get the N-62-UL Roger Williams for \$49.99. It does turn up with the Hund and Eger ad for Coca-Cola and Schlitz but along with its condition it was an opener with a really neat ad.

Wall mounts or “O” types saw a lot of results and especially with Starr X openers. Prices have settled down but these openers always see a lot of bidders and interest. Highlights included a rough O-5 Beaufort Ginger Ale bringing \$266.56 and then a nice example sold for \$215.00. The one beer result that was hard to figure was an O-5-8 Pearl bringing \$128.50 when \$30-\$40 would have been a good price. Finally on a beer note, Harold Queen was the lucky bidder on the “New Discovery (O-24)” wall mount advertising “Old Stock”. I really questioned whether it was an opener but it looked legit in person when I visited Harold.

Beer corkscrews, “P” types, were very active and of course the usual selection of A-B knives. One surprising area was the P-26-1 American was offered three different times this past quarter with the best condition one bringing \$255.00 (Mint). A P-19-10 Kalispell was a big surprise and I am sure set a record for a P-19 when it sold for \$284.99. Even with the passing of Bill Pattie there are other real serious Montana collectors.

The P-114-1 Blatz candy stripe legs seemed to be somewhat of a bargain at \$290.00 as most have gone in the \$400-\$500 range. More nice Coca-Cola knives sold but nothing real high price wise. Just for you, Art Santen, I threw in a “Q” (plastic) price result on a Q-37-2 Miller bringing \$7.60 (a hard type to find and I believe the horn sounded on this one).

Finally the one area that always has good examples offered for sale, corkscrews, and this quarter was no exception. Whether it be US or Foreign, lots of good pieces were sold and just check the listings for all of the details. Note some of the prices realized are “Best Offers” a new eBay feature where the seller can list an item with a Buy-It-Now price and accept “Best Offers” and if they get one they like, close the auction and sell it for that price.

As I mentioned earlier, Don Bull is in the process of selling Alf Erickson’s great collection of corkscrews. Alf kept 100 corkscrews for himself (and not all of the good ones) and Don has been selling the collection on eBay and through auctions from his web site since late July. Don has an email data base of over 1,100 potential corkscrew collectors. A lot of great and rare corkscrews are being offered. Don’t miss out.
